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HOW REVISIONS WILL BE MADE

Announcements of changes will be issued in the form of Public Bulletins as needed. By following instructions contained in these bulletins regarding additions, deletions, and substitution of new pages, the user of the Schedule will at all times have a complete and current Schedule B. When minor changes are made, the appropriate instructions for making the change will be indicated in the bulletin. Revised pages to be substituted for existing pages will be issued for major changes or when particular pages show a number of minor changes.

REVERSE SIDE OF SHIPPER'S EXPORT DECLARATION

INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE USE OF THE YELLOW SHIPPER'S EXPORT DECLARATION

(Commerce Form 7525-V)

(Follow Carefully to Avoid Delay at Shipping Point)

I. PROVISIONS OF LAW AND REGULATIONS.

(a) Vessels shall not be cleared for foreign ports until export declarations covering the cargo, or its parts have been delivered to the collector at the point of exportation by the owners, shippers, or consignors thereof. Similar provisions apply to exportations by rail, air, vehicle, or ferry.

(b) A declaration presented to a Collector of Customs or Postmaster and used to effect an exportation of any commodity for which a validated export license or a general license is required, constitutes a representation by the exporter (1) that all statements made and information set forth in the declaration have been furnished by him or on his behalf for the purpose of effecting an exportation in accordance with the export control regulations; (2) that the exportation of the commodity described in the declaration is authorized under the general or validated export license identified in the declaration; (3) that the statements contained in the declaration are identical in all respects with the contents of the validated export license, or the terms, provisions and conditions of the applicable general license; and (4) that all other terms, provisions, and conditions of the export control regulations applicable to the exportation have been met.

(c) It is unlawful under the export regulations and the export control law, in addition to the provisions of any other law, for any person, whether or not situated in the United States, knowingly to make any false or misleading representation, statement, or certification, or to falsify or conceal any material fact, whether directly to the Bureau of International Programs, the Bureau of the Census, any collector of customs, or an official of any other United States agency, or indirectly through any other person or foreign government agency or official, for the purpose of or in connection with effecting an exportation from the United States, or the reexportation, transshipment or diversion of any such exportation, or the issuance, or maintenance in effect of any document relating to export control or in the course of an investigation or other action instituted under the authority of the Export Control Act of 1949, as amended. Any person violating the provisions of law and/or the Export Control Regulations referred to herein is subject to fine of not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment for not more than 5 years, or both (Act of June 25, 1948, c. 645, 62 Stat. 749; 18 U.S.C. Sec. 1001); and/or to fine up to five times the value of the exports involved or \$20,000, whichever is greater, or imprisonment for not more than 5 years, or both (Export Control Act of 1949, as amended, Sec. 5; 63 Stat. 8; 50 U.S.C. App. Sec. 2025).

(d) Commodities which are intended to be, or are being, or have been exported in violation of the export control law and the regulations promulgated thereunder, are subject to seizure, detention, condemnation and sale under the Act of June 15, 1917, Ch. 30, Title VI, Sec. 1, 40 Stat. 223; 22 U.S.C. Sec. 401, as amended.

(e) It is a criminal offense for any person to knowingly make to the Bureau of the Census or the Bureau of International Programs any false or misleading statement or representation relating to information on the Shipper's Export Declaration, subject to a maximum penalty of \$10,000 fine or imprisonment for 5 years, or both (18 U.S.C. Sec. 1001).

(f) Shipper's export declarations must also be filed for shipments between the United States and its outlying areas.

(g) For instructions regarding the use of this form for parcel-post exportations, see current United States Postal Manual, Chapter 2. One copy of the declaration should be mailed by postmaster to Foreign Trade Branch, Economic Operations Division, Bureau of the Census, 434 Customhouse, New York 4, N.Y.

II. SHIPPER'S EXPORT DECLARATIONS (Commerce Form 7525-V).

(a) Must be made in triplicate for shipments by vessel, air, rail, car, vehicle, and ferry for all merchandise shipped to foreign countries, including Canada, where that country is not the final destination. For shipments finally destined to Canada, and between the United States and its outlying areas, the declarations must be made in duplicate. Under export control regulations, additional copies may be required by the Bureau of International Programs. (Commerce Form 7525-V should not be filed for merchandise shipped in transit through the United States from one foreign country to another. In lieu thereof, "Shipper's Export Declaration for In-transit Goods" on Commerce Form 7513 should be filed.)

(b) The exporter or his forwarding agent (duly authorized by a general power of attorney on file in the Customhouse or by specific power of attorney in item 18 of the export declaration form) or a duly authorized officer or employee of either must sign the original copy of the declaration in the space provided for signature. The name of the corporation or firm and the capacity of the signer (secretary, export manager, etc.) must be set out in the line captioned "For" in item 19. Oath is not required on the declaration, but the provisions of law and export control regulations applicable to false representations, as indicated in paragraph 1 (c) and (e), above, are fully applicable.

(c) Designation of agent must be in writing and signed by the exporter on declaration or in separate document providing similar authorization, which shall be filed with the collector. Export control regulations define a "forwarding agent" as a person authorized by a named exporter to perform for the exporter actual services which facilitate exportation of the commodities described in the declaration, such as preparing the declaration, attending to clearance of the shipment by submission of documents to the Collector of Customs or export control officers, securing cargo space or delivering the commodities to the exporting carrier, obtaining bills of lading in connection with the exportation, and attending to the formalities of consular invoices, certificates of origin, and other like documents; but such person need not be regularly engaged in the freight forwarding business.

(d) An authenticated declaration evidences the existence of a validated export license or an exportation permitted by an applicable general license. It is a violation of the export control law and regulations for any person to receive, use, alter, or assist in or permit the use or alteration of, any export declaration which has been authenticated by a Collector of Customs in connection with the exportation of any commodity under a general or validated export license, for the purpose of facilitating or effecting any exportation other than that set forth in such declaration and in accordance with the terms, provisions, and conditions thereof. Any person receiving an authenticated declaration showing evidence of unauthorized change, alteration, or amendment may not take any action to facilitate the exportation, but must report the facts to the nearest Collector of Customs and surrender the declaration to such Collector.

(e) In the case of exportations subject to the export control law and regulations, the original and two copies (or additional copies if required or authorized by export control regulations) of the declaration submitted to the Collector of Customs at the port of exit by the exporter, his named duly authorized forwarding agent (or a duly authorized officer or employee of either) will be authenticated by the Collector. The Collector will retain the original and one copy, and will return one (or more where required or authorized) authenticated copy to the exporter or such agent. One copy so returned shall be delivered by the exporter, or his agent, to the exporting carrier for attachment to the outward manifest. The additional copy or copies, when required or authorized, shall be used by the exporter in conformity with export control regulations. All copies not used shall be returned to the Collector. The statistical (manifest) copy of the declaration will be forwarded by the Collector to the Bureau of the Census. Collectors will not authenticate a declaration which has been altered, changed, or amended, except as and to the extent authorized by the export control regulations.

(f) For shipments by rail to Mexico and Canada separate declarations shall be prepared for each carload.

(g) Shipper's Export Declarations are for use solely for official purposes authorized by the Secretary of Commerce. Use for unauthorized purposes is not permitted. In accordance with the provisions of the Export Control Act (Title 50, U.S.C. App., 2026c) information from the export declarations will be published or disclosed only when the Secretary has determined that the withholding thereof is contrary to the national interest.

III. EXPLANATION OF TERMS.

ITEM 1. *United States Port of Export*.—Insert United States Customs port of exportation in terms of Schedule D, "Code Classification of Customs Districts."

ITEM 2. *Method of Transportation*.—Check whether exported by vessel (including ferry), air, or other means of transportation. If "Other," specify; i.e., rail, truck, etc.

ITEM 2a. *Exporting Carrier*.—In addition to checking the method of transportation in item 2, specify here the name of the exporting carrier. If vessel, give name of ship, flag, and number or name of pier at which the goods were laden. If air, give name of airline. If "Other" (rail, vehicle, etc.), give name of carrier and identification by number or other designation.

ITEM 3. *Exporter*.—Exporter named shall be licensee named in the validated export license or person entitled to make the exportation under applicable general license in conformity with export control regulations.

ITEM 4. *Agent of Exporter*.—State name of duly authorized forwarding agent of named exporter. See paragraph II (c).

ITEM 5. *Ultimate Consignee*.—Ultimate consignee (whether by sale in U.S. or abroad, or by consignment) shall be person named as ultimate consignee in validated export license or authorized to be ultimate consignee under applicable general license in conformity with export control regulations.

ITEM 6. *Intermediate Consignee*.—Intermediate consignee shall be person named as such in validated export license or authorized to act as such under applicable general license and in conformity with export control regulations. If none, state "none." Intermediate consignee should be inserted if known at time of authentication.

ITEM 7. *Foreign Port of Unloading*.—Foreign port of unloading (i.e., foreign port at which the merchandise will be unladen, from the exporting carrier specified in item 2a) should be shown for vessel and air shipments only.

ITEM 8. *Place and Country of Ultimate Destination*.—The final place and country of destination, not the place of transshipment, should be shown in the space provided for "Place and Country of Ultimate Destination." Special care should be taken to give the final place and country of destination for goods shipped through Canada, United Kingdom, Canal Zone, Chile, Peru, or other seaboard countries for transshipment to other countries, such as through Chile or Peru, destined for Bolivia.

IV. DESCRIPTION OF ARTICLES, QUANTITIES, AND VALUES.

COLUMN 9.—Insert marks and numbers.

COLUMN 10.—Insert number and kinds of packages, description of commodities, export license number, and expiration date, or general license symbol. Commodities must be described by nature and quantity in sufficient detail to permit verification of the Schedule B commodity numbers assigned. The description of the articles must be definite and complete, preferably the common commercial name of the specific article, and must conform with that set forth in the validated export license or with the requirements of the applicable general license. General terms such as "dry goods," "groceries," "meats," etc., are not sufficient. Catalog numbers or other characteristic trade identifications should be used where they will add such description. Identification by trademark or brand name should be avoided where possible.

COLUMN 11.—Insert gross weight in pounds for vessel and air shipments only.

COLUMN 12.—Specify whether of domestic or foreign origin. Exports of domestic merchandise include commodities which are the growth, produce, or manufacture of the United States. Exports of foreign merchandise include commodities of foreign origin which entered the United States as imports, and which, at the time of exportation, are in the same condition as when imported. Commodities of foreign origin which have been changed in the United States from the form in which they were imported, or which have been enhanced in value by further manufacture in the United States, are considered as "domestic" commodities.

The above definition of the distinction between domestic and foreign merchandise is intended only for use in reporting column (12) on this export declaration and is intended for statistical purposes only.

COLUMN 13.—Insert the Schedule B commodity code number. (See Instruction VII (a) below.)

COLUMN 14.—Insert the net quantity in Schedule B unit. State the unit of quantity shown; i.e., pounds, square yards, etc.

COLUMN 15.—Insert the dollar value at time and place (U.S. port) of export (omit cents figures). Value stated should be the selling price, or cost if not sold, including inland freight, insurance, and other charges to border point, seaport, or exporting airport. Ocean freight, marine insurance, and other charges incurred beyond the U.S. port of exportation should be excluded.

ITEM 16.—For convenience of exporter, to be inserted if desired.

ITEM 17.—To be inserted by Collector of Customs.

V. SIGNATURES.

ITEMS 18 and 19.—See paragraphs II (b) and II (c) of these instructions.

VI. FOREIGN COMMERCE STATISTICAL REGULATIONS—EXPORT CONTROL REGULATIONS.

For more detailed information regarding the preparation of the export declaration, refer to the Regulations for Collection of Statistics of Foreign Commerce and Navigation of the United States (Title 15, Ch. I, Part 30, Code of Federal Regulations), copies of which may be purchased from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D.C. Information concerning export control law and regulations may be obtained from the Bureau of International Programs, Washington 25, D.C., or from the Department of Commerce Field Offices.

VII. SCHEDULE B AND BLANKS.

(a) Schedule B, Statistical Classification of Domestic and Foreign Commodities Exported from the United States, may be purchased from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D.C., local Collectors of Customs, and the Department of Commerce Field Offices.

(b) Shipper's Export Declaration blanks may be purchased from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D.C., local Collectors of Customs, and Department of Commerce Field Offices located in principal cities. They may be printed by private parties provided they conform to the official form in size, wording, color, and quality (weight) of paper stock, and arrangement. An authenticated Shipper's Export Declaration may not be reproduced in any form.

CORRECT WAY TO FILL OUT THE SHIPPER'S EXPORT DECLARATION

1. WHAT IS THE SHIPPER'S EXPORT DECLARATION?

The Shipper's Export Declaration is a joint Bureau of the Census--Bureau of International Commerce form, which is used for compiling official U.S. export statistics and for enforcing U.S. export control laws.

The basic Shipper's Export Declaration (Commerce Form 7525-V) is illustrated on pages V and VI. There is also available a Shipper's Export Declaration (Commerce Form 7525-V-Alternate) which is a variation of the basic Shipper's Export Declaration designed for simultaneous preparation with various other shipping documents commonly used, such as the dock receipt and the short form bill of lading. Commerce Form 7525-V-Alternate can be used in lieu of the regular Form 7525-V without limitation.

A Shipper's Summary Export Declaration (Commerce Form 7525-M) is available for use by shippers who meet certain criteria and are authorized to report export information on a monthly basis in lieu of filing individual Shipper's Export Declarations (Commerce Form 7525-V or 7525-V-Alternate) for each shipment. Continuation Sheets are available for use as second and succeeding pages for Commerce Forms 7525-V and 7525-V-Alternate when needed.

These instructions are specifically tailored to the preparation of the regular Shipper's Export Declaration, Commerce Form 7525-V, illustrated on pages V and VI. However, the instructions and explanations are equally applicable to the corresponding items on all of the Shipper's Export Declaration forms.

2. WHEN IS THE SHIPPER'S EXPORT DECLARATION REQUIRED?

The Shipper's Export Declaration must be filed for all commodities, unless specifically exempt, shipped to foreign countries or areas from the United States, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands of the United States, as well as for shipments between the United States and Puerto Rico, and for shipments to American Samoa and the Virgin Islands of the United States from the United States and Puerto Rico, regardless of the method of transportation. Shipper's Export Declarations are not required for shipments from the United States or Puerto Rico to the United States possessions, except for shipments to American Samoa and the Virgin Islands of the United States. (In particular cases, special arrangements can sometimes be made for the furnishing of statistical data on computer tapes or punch-cards, in lieu of filing individual Shipper's Export Declarations for each shipment.) See item 22 for a list of the most common exemptions from Shipper's Export Declaration filing requirements.

3. WHO SHOULD PREPARE AND SIGN THE SHIPPER'S EXPORT DECLARATION?

The Shipper's Export Declaration must be prepared and signed by the shipper, owner, or consignee, or his properly authorized agent. For shipments to foreign

countries if the Shipper's Export Declaration is prepared by an agent, his authority to sign such declaration must be in the form of a properly executed power-of-attorney signed by the shipper, owner, or consignee, on file in the agent's office and available on demand, or in the less formal written authorization printed on the export declaration form.

The Shipper's Export Declaration should be type-written or prepared in ink or other permanent medium (except indelible pencil). Duplicating processes, such as ditto and hectograph, as well as the overprinting of selected items of information, are acceptable. The signature may be executed in ink or by signature stamp.

4. HOW MANY COPIES OF THE SHIPPER'S EXPORT DECLARATION SHOULD BE PREPARED?

Except as otherwise provided by the Foreign Trade Statistics Regulations, three copies of the Shipper's Export Declaration are required for shipments to all foreign countries, except Canada, and for shipments through Canada destined to a third country; two copies are required for shipments to Canada and to nonforeign areas; only one copy is required for shipments by mail to all destinations. Additional copies in some cases may be required for export control purposes.

5. HOW SHOULD METHOD OF TRANSPORTATION BE DESIGNATED IN ITEM 2?

Check the appropriate box to indicate whether the shipment is being exported by vessel (including ferry), air, or other means of transportation. If "Other," specify; i.e., "rail," "truck," etc. "Other" should be checked for exported aircraft being flown away, vessels exported under their own power or afloat, or for other vehicles exported other than aboard another carrier, and the manner in which exported should be specified, e.g., "flown away," "in tow," etc.

6. WHAT SHOULD BE ENTERED AS THE PORT OF EXPORT IN ITEM 1?

The Customs port at which the land carrier crosses the border into foreign territory or where the exporting vessel or aircraft is loaded with the cargo covered by the specific export declaration is the port of export for statistical purposes and must be entered on the Shipper's Export Declaration in terms of the current edition of Schedule D, Classification of U.S. Customs Districts and Ports, except that for postal shipments, the name of the post office where the package is mailed should be inserted.

7. HOW SHOULD THE EXPORTING CARRIER BE DESIGNATED IN ITEM 2a?

The following details must be given according to the type of exporting carrier: (a) the name and flag of the vessel and number or name of the pier at which the goods are laden for shipments by vessel; (b) the name of the airline for shipments by air; and (c) the name and number, or other available designation, for shipments other than by vessel or air.

8. WHAT DETERMINES THE NAMES OF THE EXPORTER, AGENT, CONSIGNEE, ETC.?

The exporter named shall be the licensee named in the validated export license or person entitled to make the exportation under applicable general license in conformity with export control regulations. Similarly the intermediate and ultimate consignees shall be the persons named as such in the validated export license or authorized to act as such under applicable general license in conformity with export control regulations. If the exporter has duly authorized an agent to prepare the Shipper's Export Declaration and/or to perform other services which facilitate exportation of the commodities described in the declaration, the name and address of such agent should be shown.

9. WHAT IS TO BE SHOWN AS FOREIGN PORT OF UNLOADING IN ITEM 7?¹

The foreign port and country at which the merchandise will be unladen from the exporting carrier should be shown in this space for vessel and air shipments only.

10. WHAT SHOULD BE ENTERED AS THE COUNTRY OF DESTINATION IN ITEM 8?¹

In general, the final place and country of ultimate destination as known to the exporter at the time of shipment must be reported in terms of the current edition of Schedule C, Classification of Country Designations For United States Foreign Trade Statistics. The "country of destination" is the country in which the goods are to be consumed or further processed or manufactured. If the ultimate destination of the goods is not known, the last known country to which the goods are being shipped in their present form should be shown.

For vessels or carriers sold foreign, the country of new ownership is to be entered as the country of destination.

11. WHAT MARKS AND NUMBERS SHOULD BE SHOWN IN COLUMN (9)?

For purposes of identification of the Shipper's Export Declaration with the merchandise it covers, the marks, numbers, or other identification on the packages should be inserted.

12. HOW SHOULD MERCHANDISE BE DESCRIBED IN COLUMN (10)?¹

The merchandise must be described in sufficient detail to permit the verification of the Schedule B commodity number, as provided in the current edition of Schedule B, Statistical Classification of Domestic and Foreign Commodities Exported from the United States. The name of the commodity, in terms which can be identified or associated with the language used in Schedule B (usually the commercial name of the commodity), and any and all characteristics of the commodity which distinguish it from commodities of the same name covered by other Schedule B classifications shall be clearly and fully stated. Careful reference to the Schedule B classification scheme, for related commodities as well as for the commodity being shipped, is necessary in order

It is particularly important that the Foreign Trade Statistics Regulations and the Export Control Regulations be consulted for more complete treatment of these items.

to establish which particular characteristics must be stated in the description to permit verification of the correct Schedule B commodity number, and to eliminate any question that some other commodity number might apply. The assignment of the Schedule B number is a separate requirement, and the furnishing of the correct Schedule B commodity number does not relieve the exporter of furnishing, in addition, a complete and accurate commodity description in accordance with this requirement. If the shipment is moving under a validated license, the description shown on the export declaration shall conform with that shown on the validated export license. However, where the description on the license does not state all of the characteristics of the commodity which are needed to completely verify the commodity number, as described above, the missing characteristics, as well as the description shown on the license, shall be stated in the commodity description on the Shipper's Export Declaration.

13. HOW SHOULD SHIPPING WEIGHT BE SHOWN IN COLUMN (11)?

The gross shipping weight in pounds, including the weight of immediate containers, should be shown for all shipments by vessel and air. If gross shipping weight information is not available for each individual Schedule B item for the reason that commodities covered by more than one Schedule B number are contained in the same package, approximate weights, estimated as accurately as is practicable should be shown for each Schedule B item in the package.

14. WHAT IS MEANT BY "D" OR "F" IN COLUMN (12)?

Foreign goods must be shown separately from goods of domestic production, and for this purpose, domestic merchandise is identified by the designation "D" and foreign merchandise by "F."

Exports of foreign merchandise include those commodities which are the growth, produce, or manufacture of foreign countries, which entered the United States as imports and which at the time of exportation have undergone no change in form or condition or enhancement in value by further manufacture in the United States, Puerto Rico, or the Possessions.

Exports of domestic merchandise include those commodities which are the growth, produce, or manufacture of the United States, Puerto Rico, or the Possessions (including commodities incorporating foreign components), and those articles of foreign origin which have been enhanced in value or changed from the form in which imported by further manufacture or processing in the United States, Puerto Rico, or the Possessions.

15. HOW CAN THE SCHEDULE B COMMODITY NUMBER BE OBTAINED?

Consult the current edition of Schedule B, Statistical Classification of Domestic and Foreign Commodities Exported from the United States. Directions for locating the correct Schedule B commodity number will be found in the introduction to Schedule B. Shippers may also consult their local Customs Director, Department of Commerce field offices (located in principal cities), or write to the Foreign Trade Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233, for assistance in determining the correct Schedule B commodity numbers for their shipments. Schedule B may be purchased from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office,

Washington, D.C. 20402, or from Department of Commerce field offices. Local Customs Directors may also stock copies of Schedule B for sale.

16. HOW SHOULD NET QUANTITY BE SHOWN IN COLUMN (14)?

Consult the current edition of Schedule B (see question 15). Where a unit of quantity is specified in Schedule B for the commodity number in which the item is classified, net quantity exported must be reported in the specified unit, and the unit in which reported should be indicated following the net quantity figure. If no unit of quantity is specified in Schedule B for a numbered classification, but a validated export license for the item specifies a unit of quantity, the net quantity should be reported on the declaration in terms of the unit of quantity specified in the validated export license. In stating quantities, fractions (including decimals) of less than one-half should be ignored, and fractions of one-half or over should be considered a whole unit. Where neither Schedule B nor an applicable validated license requires a unit of quantity for the item, net quantity should not be shown, and a dash "--" should be entered in the "net quantity" column.

17. HOW SHOULD VALUE BE SHOWN IN COLUMN (15)?¹

A separate value must be given for each item requiring a separate Schedule B commodity number (except for a few commodity numbers for which Schedule B specifically requires quantity only), or each group of items bearing the same commodity number. The dollar value at U.S. port of export should be given. This value should be the selling price, or cost if not sold, including inland freight, insurance, and other charges to border point or seaport. It should not include freight, insurance, or other charges incurred beyond the U.S. port of exportation.

Where exact information as to the amount of inland freight charges, etc., is not available, estimates are acceptable. Inland freight charges, etc., should not be shown separately on the declaration, but should be reflected, together with the selling price (or cost, if not sold), in a single value figure entered in column (15) as described above. In stating values, fractions of less than one-half dollar should be ignored, and fractions of one-half dollar or over should be stated as a whole dollar. Cent figures should be omitted.

18. WHAT SHOULD BE ENTERED AS THE DATE OF EXPORTATION?

Information as to date of exportation, when required, will be entered by Customs Directors.

19. WHAT SHOULD BE DONE WITH THE SHIPPER'S EXPORT DECLARATION WHEN COMPLETED?

Unless otherwise provided in the regulations of the Census Bureau and the Office of Export Control, the Shipper's Export Declaration in the required number of

It is particularly important that the Foreign Trade Statistics Regulations and the Export Control Regulations be consulted for more complete treatment of these items.

copies should be presented in person by the exporter or his authorized agent to the Customs Director at the U.S. port of export prior to loading of the merchandise. (For shipments by mail, the declaration should be filed with the postmaster at the time of mailing.) For shipments from an interior point, the declaration, prepared and signed by the exporter or his agent, may be given to the carrier for presentation to Customs at the port of export.

20. HOW SHOULD CORRECTIONS BE MADE?

Corrections, amendments, or cancellations of data reported on Shipper's Export Declarations should be effected by means of the Shipper's Export Declaration Correction Form (available free from Customs Directors) which must be filed with the Customs Director or the Postmaster where the declaration was originally presented.

21. WHERE CAN THE SHIPPER'S EXPORT DECLARATION FORMS BE OBTAINED?

The regular declaration and its continuation sheet can be purchased for a nominal price from Customs Directors, Department of Commerce field offices, or the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. The alternate form and its continuation sheet must be privately printed; free samples are available from the Foreign Trade Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233. Any of the Shipper's Export Declaration forms may be privately printed provided they conform strictly to the official form in size, wording, color, quality (weight) of paper stock, and arrangement, including the instructions on the reverse side.

22. WHAT ARE SOME OF THE KINDS OF SHIPMENTS FOR WHICH SHIPPER'S EXPORT DECLARATIONS NEED NOT BE FILED?¹

Shipper's Export Declarations are generally required for all shipments unless specifically exempt. (See question 2.) A partial list of the kinds of shipments for which Shipper's Export Declarations are not required when such shipments are not moving under a validated export license is shown below:

- a. Shipments by mail where either the shipper or the addressee is not a business concern.
- b. Shipments by mail valued \$250 or under.
- c. Shipments of technical data by mail (regardless of whether or not a validated export license is required).
- d. Shipments by mail where the goods are not exported for commercial consideration.
- e. Shipments by mail of catalogs, instruction books, and other advertising matter, or of newspapers, magazines, and periodicals.
- f. Shipments of diplomatic pouches and their contents.
- g. Shipments of human remains and accompanying appropriate receptacles and flowers.
- h. Shipments from one point in the United States to another point thereof by routes passing through Canada or Mexico, and shipments from one point in Canada or Mexico to another point thereof by routes passing through the United States.
- i. Shipments of baggage, personal effects, and tools of trade, of persons leaving the United States, provided such

baggage, personal effects, and tools of trade (i) include only such articles as are owned by such person or member of his immediate family; (ii) shall be in his possession at the time of or prior to his departure from the United States; (iii) are necessary and appropriate and intended for the personal use of such person or his immediate family; and (iv) are not intended for sale, and provided further that such baggage, personal effects, and tools of trade are not moving as cargo under a bill of lading.

j. Shipments of all commodities, whether shipped commercially or through government channels, consigned to the United States armed services, including shipments to armed services exchange systems.

k. Shipments encompassed by Office of Export Control General License GIFT.

l. Shipments between the United States and Puerto Rico, to the U.S. Possessions, and to all countries except countries included in country groups S, W, Y, and Z as defined in the export control regulations of the Office of Export Control² where the value of the commodities classified under a single Schedule B number and shipped on the same exporting carrier from one exporter to one importer is valued \$250 or under.

²The following countries, as listed in Schedule C, comprise country groups S, W, Y, and Z, as defined in the export control regulations: Southern Rhodesia, Poland, Romania, Albania, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, East Germany, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Outer Mongolia, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, China (Mainland), North Korea, North Vietnam, and Cuba.

23. HOW CAN I FIND THE ANSWERS TO ANY FURTHER QUESTIONS I MAY HAVE ON SHIPPER'S EXPORT DECLARATIONS?

The reverse side of the Shipper's Export Declaration, reproduced on page VI, contains additional instructions. For further information, consult your local Customs Director or Department of Commerce field office. The Foreign Trade Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233, will also be able to answer any inquiries. Complete information regarding Census (statistical) requirements for the preparation and filing of the Shipper's Export Declaration is contained in the Foreign Trade Statistics Regulations, (issued under the authority of Chapter 9 of Title 13, United States Code) (76 Stat. 951) which may be purchased from the Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233. Copies of the "Correct Way to Fill Out the Shipper's Export Declaration" may be obtained free of charge from Customs Directors, Department of Commerce Field Offices, or the Foreign Trade Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233.

24. COMPLIANCE WITH EXPORT CONTROL REGULATIONS.

In preparing and filing export declarations, shippers must comply with all pertinent regulations published in the Export Control Regulations of the Bureau of International Commerce. Information concerning export control regulations may be obtained from the Bureau of International Commerce, Washington, D.C. 20230, or from the Department of Commerce field offices.

INTRODUCTION

This schedule supersedes the January 1, 1965 edition of Schedule B as the official schedule of commodity classifications to be used by shippers in reporting their export shipments from the United States and for use in compiling and reporting the official statistics on exports of merchandise from the United States, effective January 1, 1971.

This edition of Schedule B includes all revisions to the 1965 edition previously announced in Public Bulletins B-1 through B-7. The basic outline and arrangement of this schedule is the same as that used in the 1965 edition. However, numerous changes have been made by the addition, deletion, or revision of headnotes, directives, and individual inclusion item listings and by the rewording of commodity descriptions. These changes were introduced primarily to more clearly define the coverage of the individual Schedule B numbers. In addition, the procedure for reporting net quantity information for commodities requiring quantity to be furnished in two units has been changed. In such cases the commodity description includes instructions on how to report both quantities. (For additional information, see the section of this Introduction entitled Double Units of Quantity.) The format of the alphabetic index also has been revised to show the first five digits of the 7-digit commodity code for each indexed item. (In the 1965 edition, the page number on which the Schedule B classification could be found was shown.) Although the alphabetic index in this edition shows a 5-digit code, *exporters are still required to report commodity information on export declarations in terms of the full 7-digit Schedule B codes.* For additional information regarding the use of the index, see the section of this Introduction entitled "Locating Correct Commodity Number."

THE SCHEDULE B CLASSIFICATION SYSTEM

Beginning with the 1965 edition, and continuing with this edition, the Schedule B classification system was designed to provide detailed classifications or "building blocks" which permit rearrangement of the U.S. export statistics for comparison with the foreign trade statistics of other countries as well as with data on domestic production. The *Standard International Trade Classification, Revised* (published by the United Nations as Statistical Papers--Series M, No. 34 and Series M, No. 38) is the general structure within which Schedule B is cast. In line with the "building blocks" concept, additional classifications are also included to meet United States trade needs and to provide greater comparability with domestic production statistics based on the *Standard Industrial Classification* (as revised effective January 1, 1967).

As in the case of the *Standard International Trade Classification, Revised (SITC)*, the 1971 edition of Schedule B consists of 10 major sections, 56 divisions, and 177 groups. The approximately 4,000 detailed commodity numbers in Schedule B are 7-digit codes. With one exception,¹ the first three digits of the 7-digit Schedule B codes are the same as the SITC 1-digit

section, 2-digit division, and 3-digit group codes. At the 1-, 2-, and 3-digit levels, therefore, the numbering system of Schedule B is essentially the same as the SITC.

The SITC at the most detailed level (5-digit) represents the base from which the classifications in Schedule B were developed. The 5-digit SITC classifications are used as such, or adapted to reflect United States export trade characteristics. The modifications of the SITC for this purpose have been made in such a way as to facilitate conversion of the data to the commodity classifications used for presenting data on domestic output based on the *Standard Industrial Classification*.

The 7-digit codes in Schedule B were derived from the SITC by:

- (a) adopting 5-digit SITC codes without adjustment;
- (b) adopting 5-digit SITC codes and making breakdowns to more detailed classifications within the original 5-digit SITC;
- (c) combining 5-digit SITC codes without further breakdowns; and;
- (d) combining 5-digit SITC codes, and then making breakdowns to more detailed classifications within the SITC combinations.

Over two-thirds of the 1,312 5-digit classifications in the SITC fall in (a) and (b) above. The Schedule B classifications are essentially comparable to the SITC in these cases. Since two or more 7-digit classifications in Schedule B may have the same first five digits (the SITC item number), it is the sum of the coverage of all of the 7-digit classifications having the same first five digits which is comparable to the coverage of the 5-digit SITC item number. However, because of adjustments which were required to be made in devising the Schedule B classifications, at the 5-digit level of classification there are some differences between the codes in the SITC and those in Schedule B. A table entitled "Principal Differences Between Schedule B and the SITC in Terms of the First Five Digits of Schedule B" is included in this schedule.

The Schedule B commodity classifications are also rearranged and grouped into product categories based on the *Standard Industrial Classification (SIC)*, and into "end-use" commodity categories for certain reports. Correlations between Schedule B numbers and the SIC and end-use codes are contained in the publication *U.S. Foreign Trade Statistics Classifications and Cross-Classifications*.

REPORTING REQUIREMENTS AND DIRECTIONS FOR LOCATING CORRECT COMMODITY CLASSIFICATION

Statistical Requirement for Reporting Information on Shipper's Export Declarations

In preparing Shipper's Export Declarations for merchandise exported from the United States, it is the exporter's responsibility to insert the Schedule B commodity number for the item(s) being shipped. The number is

obtained by locating in Schedule B the individually numbered classification under which the item is correctly classified. (See "Locating Correct Commodity Number" below.) A facsimile of the export declaration form and questions and answers on the "Correct Way to Fill Out the Shipper's Export Declaration" are given on other introductory pages of this publication.

Locating Correct Commodity Number

The listing of section and division descriptions which appears preceding the detailed classifications in this schedule may provide an indication of the section, division, or group in which the 7-digit commodity code for a particular item may be found. To further assist in locating this 7-digit code, an alphabetical index is included in this schedule. This index gives the first five digits of the applicable 7-digit commodity code for the listed item. Although only the first five digits of the commodity code are shown in the index, *the complete 7-digit code must be reported on the export declaration.*

In using the alphabetic index to help locate the correct 7-digit code, look first for a listing of the *noun* in the name of the commodity, unless the noun is one which you would not normally expect to find in an index. Listings are provided for general nouns, such as "outer garments," as well as for specific ones, such as "dresses," but it is usually better to look first for the specific noun and to refer to the general noun only if the specific one is not listed. Some nouns may appear in the index in both the singular and plural forms, and the two forms may be separated by other listings which fall between them in the alphabetic arrangement of items. Therefore, *it may be necessary to look for both the singular and plural forms of a noun* in order to locate a particular item in the index. If no listing is located for either the specific noun or any of the general nouns which cover the commodity, then look in the index for the principal adjective(s) which describe the item.

When a listing for the item to be classified is found in the index, refer to the Schedule B pages where the first five digits of the 7-digit Schedule B number(s) are the same as the 5-digit number shown in the index for the item. First, read the section titles at the top of the applicable pages and any major headings on the pages. Then, read the commodity descriptions for the detailed 7-digit classifications (where the first five digits of the 7-digit code match those given for the indexed item) until you locate the correct classification. *Do not assume that you have found the correct Schedule B number when it appears that you have found your item among the specific listings.* The same listing can appear under more than one commodity number. You should also read the descriptions for neighboring Schedule B numbers after it appears that the correct number has been found, because there may be only slight differences between the items covered by the individual Schedule B numbers. For some classifications, inclusion items are shown as adjectives with corresponding words (often nouns) from the related commodity description being omitted. For example, under Schedule B number 047.0100, "Cereal flours, except flour of wheat and meslin," listings such as "barley," "corn," and "rice" appear as examples of the types of flour covered by this classification. When interpreted in conjunction with the commodity description, these listings should be read as "barley flour," "corn flour," and "rice flour."

This method of listing the inclusion items was used to expedite scanning of the items by users of Schedule B to enable them to more quickly locate the correct Schedule B numbers for their commodities.

In many cases, directives (in italics) are provided either following the classification description or in the headings. Particular attention should be given to these directives which frequently provide a guide to the correct commodity number if the one which you located is not the right one.

The index is intended solely as an aid to assist users in locating the section in Schedule B where the detailed 7-digit classification which covers the item being classified may be found. Failure to find an item clearly reflected in the index does not relieve the shipper of responsibility for locating the Schedule B number which is correct for the item he is reporting.

Items Not Specifically Listed

If the item to be classified is a part of a piece of machinery or equipment, read the explanation given below under the heading "Parts". If it is not a machinery or equipment part, and cannot be readily located in the index by the method described above, a further effort should be made to locate a listing under which the item would be included. The index should be examined to locate other names for the item, if there are any, or names of related items, or the names of general types of commodities which would cover the item to be classified, including the classes for the material of which it is chiefly made. If no classification can be found under which the item is specifically listed, it should be classified under the most specific number which can be located after a careful review has been made of all possible classifications which might apply.

The listings of individual items included within a given Schedule B classification are not intended to be complete or exhaustive. Also, some listings of items which were included in the previous edition of Schedule B may not appear in this new edition since many inclusion items which were considered as being redundant were deleted. Therefore, it is emphasized that items not listed by name in the schedule are to be classified under the most specific Schedule B number which includes them in its description.

"N.E.C." (Not Elsewhere Classified) Commodity Numbers

If a specific Schedule B number has been located under which the commodity being classified will otherwise fit but the description carries the limitation "n.e.c." (not elsewhere classified), the commodity number should not be used until a check has been made to determine whether there is a classification elsewhere into which the item will fit more specifically. Other classifications under the same general heading should be examined and, by referring again to the index, it may be possible to locate a classification elsewhere which will cover the item more specifically. It is necessary to make a further search even if the item is listed by name under a Schedule B number which appears to cover it but bears the "n.e.c." limitation. In other words, although "n.e.c." appears only in the description for the commodity number, it should be considered as being applicable to any item listed under the classification.

CLASSIFICATION PRINCIPLES AND CONCEPTS

Mixed Materials

The material of which items are made is, in many instances, one of the factors in determining their correct classification. This is true of textile fabrics and manufactures, and many finished items which are made, for example, sometimes of wood, sometimes of plastic materials, and sometimes of metal. When such items are made of mixed materials, they are to be classified according to the material of which they are *chiefly* made. In the case of fabrics and all textile materials, as well as some other articles, the determination is usually to be made on the basis of the material of *chief weight*. However, fabrics consisting of blends and mixtures which are by *weight* 50 percent of one fiber and 50 percent of another fiber are classified according to the fiber of the greater *value*.

Alloys of base metals are classified with the metal which predominates by weight with the exception of alloys containing more than 10 percent of nickel. Alloys containing more than 10 percent of nickel should be reported as nickel alloys except where the alloy is considered to be alloy steel (i.e., where iron predominates by weight). Alloys of base metal with precious metals are classified as precious metal alloys if the precious metal (gold, silver, or platinum group metals) constitutes 2 percent or more by weight of the alloy. For additional criteria in determining steel grade and product classifications, see pages XXXI-XXXIII.

Wherever practical, directives have been inserted on the appropriate pages of the schedule with regard to items of mixed materials. The index to the schedule does not usually list the various possible combinations of mixed materials of which an item may be made, but the user should refer to the 5-digit number or numbers given in the index for material of which the item is chiefly made.

Used or Secondhand Items

When classifying a used or secondhand item, reference should be made to the index to find the Schedule B number which covers the item by name. When this classification has been located in the schedule, it may specify "new." In that event, nearby classifications and directives should be reviewed to locate the classification which indicates "used." If the classification does not specify "new" and if no directive can be found which tells where "used" or "secondhand" items are to be reported, the used or secondhand item should be reported under the same Schedule B number as the new.

Parts

All exportations of complete units of machinery, equipment, or other commodities, whether shipped as assembled units or as unassembled parts, and shipments of articles which are almost complete (i.e., sufficient parts are being exported so that the main essential features of the article are fulfilled) should be reported under the classification for the complete article. However, the reporting of some shipments of motor vehicles (codes 732.0110-732.9200) represents an exception to this general rule. The commodity

descriptions and directives for the commodity numbers in this group indicate how such shipments should be reported.

In general, shipments of parts not constituting complete units (a) where the parts themselves do not constitute a commodity covered by a specific classification, and (b) where the parts are clearly identifiable for use with a particular machine or apparatus, should be reported under the separate parts classification for the particular machine or apparatus when such a separate parts classification is provided. In some instances this separate parts classification may be included in a different 5-digit number area in Schedule B than the machine or apparatus. For example, metalworking machine tools are classified under Schedule B numbers 715.1002-715.1088, whereas the parts for these machine tools are classified under Schedule B numbers 719.5420-719.5450.

If a separate parts classification is not provided, such parts should be reported under the same classification as the particular machine or apparatus. If the parts in themselves constitute a commodity covered by a particular classification, they should be reported under their own appropriate classification even if especially designed as part of a specific machine or apparatus. For instance, roller bearings for electric locomotives, if they are separately consigned, should be reported as "roller bearings" with the appropriate 7-digit number provided for such bearings under code 719.7030-719.7060 if unmounted or code 719.9310 if mounted, and not as parts of railway locomotives. Similarly, exports of steam generating power boilers, when shipped as a separate transaction, should be reported under the appropriate number provided for such boilers under codes 711.1010-711.1050, even though the boilers may be clearly constructed to form an integral part of a particular machine or vehicle.

An exception to the above rules is made in some cases when parts are shipped for use on a particular type of machine or piece of equipment and some of the parts in themselves constitute a commodity for which a separate classification is provided while others are classifiable under the general "parts" classification for the particular machine or piece of equipment. In such cases, it is permissible to report the items which in themselves constitute a commodity covered by a separate classification with the commodities classifiable under the general "parts" classification for the particular machine or piece of equipment, provided the following two conditions are met:

1. The items for which an exception is desired do not require a validated license for exportation to the intended destination (see *Department of Commerce Export Control Regulations*), and
2. The value of all such items normally classifiable under one Schedule B number is less than \$1,500 and less than 5 percent of the total value of the shipment or the value of such items is less than \$251 irrespective of the total value of the shipment.

When reporting exports of parts of machinery or other commodities, all possible classifications should be considered and the major headings and directives as well as the descriptions for such classifications should be carefully reviewed before a decision is made regarding the 7-digit code to be used.

Scrap

Machines, equipment, vehicles or apparatus, or parts or accessories for such articles, should be described and classified as scrap on export declarations when they are being sold or shipped as scrap metal or when the known direct end use abroad is for scrapping (remelting for use in new production). This rule applies whether the physical characteristics or method of packaging identifies the items as scrap, or whether the items being shipped are in their original form or substantially their original form. The nature of the transaction as it is understood by the exporter and as reflected in the commercial documents covering the transaction is the basic criterion in classifying such shipments as scrap.

The description on the export declaration, in addition to identifying the shipment as scrap, should specify the metal of which the item is made, and the Schedule B number for the appropriate classification for scrap of that metal should be shown. (Note that ships, boats, and other vessels for scrapping are classified under Schedule B number 735.8000.)

Military-Type Equipment

In the case of some commodities (notably clothing) items of a military type are classified separately from similar items which are other than military. However, in many cases military-type items are not classified separately but are included in the same classifications with shipments of the same commodity for other uses. Shippers of military-type items may find some of them covered by listings in the index which indicate "military." For military-type items not so listed, locate the Schedule B number which covers the item by name. If there is no directive in the area where that Schedule B number appears giving information as to the Schedule B number for military-type items, the military shipment is to be included under the Schedule B number which covers the commodity by name. (For purposes of Schedule B classification, "military" means manufactured to military specifications.)

Commodities Donated for Relief or Charity by Individuals or Private Agencies

Separate classifications are provided in the schedule for exports of certain commodities donated for relief or charity by individuals or private agencies. In general, such classifications are provided for those commodities which are known to be, or are likely to be, exported for relief or charity in fairly sizeable amounts. The classes which are provided for shipments of this type are as follows:

- 022.2030 - Nonfat dry milk
- 023.0010 - Butter
- 023.0030 - Anhydrous milk fat
- 024.0010 - Cheese and curd
- 041.0010 - Unmilled wheat, including spelt or meslin
- 042.2010 - Milled rice

- 046.0110 - Wheat flour, except meal and groats
- 046.0210 - Wheat meal and groats
- 047.0210 - Corn meal
- 048.1110 - Bulgar wheat

- 048.1120 - Rolled wheat

- 048.8240 - Corn-soya-milk blended food product
- 048.8243 - Wheat-flour-soya blended food product

- 054.2005 - Dried beans, except for seed
- 091.4020 - Shortening
- 099.9900 - Food, donated for relief or charity by individuals or private agencies, n.e.c.
- 421.2030 - Soybean salad oil
- 421.3030 - Cottonseed salad oil
- 421.8030 - Other salad oils
- 431.5000 - Oils and fats, n.e.c.
- 541.8000 - Medicinal and pharmaceutical products
- 841.8000 - Clothing (new clothing exported for relief or charity by individuals and private agencies, and all used clothing for relief or charity whether exported by individuals, private agencies, or government agencies)
- 931.0020 - Commodities donated for relief or charity by individuals or private agencies, n.e.c.

In all cases, exports of commodities donated for relief or charity by individuals or private agencies should be reported under one of the classes listed above and not under other commodity classifications in the schedule. Commodity number 931.0020 should be used only in those cases where a more specific number has not been provided. The classes listed above should not be used for shipments by government agencies (United States, foreign, or international) even though the shipments may be described as exported "for relief or charity," except for shipments of used clothing by government agencies which are included under commodity number 841.8000. All other shipments for relief or charity by government agencies are to be reported along with regular commercial shipments under the applicable classification for the commodity being exported.

Reporting the Value of Repairs and Alterations

Shippers should report under Schedule B number 931.0010 the value of repairs and alterations made on articles exported from the United States after having been imported for such purposes. The value to be reported should represent the total value of processing in the United States, including the value of parts and labor. The value of the article which was imported to be repaired or altered should not be included in the value reported for commodity number 931.0010.

Shipping Containers

When shipping containers are exported as *merchandise* for sale or transfer of ownership abroad, they should be reported on export declarations under the appropriate Schedule B commodity number for the particular type of container. However, in accordance with the *Foreign Trade Statistics Regulations*, shipping containers are not considered to be exported when they are moving, either loaded or empty, strictly in their capacity as *carriers* of merchandise, i.e., as instruments of international trade, not for sale or transfer from U.S. ownership or title to foreign ownership or title. Therefore, containers leaving the United States *strictly as instruments of international trade* are not required to be reported on the Shipper's Export Declaration. If for any reason an exporter wishes to report the movement of such containers

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on export declarations, Schedule B provides separate classifications for such containers (632.2099 for containers made of wood; 692.9999 for containers made of metal). It is emphasized that these classifications relate only to containers moving as instruments of international trade. Also, these classifications are not to be used to report the contents of the containers. Contents of such containers are to be reported under the appropriate classification(s) for the merchandise.

Toys

When classifying exports of toys, reference should be made to the commodity classifications for toys under group code 894. In general, toys are not intended to be reported under classifications for items which have the same name but are not toys. For example, toy typewriters are not to be reported as typewriters (codes 714.1010 through 714.1040), but should be reported under commodity number 894.2330, "Toys, n.e.c."

Double Units of Quantity

For some commodities (principally textiles), shippers are required to report net quantity information in two units, such as pounds and square yards. Whereas two Schedule B numbers were previously provided for such commodities, each number having its own unit, only one commodity number is now required to be reported. For these items, the commodity descriptions include instructions on how to report net quantity information for the two units.

Items Valued \$250 or Under

In accordance with section 30.55 (h) of the *Foreign Trade Statistics Regulations*, Shipper's Export Declarations are not required to be filed for shipments (except those requiring a validated export license) to any Free World country except Southern Rhodesia, where the value of the commodities classified under a single Schedule B number and shipped on the same exporting carrier from one exporter to one importer is \$250 or under. (For mail shipments not requiring a validated export license, declarations are not required to be filed for commercial shipments valued \$250 or under to any destination or for noncommercial shipments regardless of value shipped to any destination.) In any instance, where a Shipper's Export Declaration is required to be filed for a shipment valued \$250 or under, the shipment (except those requiring a validated export license) may be reported under Schedule B number 931.0030 if the conditions outlined in the directives given in the schedule for the classification are met.

TRADEMARKS AND BRAND NAMES IN SCHEDULE B

The lists of export commodities, under the numbered classifications herein, include some trademarks and brand names, either alone or coupled with the common commercial identification or description of the commodity. These listings are identified by a symbol, indicating that the listing consists of or includes a trademark registered with the U.S. Patent Office. Trademarks and brand names are included in Schedule B because of the practice, frequently followed by exporters, of referring to commodities in terms of such trademarks rather than in terms of more complicated and technical specifications

which otherwise might be necessary for proper classification in accordance with Schedule B. A substantial proportion of export declarations are prepared by clerks or other nontechnical employees of export houses, freight forwarders, etc., who must rely on the designation of the commodity appearing on commercial papers such as invoices and who cannot be expected to know in all cases the detailed technical specifications of products solely designated by trademarks or brand names in such commercial papers. Commercial invoices and the export declarations which are prepared from them, therefore, frequently refer to export shipments solely in terms of trademarks or brand names such as *Cosmoline*, *Satino*, *Remuzit*, etc. Without the inclusion of such trademarks in Schedule B, it would be difficult to classify shipments of such products in their proper Schedule B classifications.

The Bureau of the Census has made a real effort to identify all trademarked items and brand names appearing in this schedule. If through inadvertence a trademark registered with the U.S. Patent Office appears in Schedule B without the symbol identification, the owner of such trademark should notify the Bureau of the Census so that correction may be made in future printings.

The inclusion of trademarks and brand names in the lists of export commodities herein is necessitated by practical considerations of administration as stated above and in no case should such inclusion be considered as prejudicing, or having, or intending to have, any adverse effect upon the rights of the trademark owner.

REVISIONS OR ADDITIONS TO SCHEDULE B

Revisions or additions to Schedule B will make it necessary from time to time to reprint pages of this edition of the schedule in order to keep it current. A change in the title or commodity description of an existing classification will be made on the reprinted page by the insertion of the new correct title or description followed by a parenthetical note reading (*Classification reworded*); other types of changes in the classifications will be followed by similar parenthetical notations.

Items being introduced into the schedule for the first time on reprinted pages will also be identified. In the case of the addition of an item which has been transferred from one commodity number to another, the item will be followed by a parenthetical note reading (*From-----*). No notations will be made to indicate places where items have been deleted from the list of inclusions.

For the benefit of users of the statistics, the Schedule B numbers which became effective subsequent to the release of the 1965 edition of Schedule B, with their effective dates, are listed on pages XXXIV-XXXVI. Listings for inclusion items being added to the schedule for the first time are not given an effective date since their addition merely constitutes additional information and not a change in classification. The same is true of editorial changes, changes to correct obvious errors, and changes which merely clarify the meaning.

The number of times the page has been revised together with the official date of the page will be indicated at the bottom of the page.

ANNUAL REVISIONS TO SCHEDULE B COMMODITY CLASSIFICATIONS

Schedule B commodity classifications are usually updated annually, the revisions being effective January 1 of the following year. Recommendations for revision of existing classifications should be received by the Industry and Commodity Classification Staff, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C. 20233, no later than May 31 of the year preceding the January 1 effective date. Recommendations for establishing new commodity classifications should satisfy the following criteria:

- (1) Value. In general, the annual volume of exports (domestic and/or foreign merchandise) of the new commodity classification should be expected to be \$1 million or more.
- (2) Reportability. Recommended classifications should be definable in language which clearly distinguishes

their content from all other classifications. The definitions should be in terms which reflect normal trade practices and terminology, and should not involve complicated or complex distinctions. They should require no more detail than that normally shown on commercial invoices. Accurate statistics cannot be compiled for classes which do not meet this criterion.

- (3) Disclosure. A proposed classification should be one for which there are three or more principal exporters.
- (4) Comparability. Schedule B is a commodity classification within the framework of the Standard International Trade Classification. In reviewing proposed classifications, consideration will also be given to their comparability to classifications of domestically produced commodities based on the Standard Industrial Classification (SIC).

STEEL GRADE AND PRODUCT CLASSIFICATIONS

The following data provide a convenient reference to explain the classification of certain steel mill products in which the dominant factors in determining such classifications are limitations of grade thickness and width. These classifications are based on the best information available as to the Steel Industry's customs and practices in classifying these steel products.

STEEL GRADE CLASSIFICATIONS

Carbon Steel--Steel is considered to be carbon steel when no minimum content is specified or required for aluminum, boron, chromium, cobalt, columbium, molybdenum, nickel, titanium, tungsten, vanadium or zirconium, or any other element added to obtain a desired alloying effect; when the specified minimum for copper does not exceed 0.40 percent; or when the maximum content specified for any of the following elements does not exceed the percentages noted: Manganese, 1.65; silicon, 0.60; copper, 0.60.

Alloy Steel Including Stainless--Steel is considered to be alloy steel when it includes one or more of the following elements in the designated amounts: Manganese in excess of 1.65 percent, silicon in excess of 0.60 percent, and copper in excess of 0.60 percent. It also includes steel containing the following elements in any amount specified or known to have been added to obtain a desired alloying effect: Aluminum, boron, chromium, cobalt, columbium, molybdenum, nickel, titanium, tungsten, vanadium, zirconium, and other alloying elements.

Alloy Steel Except Stainless--Any alloy steel not meeting the specifications given below for stainless steel.

Stainless Steel--Steel is considered to be stainless steel when it contains 10 percent or more of chromium, with or without other alloys, or a combined content of 18 percent or more of chromium and other alloys.
