
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PREFACE

This report presents statistics from the 1960 Census of Population on the social and economic characteristics of civilian Americans residing abroad on April 1, 1960. Legal provision for the 1960 Census was made in the Act of Congress of August 31, 1954 (amended August 1957), which codified Title 13 United States Code.

The major portion of the information compiled from the 1960 Census of Population appears in Volume I, Characteristics of the Population, which contains data for the United States, States and counties and their urban and rural parts, cities, minor civil divisions, etc. The present report is part of Volume III, Selected Area Reports, and is designated as PC(3)-1C. A list of the Volume III Selected Area Reports appears on the inside of the front cover. A summary description of all the final reports of the 1960 Population Census appears on page IV.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

A large number of persons participated in the various activities of the 1960 Census of Population. Primary responsibilities were exercised by many of the persons listed on the preceding page. Within the Population, Demographic Operations, Field, Geography, and Statistical Methods Divisions, most of the staff members worked on the program. FINAL REPORTS OF THE 1960 CENSUS OF POPULATION

The final reports of the 1960 Population Census are arranged in three volumes and a joint Population-Housing series of census tract reports. The 1960 Population Census publication program also includes preliminary, advance, and supplementary reports, certain evaluation, procedural, and administrative reports, and graphic summaries. After publication, copies of all reports are available for examination or purchase at any U.S. Department of Commerce Field Office.

Certain types of unpublished statistics are available for the cost of preparing a copy of the data. Also, under certain conditions, special tabulations of the 1960 Census data can be prepared on a reimbursable basis. In addition, there are available for purchase magnetic tapes and punchcards containing 1960 Census information on the characteristics of a one-in-a-thousand and a one-in-ten-thousand sample of the population of the United States. Confidentiality of the information, as required by law, has been maintained by the omission of certain identification items. Further information about any of these materials can be obtained by writing to the Chief, Population Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C., 20233.

Volume I. Characteristics of the Population. This volume consists of separate reports for the United States, each of the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and Canal Zone. For each of these 57 areas, the data were first issued in four separate paper-bound "chapters," designated as PC(1)-A, B, C, and D. (For Guam, Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and Canal Zone, the material normally contained in chapters B, C, and D are included in chapter B.) For library and general reference use, the paper-bound reports have been assembled and reissued in buckram-bound books identified as Parts A and 1 to 57 of Volume I.

Series PC(1)-1A to 57A: Chapter A. Number of Inhabitants. These reports contain final population counts for States and counties and their urban and rural parts, and for standard metropolitan statistical areas, urbanized areas, all incorporated places, unincorporated places of 1,000 inhabitants or more, and minor civil divisions.

Series PC(1)-1B to 57B: Chapter B. General Population Characteristics. These reports present statistics on sex, age, marital status, color or race, and relationship to head of household for States and counties and their urban and rural parts, and for standard metropolitan statistical areas, urbanized areas, places of 1,000 inhabitants or more, and minor civil divisions.

Series PC(1)-1C to 53C: Chapter C. General Social and Economic Characteristics. These reports cover the subjects of nativity and parentage, State of birth, country of origin of the foreign stock, mother tongue, place of residence in 1955, year moved into present house, school enrollment by level and type, years of school completed, families and their composition, fertility, veteran status, employment status, weeks worked in 1959, year last worked, occupation group, industry group, class of worker, place of work, means of transportation to work, and income of persons and families. Each subject is shown for some or all of the following areas: States and counties and their urban, rural-nonfarm, and rural-farm parts, standard metropolitan statistical areas, urbanized areas, and urban places.

Series PC(1)-1D to 53D: Chapter D. Detailed Characteristics. These reports present most of the subjects covered in chapter C, above, cross-classified by age, color, and other characteristics. There is also included additional information on families, as well as data on single years of age, detailed occupation, and detailed industry. Each subject is shown for some or all of the following areas: States and their urban, rural-nonfarm, and rural-farm parts; and large counties, cities, and standard metropolitan statistical areas.

Volume I, Part A: Number of Inhabitants. This is a compendium of the 57 chapter A reports, i.e., PC(1)-1A to 57A.

Volume I, Parts 1 to 57: Characteristics of the Population. The 57 parts relate respectively to the United States, each of the 50 States, District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and Canal Zone. Each part contains the data previously published in the four chapters A, B, C, and D, and is in the form of a separate, buckram-bound book. Parts 54, 55, 56, and 57--for Guam, Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and Canal Zone, respectively--are bound in a single book.

Volume II (Series PC(2) reports). Subject Reports. Each report in this volume concentrates on a particular subject. Detailed information and cross-relationships are generally provided on a national and regional level; in a few reports data for States or standard metropolitan statistical areas are also shown. Among the characteristics covered are ethnic origin and race, fertility, families, migration, education, employment, unemployment, occupation, industry, and income. There is also a report on the geographic distribution and characteristics of inmates of institutions.

Volume III (Series PC(3) reports). Selected Area Reports. Four of the reports in this volume present selected characteristics of the population for State economic areas, for standard metropolitan statistical areas, and according to the size and type of place where the individual resided. A fifth report provides data on the social and economic characteristics of Americans overseas. A list of reports is given on the inside of the front cover.

Series PHC(1). Census Tract Reports. These reports present information on both population and housing subjects. There is one report for each of 180 tracted areas in the United States and Puerto Rico. The population subjects include age, race, marital status, country of origin of the foreign stock, relationship to head of household, school enrollment, years of school completed, place of residence in 1955, employment status, occupation group, industry group, place of work, means of transportation to work, and income of families, as well as certain characteristics of the nonwhite population in selected tracts. The housing subjects include tenure, color of head of household, vacancy status, condition and plumbing facilities, number of rooms, number of bathrooms, number of housing units in structure, year structure built, basement, heating equipment, number of persons in unit, persons per room, year household head moved into unit, automobiles available, value of property, and gross and contract rent, as well as certain characteristics of housing units with nonwhite household head for selected tracts. In addition, for selected tracts these reports contain data on certain population and housing subjects for persons of Puerto Rican birth or parentage and for white persons with Spanish surname. (This series is the same as the tract reports listed in the publication program for the 1960 Census of Housing.)

Americans Overseas

GENERAL

This report presents statistics on the social and economic characteristics of the United States civilian population living abroad on April 1, 1960. All the data were collected on a complete-count basis. "Living abroad" is defined as residing outside the 50 States, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, and the outlying areas of the United States sovereignty or jurisdiction.¹ The population abroad includes members of the Armed Forces, Federal civilian employees, dependents of these two groups, crews of merchant vessels, and other United States citizens living abroad. Americans temporarily abroad on vacations, business trips, etc., are excluded. Although the tabulations for this report were limited to the civilian population, members of the Armed Forces were also covered in the enumeration. The Americans included in the present report are not included in the population of the United States proper, and except in a few special cases, they are not included in the tables of other reports of the 1960 Census.

Selected groups of Americans living overseas have been counted in the decennial censuses since 1900. Because of the increased number of Americans now overseas, the 1960 enumeration was extended to cover all types of Americans residing abroad, particularly those designated here as "other citizens," i.e., civilians other than Federal employees, their dependents, or crews of merchant vessels. (See table A.) Furthermore, the content of the questionnaire was expanded in order to obtain additional information on the demographic and economic characteristics of Americans abroad.

The subjects covered in this report can be grouped into two categories: (1) Items comparable to those included in the questionnaires for the United States and its areas of sovereignty or jurisdiction, namely geographic area of residence, age, sex, race, nativity, place of birth, parents' birthplace, school enrollment, educational attainment, marital status, relationship, employment status, occupation, industry, class of worker, and year last worked; and (2) items of particular interest for persons abroad, namely citizenship, year left the United States, length of intended stay, ability to speak local language, academic degrees received, years of study in a technical institute, and fields of study.

Related Reports

This report contains the major part of the published 1960 Census information on civilians overseas. Data on age, sex, color, marital status, and nativity for both the civilian population and members of the Armed Forces overseas also appear in 1960 Census of Population, Volume I, Part 1, tables 43, 45, 48, and 67. Differences between comparable figures in the two publications result mainly from minor differences in the tabulations and should not affect the validity and usefulness of either set of statistics. The 1960 Census is the first to present a separate report on the overseas population. Available data from the 1950 Census appear in 1950 Census of Population, Volume II, Part 1.

Availability of Unpublished Data

Most of the 1960 data tabulated for Americans overseas are presented in this report. The statistics on fields of study by degree, shown for the total of all areas in tables 8 and 18, have also been tabulated for each of the 6 areas shown separately in other tables. The information collected on specific country of residence and specific local language spoken has not been tabulated but has been coded, edited, and placed on the punchcards. Information for the Armed Forces on specific country of residence, race, place of birth, parents' birthplace, school enrollment, and educational attainment was not tabulated for this report but is available on punchcards.

Detailed information concerning unpublished data as well as information on data not yet tabulated can be obtained by writing to the Chief, Population Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233.

Quality of the Data

The enumeration of Americans abroad was necessarily conducted under operational conditions very different from those used in the census in the United States. As described below in the section on "Collection of data," the cooperation of several Federal agencies, as well as of a number of private organizations, was obtained, and they all participated most helpfully. The decentralized and far-flung nature of the procedure, however, prevented the utilization of most of the standard review and quality control operations used in the United States census. Where available, comparisons with other data are given below in the section on "Type of population." Particular note should be taken of the "other citizens" category which was enumerated on a voluntary basis and, therefore, was probably enumerated less completely than the other categories.

Median

The median is presented in connection with the data on age and years of school completed. It is the value which divides the distribution into two equal parts, one-half of the cases falling below this value and one-half the cases exceeding this value. In the computation of medians, cases for which the information was not reported are omitted.

TYPE OF POPULATION

The civilian population living overseas is subdivided into four groups: Federal civilian employees, dependents of Federal employees (including dependents of members of the Armed Forces), crews of merchant vessels, and "other citizens." In addition to the approximately 762,000 persons in these four civilian groups, about 610,000 members of the Armed Forces were enumerated overseas in the 1960 Census. Certain of their demographic characteristics are shown in table B; additional data appear in Part 1 of the Volume I report.

Federal Civilian Employees

American citizens 18 years old and over who reported in items 17 and 18b of Form 60PH-15 (see page XIX) that they were working as civilians for an agency of the United States Government were classified in this group. Excluded for this group are the 3,425 persons reported as working as Federal civilian employees aboard ships of the U.S. Military Sea Transport Service; they appear in the group "crews of merchant vessels;" see below. In view of the differences in definitions and methods of collection between the two sources, the count of 35,325 Federal civilian employees shown here and the figure of 33,309 provided by the U.S. Civil Service Commission can be considered as generally consistent.

Dependents of Federal Employees

Dependents consist of the spouse, child, or parent of a Federal employee (civilian or member of the Armed Forces) in the household of the employee. Parents were included only if they were citizens of the United States or reported that they had lived in the United States at some time. In those cases where the male head was a member of the Armed Forces and not

living at home, but rather on post or at sea, the wife and other family members were classified as dependents. These dependents were identified during the coding procedures on the basis of information concerning the head of the household which was requested on the front of the Form 60PH-15. These cases comprised a relatively small proportion of the dependents of members of the Armed Forces. Relatives other than spouse, child, or parent, and nonrelatives living in the household of a Federal employee were not included in the count of Americans overseas unless they individually met the qualifications for one of the population groups described here.

The count of 462,504 dependents of members of the Armed Forces shown in this report is fairly close to the March 31, 1960 figure of 460,789 published by the Department of Defense. There is no similar figure available against which to compare the census count of 40,896 dependents of Federal civilian employees.

Crews of Merchant Vessels

Civilian officers and crew members of American flag vessels at sea or berthed in a foreign port on April 1, 1960, are identified in this report as crews of merchant vessels. Included here are 3,425 persons reported as Federal civilian employees of the U.S. Military Sea Transport Service.

Because of their mobile location at the time of the census, no information on area of location was collected for merchant seamen. Also, since Form 60PH-13 was used for this group, certain subjects covered for other groups were not obtained for crews of vessels.

Other Citizens

The segment of the overseas population classified as "other citizens" includes those citizens of the United States not identified as belonging to any one of the groups defined above. Included in the group "other citizens" are such persons as private business men, contract workers on military installations, employees of foreign governments and international organizations, retired persons, missionaries and religious workers, students, and teachers.

For several reasons, the census figure of 190,701 for the "other citizens" group is likely to represent an undercount. Some number of Americans overseas probably never learned the census was being conducted; some may have known but could not readily obtain a census form to fill; and some may have chosen not to cooperate, because the census, for them, was entirely voluntary. There are at this time no direct measures of the size or composition of this group against which to evaluate the census data. The understatement may differ substantially from one area to another and from one type of person to another.

AREA OF RESIDENCE

Geographic detail on residence overseas is provided in this report for Federal civilian employees, dependents of Federal employees, and "other citizens." No detail is provided for crews of merchant vessels.

Six geographic subdivisions are used, covering the entire world excluding, by definition, the United States, Puerto Rico, and the outlying areas of U.S. sovereignty or jurisdiction. The six subdivisions are Africa, Asia, Canada and Mexico, Europe and U.S.S.R., America except Canada and Mexico, and other.

POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS

Information on the overseas population was obtained entirely by self-enumeration. The respondents filled the appropriate census forms with no assistance from census enumerators and with no instructions other than those which appear on the forms themselves. The two forms which were used (see "Collection of data," below) are reproduced on pages XIV to XIX.

The questions, where comparable, were designed to yield the same type and quality of information as were obtained in the census for the United States, in which both self-enumeration and direct interview were used. A complete discussion of the data collection procedure, definitions of items, and processing techniques for the United States census is given in 1960 Census of Population, Volume I, Part 1.

For most items, the relationship between the schedule question and the tabulated data shown in the tables is clear. For four items--age, race, marital status, and relationship, "not reported" cases were eliminated, as described in the section on "Processing of data," below. The following points pertain to those items for which some further explanation may be useful.

Age

Information on age was collected in terms of month and year of birth. The entries were transformed mechanically to age in completed years as of the census date of April 1, 1960.

Nativity

The United States population abroad was classified into two groups--(1) those born in the United States, including persons born in the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico and other outlying areas, and (2) those born outside the United States. Also included in the category "born in the U.S." is the small number of persons, who, although they were born in a foreign country or at sea, had at least one native American parent. Persons whose place of birth was not reported were classified as "born in the U.S." unless their census form contained contradictory information, such as an entry of "never lived in the U.S." Persons not classified as "born in the U.S." in accordance with this qualification were considered as "born outside the U.S." These two groups correspond, respectively, to the categories "native" and "foreign born" used in other census publications.

Birthplace of Parents

In this report, the category "both parents born in the United States" corresponds to the term "native parentage" found in other census reports, and "one or both parents born outside United States" corresponds to "foreign or mixed parentage." Under the category "one or both parents born outside the United States,"

persons with both parents born outside the United States are classified according to the place of birth of the father. Data on birthplace of parents are shown here for all persons; whereas, in other census reports, such data are shown only for native persons of foreign or mixed parentage.

Citizenship

Data on citizenship presented for the two groups of dependents--dependents of the Armed Forces and dependents of Federal civilian employees--were derived from replies to the question on citizenship on Form 60PH-15. (See page XVIII.) By definition, Federal employees and "other citizens" include only persons who are citizens of the United States. When the question on citizenship was not answered, the person was considered a citizen if he, or at least one of his parents, was born in the United States

Years of School Completed

The number in each category of highest grade of school completed represents the combination of (a) persons who reported that they had attended the indicated grade and finished it, and (b) those who had attended the next higher grade but had not finished it. In cases where the reply on completion of grade was omitted, information on school enrollment was used as the determining factor. Thus, if a person reported 4 years of high school as the highest grade attended, gave no reply on completion of grade, and marked "Yes, enrolled," the highest grade completed for that person was recorded as 3 years of high school.

Degrees and Major Fields of Study

Form 60PH-15 provided space for as many as three entries in answer to the question on degrees and major fields of study. In the tabulation of these replies, the highest degree reported, where more than one degree was reported, was the entry counted. The field of study reported in conjunction with the highest degree was considered the major field of study.

The degree classification system used in this report is based on the material presented in The American Council on Education publication--American Universities and Colleges: 1960; and the U.S. Office of Education publications--Academic Degrees: Earned and Honorary Degrees Conferred by Institutions of Higher Education in the United States, 1959 and Earned Degrees Conferred by Higher Educational Institutions, 1957-1958.

Where more than one degree was reported, the priority shown below was used in the determination of highest degree. Also shown are examples of the most frequently reported degrees in each category.

1. Doctorate (excluding Doctorate in medical sciences).--Doctor of Philosophy, Education, Social Science, Sacred Theology, and Science.

2. Doctorate in medical sciences.--Doctor of Medicine, Dental Surgery, Veterinary Medicine, Public Health, and Optometry.

3. Master's degree

a. Master's degree with specialization reported.--Business Administration, Education, Sacred Theology, Social Science, and Engineering.

b. Master of arts or science.--No specialization reported.

4. Bachelor's degree

a. Bachelor's degree with specialization reported.--Law, Divinity, Fine Arts, Education, and Business Administration.

b. Bachelor of arts or science.--No specialization reported.

5. Associate.--Associate of Arts, Accounting, Engineering, Business Administration, and Education.

6. Other.--The "other" category consists of various types of certificates, titles, awards, and degrees of Licentiate, Specialist, Fellow, etc. It includes entries such as Registered Nurse (Graduate Nurse), Certified Public Accountant, Licentiate in Theology, Educational Specialist, etc.

Both earned and honorary degrees are acceptable degree entries. Since the majority of honorary degrees given by institutions are of the Doctorate level, the classification "Doctorate (excluding medical sciences)" probably includes the majority of honorary degrees which were reported.

The classification of fields of study into the groups presented in the report was established on the basis of the classification used by the U.S. Office of Education in the report Earned Degrees Conferred by Higher Educational Institutions, 1957-58.

Study in Technical Institutes

The field of study reported is shown only for those persons who reported the number of years they had studied in a technical institute. The two U.S. Office of Education reports, Engineering Enrollments and Degrees, 1959, and Organized Occupational Curricula in Higher Education, 1958, served as a basis for deriving the fields of study classification system used in this report.

Ability to Speak Local Language

During the processing operation, the entries for specific languages were examined and coded, but tabulations of the languages reported have not been made. The data on "ability to speak local language" as shown in the detailed tables of this report pertain to a person's ability to speak any local language of his geographical area of residence.

Employment Status

Since the data on employment status relate to the calendar week prior to the date on which the respondents filled their questionnaires, the week is not the same for all respondents.

Employed persons comprise all civilians 14 years old and over who reported on Form 60PH-15 either (a) "Yes, worked full time or part time" or (b) "No, but has a job or business from which he was temporarily absent." Persons who reported "No, and has no job or business" are classified as "not employed." Thus, this category includes both the unemployed and those not in the labor force.

All members of crews of vessels were assumed to be employed, and a question on employment status was, therefore, not included in Form 60PH-13.

The category "not employed - worked since 1950" in tables 10 and 12 includes persons for whom employment status was not reported.

Occupation, Industry, and Class of Worker

For employed persons, the data on occupation, industry, and class of worker refer to the job held during the week for which employment status was reported. For persons who were not employed but had worked at some time since 1950, the data refer to the last job held.

The occupation and industry statistics presented here are based on the detailed classification systems developed for the 1960 Census; see 1960 Census of Population, Classified Index of Occupations and Industries, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., 1960. In a number of tables, the occupational detail presented differs from that shown for the United States. Some of the more frequently reported occupations are shown separately, but others are presented in combination.

The class-of-worker information refers to the same job as the occupation and industry information. The assignment of a person to a particular class-of-worker category is basically independent, however, of the occupation or industry in which he worked. In the coding operation, the category "Government agency" in item 18b on Form 60PH-15 was subdivided into Federal (U.S.), foreign government, and international organization, on the basis of the name of the "agency" reported therein. Persons reported as self-employed were included in the category "private workers".

COLLECTION OF DATA

The information for all civilians abroad, except crews of merchant vessels, was collected on the Overseas Census Report, Form 60PH-15. Crews of vessels were covered by Military and Maritime Personnel Form 60PH-13. Copies of these two forms are reproduced on pages XIV to XIX; copies of the basic forms used in the 1960 Census of the United States appear in the Volume I report.

The Department of State distributed copies of Form 60PH-15 to its embassies and consulates throughout the world, with instructions that read, in part: "The forms should be made available to all employees of the foreign service and Federal agencies and to all other known Americans, including American citizens who are employees of the United Nations." The completed forms were returned to the embassies and consulates and then shipped to the Bureau of the Census.

Many embassies and consulates enlisted the services of local newspapers to inform Americans of the census operation. Some of the major U.S. publications with overseas branches included information on the census in their foreign editions. Religious groups with missionaries stationed in foreign countries, as well as large corporations with overseas employees, informed their personnel of the census in their newspapers and other periodicals. Several religious groups also distributed census forms to their personnel.

The distribution of forms to persons living on military installations abroad, or attached thereto, was accomplished through the cooperation of the Department of Defense. Civilians as well as members of the Armed Forces were included. Appropriate numbers of copies of the forms were sent to the commanding officers, who arranged for their distribution, completion, collection, and transmittal to the Census Bureau.

The distribution of Form 60PH-13 to crews of merchant vessels was accomplished through the cooperation of the United States Maritime Administration and the operators of merchant ships under the American flag. An appropriate number of forms was sent to the master of each vessel, with instructions to have each crew member fill out a form. The completed forms were returned to the Bureau of the Census, where their count was checked against the expected number for the particular ship. Significant discrepancies in the count were reviewed with the ship operators, who explained the difference or facilitated the obtaining of missing schedules.

PROCESSING OF DATA

The desired goal of the processing operations--editing, coding, and tabulation--is to produce, within given cost factors, statistical tables that describe the population as accurately and clearly as possible. In keeping with this objective, a number of steps were taken which affected only a comparatively small proportion of the population, but which, it is believed, considerably enhanced the usefulness of the tables. For example, on the basis of other information on the questionnaire, omitted entries for age were imputed, as described below. Similarly, inconsistencies in this and other items were adjusted. It should be noted, however, that the punchcard tabulating equipment used for the overseas data excluded the more refined editing procedures possible with the electronic computers used for the United States census. In addition, minor tabulation errors which resulted in small discrepancies between corresponding items in the different tables were eliminated by adjustment, so that the user would not be inconvenienced by these minor inconsistencies.

For four items, "not reported" cases were eliminated by imputing an entry from other information on the particular form. In the case of race, an imputation of "white" was made unless contradictory evidence existed. For the other three items--relationship, marital status, and age (i.e., month and year of birth)--similar approaches were taken. To estimate a missing age, for example, the available information on relationship, school enrollment, educational attainment, employment status, etc., was used, together with the available 1950 Census age distribution for the particular type of person. Relationship and marital status could be imputed from name, age, and the roster of household members. It is recognized of course that the imputation procedure yields results which, at best, only approximate the information which was omitted.
