NEW CENSUS TRADE REPORTS PROGRAM

The Bureau of the Census is initiating a series of trade reports which will be keyed to the needs of service and distribution establishments for up-to-date facts on business trends. This promises to provide, for the first time in the history of this country, a continuing statistical program whose scope is in proportion to the importance of these businesses in the economy of the country. Important segments of the program getting under way include (1) the MONTHLY RETAIL TRADE REPORT, for which initial schedules were sent out covering January activity in a variety of kinds of business, and (2) the MONTHLY SERVICE TRADE REPORT, for which the first schedules covering February receipts have been sent out to establishments in important kinds of service businesses. The former is an elaboration and improvement of the earlier reports which covered only 34 States in a less complete survey.

The Bureau will publish figures each month for each kind of business showing the trend in receipts each month compared to those in the previous month and to those in the same month a year ago. Initially, results will be published by kind of business for the country as a whole and for certain cities. As the program develops, results will also

This final report, based on the June 1974 Current Population Survey, presents data on the fertility expectations of American women in greater detail than that shown in the advance report (Current Population Reports, Series P-20, No. 269), which was published in September 1974.

The text of the report provides data on such topics as the decline since 1967 in the proportion of women who expect to have three or more children, the time-frame within which future births are anticipated, birth expectations among women childless at the time of the survey, validity of expectations data, and differentials in expected births and children born to date. Text tables show data for total lifetime births expected by reporting wives 18-24 and total lifetime births expected by wives who were childless at the date of the survey, by age. Also included is a table comparing birth expectations and children ever born as of 1972 with those of women in 1967 and for women first married 5 or more years in 1972.

Detailed tables provide selected data on birth expectations and on children ever born. These data are classified

The CATALOG OF UNITED STATES CENSUS PUBLICATIONS is issued on a current basis each quarter and cumulated to the annual volume. The MONTHLY SUPPLEMENT to this CATALOG, which does not include regular monthly and quarterly publications, enables users to be informed more currently on publications as they appear. Each subscription to the quarterly CATALOG (annual subscription \$1; for foreign mailing \$1.50) will include a combination of 4 quarterly issues of the CATALOG and 12 issues of the MONTHLY SUPPLEMENT. Separate mailing lists for the CATALOG and for the MONTHLY SUPPLEMENT are not maintained.

The record of the Bureau of the Census publications since the first Census in 1790 through the year 1945 is available in the CATALOG OF UNITED STATES CENSUS PUBLICATIONS—1790–1945 (Government Printing Office, \$1.50), prepared by the Census Library Project sponsored by the Library of Congress and the Bureau of the Census. Publications issued after 1945 are shown in the annual issues of CENSUS PUBLICATIONS CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE for 1946 and subsequent years through 1951. Publications since 1951 are listed in the CATALOG OF UNITED STATES CENSUS PUBLICATIONS.

The BUSINESS SERVICE CHECK LIST of the Department of Commerce, issued weekly at a subscription cost of \$1.25 a year (for foreign mailing \$2.25), includes a list of Census publications.

Subscriptions to the CATALOG and the CHECK LIST can be placed with the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C., or with the field offices of the Department of Commerce listed on the back cover of this CATALOG.

HOW TO USE THIS PUBLICATION

The CATALOG OF UNITED STATES CENSUS PUBLICATIONS is designed to give users of published Census statistics a direct method of locating needed information. The catalog section contains detailed descriptions of the contents of the reports issued during the period covered and is followed by two indexes, an index to reports by geographic areas, and an index to reports by subject. All publications are arranged in the catalog section by general subject field, following the organization pattern of the Bureau, namely: 1. Agriculture; 2. Business; 3. Foreign Trade; 4. Governments; 5. Industry; and 6. Population and Housing. An additional section, "7. Miscellaneous," includes general publications and special series not falling within the six subject-matter divisions named above.

Index entries indicate the series number of the report covering the subject of the given entry, in cases where that report bears a series identification. In order to avoid the indexing of large lists of commodities, general references are made in those instances where coverage is all-inclusive; reports are indexed under specific commodities only when the reports are limited to the specific item.

4. Governments Division

The Governments Division collects data and prepares reports showing current and benchmark statistical data relating to the characteristics and functions of State and local governments and their administration in the United States. In current reporting, primary attention is given to public finance (revenue, expenditure, debt, and financial assets), and public employment (number of employees and amount of payroll). An annual two-page release, *Bureau of the Census Publications on Governments, as Scheduled for the Fiscal Year 19—*, is available upon request.

During the past century, a Census of Governments has been taken at 10-year intervals—most recently for 1942—providing more complete and detailed information on State and local governments than is reported currently. The law now provides that such a census be taken at 5-year (rather than 10-year) intervals, and preparations are underway for a Census of Governments for the year 1957.

Regular reports listed below as being available from the Bureau of the Census can be obtained on an annual subscription basis as follows: All publications, excluding special studies and two annual financial reports available from GPO, \$1.15; reports on public employment only (2 annual), 40 cents; summary reports on government finances only (5 annual publications), 75 cents.

Debt items are shown for the following, by State: Debt outstanding, issued, and retired, by term and character; and long-term debt outstanding and original long-term debt issued, by function.

Also shown by State are: Cash and security holdings by type and by purpose of holding; income and expense statement and selected transactions of State alcoholic-beverage systems; finances of State-administered public-employee retirement systems, unemployment-compensation funds, compensation systems, and miscellaneous insurance trust systems; percent changes from 1954 to 1955 in revenue, expenditure, and debt; and States' fiscal years and population, and personal income (amount and per capita).





The First Census of the United States, taken as of the first Monday in August, 1790, under the provisions of the second section of the first article of the Constitution, showed the population of the thirteen states then existing and of the unorganized territory to be, in the aggregate, 3,929,214.

This population was distributed almost entirely on the Atlantic seaboard, extending from the eastern boundary of Maine nearly to Florida, and in the region known as the Atlantic plain. Only a very small proportion of the inhabitants of the United States, not, indeed, more than 5 per cent., was then to be found west of the system of the Appalachian mountains. The average depth of settlement, in a direction at right angles to the coast, was 255 miles. The densest settlement was found in eastern Massachusetts, Rhode Island, and Connecticut, and about New York city, whence population had extended northward up the Hudson, and was already quite dense as far as Albany. The settlements in Pennsylvania, which had started from Philadelphia, on the Delaware, had extended northeastward, and formed a solid body of occupation from New York, through Philadelphia, down to the upper part of Delaware.

The Atlantic coast, as far back as the limits of tide-water, was well settled at that time from Casco bay southward to the northern border of North Carolina. In what was then the district of Maine, sparse settlement extended along the whole seaboard. The southern two-thirds of New Hampshire and nearly all of Vermont were covered by population. In New York, branching off from the Hudson at the mouth of the Mohawk, the line of population followed up a broad gap between the Adirondacks and the Catskills, and even reached beyond the center of the state, occupying the whole of the Mohawk valley and the country about the interior New York lakes. In Pennsylvania population had spread northwestward, occupying not only the Atlantic plain, but, with sparse settlements, the region traversed by the numerous parallel ridges of the eastern portion of the Appalachians. The general limit of settlement was, at that time, the southeastern edge of the Allegheny plateau, but beyond this, at the junction of the Allegheny and Monongahela rivers, a point early occupied for military purposes, considerable settlements had been established prior to the war of the Revolution. In Virginia settlements had extended westward beyond the Blue Ridge, and into what is now West Virginia, on the western slope of the Allegheny mountains, though very sparsely. From Virginia, also, a narrow tongue of settlement had penetrated down to the head of the Tennessee river, in the great Appalachian valley. In North Carolina the settlements were abruptly limited by the base of the Appalachians. The state was occupied with remarkable uniformity, except in its southern and central portion, where population was comparatively sparse. In South Carolina, on the other hand, there was evidence of much natural selection, apparently with reference to the character of soils. Charleston was then a city of considerable magnitude, and about it was grouped a comparatively dense population; but all along a belt running southwestward across the state, near its central part, the settlement was very sparse. This area of sparse settlement joined with that of central North Carolina, and ran eastward to the coast, near the junction of the two states. Further westward, in the "up country" of South Carolina, the density of settlement was noticeably due to the improvement in soil. At this date settlements were almost entirely agricultural, and the causes for variation in their density were general ones. The movements of population at this epoch may be traced in almost every case to the character of the soil, and to facility of transportation to the seaboard; and, as the inhabitants were then dependent mainly upon water transportation, we find the

Through the Decades

The census has been taken every ten years since the early days of the United States of America.

Although the U.S. Census Bureau carries out hundreds of surveys every year, its most well-known duty is still to conduct the decennial census. Census results have several high profile applications: they are used to reapportion seats in the House of Representatives, to realign congressional districts, and as a factor in the formulas that distribute hundreds of billions of dollars in federal funds each year. Because of the importance of this population count, procedural changes in the decennial census often reflect larger organizational shifts at the Census Bureau.

This section follows the evolution of the decennial census by detailing the events surrounding each of them. Political and technological changes, and the shifting public demand for information, have all shaped the modern census and the mission of the Census Bureau.



For the 1970 Census, the Bureau of the Census released for the first time a series of summary statistic files or "Counts" as part of the regular program for disseminating the data. Six series of counts were released, as well as a number of special tabulations. The Bureau of the Census has transferred data from the First, Fourth, and Fifth Counts to NARA. Each Count consists of a particular set of data tables for specific types of areas and the files within each count differ in the types of geographic areas reported. The First, Second, and Third Count tabulations are based on the complete count of persons; the Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Counts are derived from the 5-, 15-, and 20-percent sample data. 
