
# The Foundation of the American Community Survey

***The American Community Survey is on the leading edge of survey design, continuous improvement, and data quality.***

- The nation's most current, reliable, and accessible data source for local statistics on critical planning topics such as age, children, veterans, commuting, education, income, and employment
- Surveys **3.5 million** addresses
- Along with other Census programs (including PEP), helps inform over **\$675 billion** of Federal government spending each year
- Covers **40+ topics**, supports over **300** evidence-based Federal government uses, and produces **11 billion** estimates each year
- Three key annual data releases:
  - 1-year Estimates (for large populations)
  - 1-year Supplemental Estimates (for small populations)
  - 5-year Estimates (for very small populations)





- Geography or population group is at the center

- Subject matter is at the center of the table

# The Population Estimates Program

## *The Population Estimates Program disseminates official measures of population and housing units between decennial censuses.*


- Mandated by federal law, the estimates, along with other Census programs (such as the ACS), inform over **\$675 billion** of Federal government spending each year.
  - Recently, the estimates were used to distribute over \$100 billion to states and cities for the 2020 CARES Act.
- Cover **basic population and housing topics** supporting:
  - The ACS and other federal surveys (population controls and denominators)
  - Academic and business research
  - Program planning in the public and private sectors
- Current estimates for July 1, 2020
- Estimates extend back to 1900
- Released annually for over 80,000 areas in the United States and Puerto Rico



## Evaluation Estimates

Each decade, the Population Estimates Program has the opportunity to make comparisons between the final series of estimates for the decade and the latest decennial census to assess the accuracy of the estimates. Differences between the estimates and Census counts are typically interpreted as error in the estimates and are used to inform research and methodological improvements over the decade.




## How are the ACS and PEP different?

<i>Purpose</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Sample estimates</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Provide annual estimates of the current population and total housing units by calculating change since the last census</li> </ul>
<i>Collects</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Detailed social, economic, housing, and demographic characteristics</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Not a survey</li> <li>• Uses administrative records and other data sources to calculate annual change in population and housing</li> </ul>
<i>Content</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Population and housing characteristics</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• No social and economic detail</li> <li>• Population characteristics by age, Hispanic origin, race, and sex only</li> <li>• Housing unit totals only</li> </ul>

<i>Geography</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• 1-year ACS estimates contain geographies with populations of 65,000 or more</li> <li>• 5-year ACS estimates can be found down to the block group level for select tables</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Nation, states, counties, cities, and towns</li> <li>• Puerto Rico Commonwealth and its municipios</li> <li>• Metropolitan and micropolitan statistical areas</li> </ul>
<i>Statistics</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Margins of error calculated at the 90% confidence level</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Not a product of sampling, so statistical confidence intervals are not needed.</li> <li>• Entire time series back to last census updated annually, so averages for time periods are not used</li> </ul>

## How are the ACS and PEP similar?

- Both disseminate total population and housing unit estimates.
- Both disseminate population characteristics estimates by age, Hispanic origin, race, and sex.
- PEP estimates are used as controls for ACS population and housing unit data, so 1-year estimates for larger areas are consistent.

## When to use what: ACS or PEP? (general)

Interest	Product
Population and housing unit totals and demographic characteristics (age, Hispanic origin, sex, race)	PEP
Social and economic characteristics	ACS
Estimate percents, means, medians, rates	ACS or PEP depending on the subject
Conducting statistical testing to compare	ACS
Mixture of population, housing, social or economic estimates	All ACS or all PEP (if only using population or housing)

## When to use what: ACS or PEP? (examples)

Example	Product
Population total	PEP
Population by age & sex (including percents) for a state at a point in time	PEP
Population by age & sex (including percents) by educational attainment for a state	ACS 1-year estimates (if being current is priority) ACS 5-year estimates (if precision is priority)
Mean household income for a small geography (population less than 65,000)	ACS 5-year estimates
Comparing mean household income for a small place to its county	ACS 5-year estimates
Comparing difference in married-couple families in the same county between two time periods	ACS (compare 1-year with 1-year or 5-year with 5-year)






How do I respond to the ACS?


