LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE,
BUREAU OF THE CENSUS,

SIR:

I transmit herewith Volume V of the Fifteenth Census Reports on Population, entitled "General Report on Occupations." This volume presents statistics relating to the sex, color, nativity, and age of all gainful workers and to the marital condition of gainfully occupied women. The statistics on each topic are presented by occupation for the entire United States and are summarized for the United States, for the several geographic divisions and States, and for cities of 25,000 inhabitants or more. Volume V also includes statistics for the entire United States showing for each of the more important industries and for each service group—public service, professional service, and domestic and personal service—the total number of workers classified by occupation, sex, color, nativity, and age.

The census of population was taken as of April 1, 1930, in conformity with the act providing for the Fifteenth Census and for the apportionment of Representatives in Congress, approved June 18, 1929. The results of the census of population are contained in six volumes, as follows: Volume I, Number and Distribution of Inhabitants; Volume II, General Report—Statistics by Subjects; Volume III, Reports by States, Showing the Composition and Characteristics of the Population for Counties, Cities, and Townships or Other Minor Civil Divisions; Volume IV, Occupations, by States; Volume V, General Report on Occupations; Volume VI, Families. The results of the census of unemployment, which was taken in conjunction with the census of population, are contained in two volumes, as follows: Volume I, Unemployment Returns by Classes, for States, Counties, and Cities; Volume II, General Report on Unemployment.

This volume was prepared by Dr. Alba M. Edwards, under the general supervision of Dr. Leon E. Truesdell, chief statistician for population.
