Supplementary information on the number of municipal employees and amount of pay rolls in January 1940 of 40 cities having over 10,000 population is shown in the table on the reverse of this sheet. Similar information for nearly 800 cities having a population over 10,000 was published on March 29, 1940, in the report, City Government Employees and Pay Rolls, January 1940: Cities of Over 10,000 Population (Quarterly Employment Survey, Vol. 1, Number 3).

Data for 23 of the cities in the present table were received after publication of the original report. In addition, supplementary or revised information for 17 cities included in the original report has been received and is included in the lower part of the table.

The aid of city officials who contributed the supplementary information on employment and pay rolls of their respective city governments for this cooperative survey is gratefully acknowledged.

Volunteer firemen and Park employees were not counted but appropriations for these functions were \$7.2 thousand and \$850 respectively. Fourteen councilmen receiving no pay are not included.
