FOREWORD

For the benefit of the users of Census material, there is also available the Census Bureau Publications Subject Guide. This is an index containing analyses of all current Census Publications with numerous cross references to the technical data included in the reports and releases. This index is issued quarterly. In addition, the Census Bureau issues a catalog supplement called "Monthly List of Publications Issued".

The publications listed, except Foreign Trade reports, bearing a price, can be purchased only from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, 25, D. C., and check or money order should be made payable to that official.

The various series of processed publications bearing no price, can be obtained only from the Bureau of the Census and single copies will be furnished free of charge as long as the supply lasts.

Foreign Trade statistical publications are available only from the Bureau of the Census (except when otherwise noted) by submitting a certified check or money order made payable to the Treasurer of the United States, covering the cost of the report desired.

AGRICULTURE

PUBLICATIONS OF THE 1945 CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE

Advance County Release No. 1.--A separate release will be issued for each of the more than 3,000 counties in the United States. This release will present data on number of farms, acreage in farms, cropland, specified classes of livestock and specified crops harvested as shown by the 1945 Census, with comparative data from the 1940 Census. Available as issued, free, from the Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce, Washington, 25, D. C.

Advance County Release No. 2.--This series will include a separate release for each county, presenting data on farm property value, dwellings, population, operators, facilities, and other characteristics, and value of farm products sold or used as shown for the 1945 and 1940 Censuses; farm mortgage debt, 1945; farms by tenure of operator (and for the South by color and tenure of operator) and by size of farm, 1945 and 1940; farms classified by total value of farm products, 1945 and 1940, and farms classified by type value of farm products, 1945. Free upon written request addressed to the Census Bureau.

Advance State Summary No. 1.--A separate summary release will be issued for each State. The State summaries will combine data presented in County Advance Release No. 1 and will be issued after all county releases for a given State have been published. Available as issued, free.

Advance State Summary No. 2.--This series will combine for each State the data presented in Advance County Release No. 2 and will be available as the last county release in a State is completed. Free, upon request.

Advance United States Summaries.--These summaries will combine the data presented in the Advance State Summaries. They will be available free, after all of the State Summaries have been issued.

Final State Reports and United States Report.--These reports will contain data previously released, in final form, for counties, by States, and for the United States. They will not be available until late in 1946 and early in 1947. Available as issued by purchase from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, 25, D. C. at prices to be announced later.

Cotton Ginning.--Twelve reports of cotton ginned during the year; to August 1, August 16, September 1, September 16, October 1, October 18, November 1, November 14, December 1, December 13, 1945; January 16, and March, 1946. United States and State totals.

Ten Reports.--County summaries (September 1 to March). One report (April) announcing bulletin and giving final ginnings for the United States and States.

ANNUAL BULLETIN

Cotton Production in the United States.--Cotton ginnings and production in the United States, by States and by counties. Percentage and amounts of cotton ginned to the several specified dates, and the average weight of bales.

BUSINESS

MONTHLY REPORTS

Retail Trade Report.--Monthly reports comparing current month sales with those for previous month and for same month previous year for various kinds of business. Data shown for U. S. total, selected cities, States, and regions. Based on a representative sample of selected retailers throughout the United States.

Wholesalers' Sales, Inventories, and Credits.--Monthly reports showing trends in sales, inventories, accounts receivable, and collections by kind of business for the United States and for geographic divisions. Based on a sample of approximately 2,500 conventional type wholesalers.

Manufacturers' Sales of Confectionery and Competitive Chocolate Products.--Monthly report showing trends, by States and geographic divisions, in dollar sales and in pounds sold. Also average prices per pound by type of manufacturer. Based on a sample of approximately 250 manufacturers of confectionery and chocolate products.

Public Merchandise Warehousing.--Monthly report showing trends in space available and space occupied, by geographic regions, States, and selected cities.

Coffee Inventories and Roastings.--Monthly release on total green coffee inventories and coffee roastings. Complete coverage of importers, green coffee jobbers, and roasters.

Canned Fruits and Vegetables.--Monthly report on total production, stocks, and movement of canned fruits and vegetables at the production and wholesale distribution levels. Production based on complete coverage - distributors' stocks based on sample.

Service Trades Report.--Monthly reports comparing current month receipts with those for previous month and for same month previous year for various kinds of service businesses. Data shown for U. S. total, selected cities, States, and regions. Based on a representative sample of selected service establishments throughout the United States.

QUARTERLY REPORT

Lumber Yard Stocks and Receipts.--Quarterly report on stocks classified by major species and receipts of retail and wholesale lumber yards. Data in terms of board feet shown for national and regional groupings. Based on sample of approximately 5,000 yards.

ANNUAL REPORT

Independent Retail Stores.--Inventories and sales, 1945 vs. 1944. Annual report showing trends by kinds of business and by States and city-size groups for year-end inventories and annual sales. Separate reports for major kind-of-business groups and also summary for some states.

Schedule T - Statistical Classification of Import Shipping Commodity Groups, representing an arrangement of commodities appearing in Schedule A in significant groupings, for inclusion in import transport statistics. Free

Shipments and unfilled orders, by grade of steel and by type of forgings; consumption of steel in production of forgings; separate data on commercial and captive operations. 

Introduction

The experience gained in the first complete year of issue of the Census Publications series has been very helpful in arriving at some indication of the needs of users of finding-media to Census publications. Many problems still exist to which the answers are vague, but through the cooperation of those who use these guides and inform us of their difficulties, it is possible to reevaluate our approach and make appropriate changes.

The outstanding point about the first year's experience is that a definite need is being met, even though not perfectly. The reception accorded the three parts of this series is gratifying, and it is hoped that, through appropriate changes and through more widespread information about the Bureau's published statistical output, the value of this group of publications will grow.

For the second volume, accordingly, the changes planned are largely in Part 3, **SUBJECT GUIDE**. The first change is the mechanical method of presentation. Hereafter, this part will be produced by a letterpress rather than through a reproduction of typed material process. This change will facilitate the major difference which will be noticeable in the next number. The **SUBJECT GUIDE** will be issued in four cumulative issues, each covering the period from the beginning of the calendar year to the end of each quarter. The slight delay in issue will be offset by the increased convenience to the user. Only one reference will be needed for the publications of any particular year, and the fourth issue will cover the entire period.

Part 1 of this series is available both for 1945 (Volume I) and for 1946 (Volume II). Vol. I, Part 1, **CATALOG OF 16TH DECENNIAL CENSUS PUBLICATIONS**, is a 15-page listing of the reports published from data collected and compiled in the 1940 Census. Items shown include the title and identifying number, pagination, price (except for those reports furnished free upon request), and in some cases a short indication of what the report includes. The 16th Decennial Census reports will

not be shown again in Part 1 of the Census Publications Series. Vol. II, Part 1, of this series gives price (where it applies), frequency of issue, and a brief analysis of current Census publications. **THE CATALOG OF CURRENT CENSUS PUBLICATIONS** will be revised annually as the first part of this series.

Part 2, **LIST OF PUBLICATIONS ISSUED** (except regular monthly and quarterly releases) is designed to call attention of users of Bureau statistics to new publications as soon as possible, and to keep those users abreast of changes in regular reports. It also indicates when regular reports of less than quarterly frequency are available.

Users are urged to continue the practice of commenting freely on these publications. All comments, suggestions, and criticisms should be addressed to the Director, Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C.

NEW CENSUS TRADE REPORTS PROGRAM

The Bureau of the Census is initiating a series of trade reports which will be keyed to the needs of service and distribution establishments for up-to-date facts on business trends. This promises to provide, for the first time in the history of this country, a continuing statistical program whose scope is in proportion to the importance of these businesses in the economy of the country. Important segments of the program getting under way include (1) the **MONTHLY RETAIL TRADE REPORT**, for which initial schedules were sent out covering January activity in a variety of kinds of business, and (2) the **MONTHLY SERVICE TRADE REPORT**, for which the first schedules covering February receipts have been sent out to establishments in important kinds of service businesses. The former is an elaboration and improvement of the earlier reports which covered only 34 States in a less complete survey.

The Bureau will publish figures each month for each kind of business showing the trend in receipts each month compared to those in the previous month and to those in the same month a year ago. Initially, results will be published by kind of business for the country as a whole and for certain cities. As the program develops, results will also

be published for certain States and other geographic regions and for additional cities, which will make meaningful comparisons possible. In the retail survey, data are already being shown for 34 individual States. Together, the retail and service reports will substantially reflect the amount of customer spending in various localities.

The monthly trade reports program has been designed to form an integral part of the Census over-all program for the distributive and service trades. It is planned to conduct complete Censuses of Business at five year intervals. The next one, subject to Congressional approval, will cover business activity in the calendar year 1946. In order that key facts on business trends and operations may be kept current, annual and more frequent reports will be published.

AIDS TO USERS OF STATISTICAL MATERIAL

Of use to statisticians, librarians, and other users of statistical data is *CITY PERIODIC FINANCIAL REPORTS* (City Documents, No. 1), recently published by the Bureau. The release is a checklist of city financial documents, arranged alphabetically by State, and under each State alphabetically by city and issuing department. Each series of documents is followed by a statement as to the frequency of publication and the holdings of the Bureau's Municipal Reference Service. Pertinent facts relating to the variations in the series are noted.

The 1945 index to *THE REGISTRAR*, the cooperative official news bulletin for use of field representatives of the Vital Statistics Division, and State, county, and city registration officials, has also been issued. Also released is the index to *VITAL STATISTICS—SPECIAL REPORTS*, Volume 21, Numbers 1 to 16.

THE STATISTICAL ABSTRACT OF THE UNITED STATES 1944-45 (Sixty-sixth Number) is now available from the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C. Price per buckram-bound copy is \$1.75. The principal new feature of this edition is the presentation of a general note at the beginning of certain sections in order to furnish a background for the statistics in the field. Over ten percent of the 1,034 tables contained in this volume are new, and another five percent have been considerably revised. A list of tables by source is presented for the added convenience of users of the Abstract.

This book is planned as a convenient reference volume for quantitative information and also serves as a guide to the various sources of statistical data. If the information on a particular subject presented in the *STATISTICAL ABSTRACT* is not sufficiently detailed, it is suggested that the user refer to the publication or to the agency responsible for the data, as indicated in the source note of the table, to obtain further information. The original source from which the table has been taken usually contains more complete discussions of the definitions and concepts used, and presents information for small areas, and often with additional classifications. Occasionally the agency responsible for the data has still more detailed information that can be made available from unpublished records.

Of interest in the problem of labor force measurement as it affects national economic policy are three papers presented at the 105th annual meeting of the American Statistical Association, Cleveland, Ohio. These papers, available in mimeographed form, are, "Objectives, Uses, and Types of Labor Force Data in Relation to Economic Policy," by Louis J. Ducoff and Margaret Jarman Hagood, of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics; "Recent Experience with Problems of Measurement," by Gertrude Bancroft and Emmett H. Welch, of the Bureau of the Census; and "Employment Statistics in the Planning of a Full Employment Program," by Charles Stewart, of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, and Loring Wood, of the Bureau of the Budget.

EXTRA COPIES OF CENSUS PUBLICATIONS

Frequently the Bureau is asked whether extra copies of Census reports should be returned to the Bureau of the Census or destroyed. This question is asked particularly at the time that large numbers of new reports are issued.

The Bureau will be glad to accept copies of older bound volumes and bulletins. The short multi-lithed releases, however, should be disposed of otherwise. The bound volumes and bulletins will be retained and used to fill requests of libraries and others who wish to complete their collections.

Notes

This *Subject Guide* cumulates references covering those publications included in the January to March *Subject Guide* and references to all publications issued by the Bureau of the Census through June 30, 1946. It therefore replaces the January-March edition.

While the *Subject Guide* itself will be cumulative, these notes will be prepared separately for each edition until publication of the number for the last quarter, which will cover the entire year. For the annual summary the notes will be consolidated to include those matters covered in previous quarters which appear to have historical significance.

INTRODUCTORY REMARKS

Conversations with many librarians at the American Library Association meeting in Buffalo, N. Y., June 16-22, indicated a very heartening reception for the *Subject Guide* by those who were acquainted with it. Many new friends saw it at these meetings for the first time. Users did not appear to be in agreement on whether the advantages of better readability compensates for waiting for a printed copy of the *Subject Guide*.

In general, a number of questions on particular points of presentation have been raised, which are now being considered. One problem involves the numbering system for the Census Publications series of which the *Subject Guide* is a part. The present numbering has been found confusing, and alternatives have been suggested. The preparation of the *Subject Guide* only once a year instead of quarterly is another proposal. An emphasis on more detailed indexes to particular series of Census publications has been proposed, as has the development of an historical catalog bringing up to date the well-known *Circular of Information on Census Publications, 1790 to 1916*. Indications of preferences will be very helpful in considering plans for the near future. All comments and sug-

gestions should be addressed to the Director, Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C.

CHANGES IN PUBLICATIONS PROGRAM

The passage of the appropriations act allocating money to the Bureau of the Census for its program in 1947 makes it definite that there will be no census of manufactures or a census of business this year. It is also unlikely that a sample census of population will be taken.

In addition, the funds made available for collecting and publishing foreign trade statistics will probably necessitate a curtailment of the publications in this field. No definite plans are ready for announcement at the time this is written. However, changes will be noted in Part 2 of this series, *List of Publications Issued*, as they occur, and all who regularly receive foreign trade publications will be notified when revisions in program are decided upon.

TRANSFER OF VITAL STATISTICS

Under Reorganization Plan No. 2, submitted to the Congress by the President, the Vital Statistics Division of the Bureau of the Census is transferred to the Public Health Service of the Federal Security Agency, effective July 16, 1946. This *Subject Guide* will carry all publications issued by the Bureau of the Census on vital statistics up to that date. However, requests for these publications and later reports should be addressed to the U. S. Public Health Service, Federal Security Agency, Washington 25, D. C.

The transfer includes all reports on births, deaths, marriages, and divorces.

ARTICLES OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Among the articles which appeared in various journals during the past few months, the following may be of interest to users of Census data:

1. "Appraisal Significance of Census Statistics," by J. C. Capt, Director, Bureau of the Census, appeared in the April 1946 issue of *The Appraisal Journal*. This article summarizes a wide variety of data published by the Census Bureau, which is considered to be of interest to appraisers but will also be of interest to many others.

2. "Census Bureau Aids to State and Municipal Research," by Wylie Kilpatrick, of the Governments Division of the Bureau, appeared in the *Governmental Research Association Notes and References*. This also summarizes Census materials for a particular group, emphasizing the reports of the Bureau's Governments Division.

3. "Business Can Use the Census," by Philip M. Hauser, Assistant Director, Bureau of the Census, appeared in Marketing Series No. 63, titled *Modern Market Research Procedures*, published by the American Management Association. This article also appeared in *Printer's Ink* for January 25, 1946, p. 45. Uses of Census data made by marketing groups are emphasized in the article.

4. "Problems and Methods of the Sample Survey of Business," by Morris Hansen, William Hurwitz, and Margaret Gurney, all members of the Bureau staff, appeared in the June 1946 issue of the *Journal of the American Statistical Association*. This article summarizes recent developments in sampling as applied to the Bureau's business surveys.

RECENT CENSUS PUBLICATIONS OF PARTICULAR INTEREST

In the course of the last three months, a number of population reports based on data from the 1940 Decennial Census were published. These publications include: two reports in the Internal Migration Series, *Age of Migrants* and *Economic Characteristics of Migrants*. Both are available from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington 25, D. C., at prices of \$1.25 and \$.60, respectively.

Another publication recently available is *United States Life Tables and Actuarial Tables, 1939-1941*. The introduction describes the scope of this volume as follows:

"The life tables in this volume are based on the 1940 census of population and the deaths of the 3-year period 1939-1941. Separate life tables have been prepared for each sex for each of three racial groups: white, Negro, and other races. This is the first time official life tables have been prepared for races other than whites and Negroes in the United States. Life tables are also included for the total population of each sex, for the total population of each racial group without distinction by sex, and for the entire population without distinction by race or sex. Each of the 12 life tables is based on data for the entire continental United States. Also included are certain actuarial tables derived from the life tables for white males, white females, and total whites, to be used in calculating premiums and values for life annuities, life assurances, and other monetary benefits contingent on death or survival. Other sections give a brief synopsis of the elementary mathematical theory of life contingencies, including those involving more than one life; instructions for using the actuarial tables, with numerical examples; and a complete account of the methods and processes used in constructing the life tables. Because of the increasing interest in the preparation of life tables on the part of demographers, public health workers, and other groups, an effort has been made to render this statement of methods and processes intelligible to readers having a reasonable knowledge of mathematics and statistics, but without specific actuarial training. For this reason, some of the explanations will doubtless seem to the actuary unnecessarily full, and even somewhat tedious. An appendix, intended primarily for actuaries, explains the special processes used in the construction of the actuarial tables, and certain other technical matters."

In addition to bulletins for the 34 States, reports for certain selected counties and cities in the remaining States will be issued. As the program is developed to include a greater number of establishments, the information will be presented in more detailed and useful form. The new series, titled **MONTHLY RETAIL TRADE REPORT**, will supplant the former series issued under the heading **RETAIL SALES, INDEPENDENT STORES**.

INTRODUCTION

This SUBJECT GUIDE cumulates references covering those publications included in the January through June SUBJECT GUIDE and references to all publications issued by the Bureau of the Census through September 30, 1946. It therefore replaces the January-June edition.

CHANGES IN FOREIGN TRADE CURRENT REPORTS PROGRAM

Due to the reduction in appropriation for the compilation of foreign trade statistics, it has been necessary to discontinue publication of Reports FT 100, UNITED STATES IMPORTS OF MERCHANDISE FOR CONSUMPTION—COMMODITY TOTALS, and FT 400, UNITED STATES EXPORTS OF DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MERCHANDISE (INCLUDING EXPORTS UNDER THE LEND-LEASE PROGRAM)—COMMODITY TOTALS, with the May 1946 issues. Starting with data for June 1946, subscribers to Reports FT 100 and FT 400 have been supplied with issues of the MONTHLY SUMMARY OF FOREIGN COMMERCE OF THE UNITED STATES. Tables 5 and 6 on imports and 3 and 4 on exports of the MONTHLY SUMMARY provide information similar to that previously shown in Reports FT 100 and FT 400.

Two monthly press releases on foreign trade, FT 960, UNITED STATES EXPORTS UNDER THE UNITED NATIONS RELIEF AND REHABILITATION PROGRAM, BY COUNTRY OF DESTINATION AND PRINCIPAL COMMODITIES, and FT 980, UNITED STATES TRADE WITH THE TERRITORIES AND POSSESSIONS, have also been discontinued.

These estimates were prepared by the Bureau of the Census in cooperation with the Scripps Foundation for Research in Population Problems. They are revisions of the forecasts presented in the report, ESTIMATES OF FUTURE POPULATION OF THE UNITED STATES: 1940-2000, prepared by Warren S. Thompson and P. K. Whelpton of the Scripps Foundation, and published by the National Resources Planning Board in 1943. The present estimates represent assumptions of medium mortality, medium fertility, and no net immigration between 1945 and 2000. A more detailed report on forecasts

of the population is in process of being printed and will be available in February of 1947.

The series of special censuses of specified cities and areas is summarized in SPECIAL CENSUSES CONDUCTED BY THE BUREAU OF THE CENSUS SINCE 1940. This 4-page listing is No. 183 in the P-SC series.

EXPLANATION OF STATISTICS OF FOREIGN COMMERCE AND NAVIGATION OF THE UNITED STATES FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR 1944 is a 19-page excerpt from Volumes I and II of the publication, FOREIGN COMMERCE AND NAVIGATION OF THE UNITED STATES. EXPLANATION OF STATISTICS is printed separately for preliminary distribution.

Also in the field of foreign trade, attention is called to the monthly FOREIGN TRADE STATISTICS NOTES. This bulletin of information for users of United States foreign trade statistics contains notes on problems of coverage, description of compilation techniques, changes in classification schedules, explanation of unusual items included in the statistics, and other items of interest in the field of foreign trade statistics.

Introduction

CENSUS PUBLICATIONS, 1946, CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE is designed to facilitate reference by technicians, librarians, students, and others to the large wealth of statistical data contained in the reports of the Bureau of the Census issued during the calendar year 1946. It is organized into two parts. The first part is a complete list of all statistical publications issued by the Bureau of the Census during the calendar year. The listings in this part are classified by broad subject field, according to the subject division of the Bureau of the Census that compiles the particular report. The second part is a guide to the contents of the publications. In this part each separate subject covered in the reports is listed alphabetically, with cross-references.

Relationship to other catalogs and guides.—To place this service on a current basis, the SUBJECT GUIDE has been issued quarterly and cumulated during the past year. The present volume, therefore, replaces the three previous 1946 issues of the SUBJECT GUIDE, January–March 1946, January–June 1946, and January–September 1946. As a result of suggestions received from various quarters, and as an added feature of the SUBJECT GUIDE, it was decided to include in the final annual volume, a complete list of all the publications issued during the year. During the past year a monthly LIST OF PUBLICATIONS ISSUED, which excluded all regular monthly and quarterly publications, was made available and was received with wide approval. The list of publications included in this volume can therefore also replace monthly lists covering the various months of 1946.

This publication, however, does not replace the two other catalogs of Census publications now available, the CATALOG OF 16TH DECENNIAL CENSUS PUBLICATIONS and the CATALOG OF CURRENT CENSUS PUBLICATIONS. The first, the CATALOG OF 16TH DECENNIAL CENSUS PUBLICATIONS, lists all the publications of the 16th Decennial Census with the exception of a few special reports which were issued subsequent to March 31, 1946. These special reports are listed in this volume on page 31. The CATALOG OF CURRENT CENSUS PUBLICATIONS lists all Census publications issued for a few years prior to the beginning of 1946. For the most part, it lists all publications in a field since the last major census covering that field. The annual CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE should be considered as supplementary to these two catalogs.

Eventually it is hoped to bring together all data on Census publications issued since 1790 into a single basic catalog which would be, in effect, a revision of the CIRCULAR OF INFORMATION CONCERNING CENSUS PUBLICATIONS, 1790 TO 1916, published in 1917.

The BUSINESS SERVICE CHECK LIST of the Department of Commerce, issued weekly at a subscription cost of \$1.00

a year, furnishes a list of Census publications to those for whom early information is important.

Development of the Indexing Program.—From time to time, throughout its history, which extends back to 1790, the Bureau of the Census has issued various circulars, guides, and lists of publications. For the most part, these have not been made available at regular intervals, but were issued as the occasion seemed to warrant. Census publications have also been listed in the various catalogs issued by the Department of Commerce and the Superintendent of Documents. However, because of the volume of material included in these catalogs, it has not always been possible to furnish the detail on Census reports which appears to be needed by users of Census data.

In response to numerous requests from technicians, librarians, students, and others who have difficulty finding what they need among the large variety of reports issued by the Bureau, an attempt has been made during the past two years to develop a systematic series of lists, catalogs, and guides, so that users could derive maximum benefit from the wealth of statistical data made available. This program, which is reaching a stage of crystallization, has resulted in this annual CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE, the first in what is expected to be a regular series. This volume is designed to furnish a reference tool which will enable technicians, librarians, students, and all persons who are looking for statistical data to determine whether their needs can be met by reports of the Bureau of the Census and to eliminate the need for detailed search through many reports.

Acknowledgments.—Many individuals have cooperated in the development of this indexing and cataloging program, helping with general comments and suggestions on specific points. In particular, acknowledgment should be made of the guidance given by Dr. Adelaide R. Hasse in the early stages of the development of this program. Questions raised by librarians and others and many specific comments received through correspondence were very helpful. The preparation of this volume by Morris B. Ullman and Audrey L. Rinehardt, under the supervision of Morris H. Hansen, was greatly facilitated by the assistance of many other persons on the staff of the Bureau of the Census.

HOW TO USE THIS PUBLICATION

CENSUS PUBLICATIONS, 1946, CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE is designed to aid users of published Census statistics in locating desired information directly, eliminating the examination of hundreds of publications issued by this Bureau. The user of Census materials may discover, by consulting the SUBJECT GUIDE, in what particular

Census publication or series of publications the data he wishes are published.

All publications issued during the calendar year 1946 are included in the catalog under one of the following subject headings: Agriculture, Business, Foreign Trade, Governments, Industry, Population, and Miscellaneous. The first six headings correspond to the six subject divisions of the Bureau responsible for the issuance of reports in those fields. Since this grouping is an administrative one, there may be a few instances where a publication might be included under a heading which does not strictly correspond to the subject of the report. However, it is not believed that these few instances will cause difficulty, especially since the subject coverage is indicated in the SUBJECT GUIDE.

The heading "Miscellaneous" includes reports of an over-all nature and technical articles written by staff members. The latter articles are listed as a convenience and are not indexed in the SUBJECT GUIDE.

A general description of the data contained in each Census publication is given in the SUBJECT GUIDE in a main entry for that report, listed under an appropriate subject heading. Thus, the publication TRACTORS is listed under the heading "Tractors" in the SUBJECT GUIDE.

This main entry description contains the title of the report, the series numbering, the date to which the figures in the report relate, the number of pages, tables, charts, maps, etc., contained in the report, the release date of the report, and an indication of the type of data shown in the report.

In addition to this main entry, there are listed cross references to this entry from subjects or products covered in the given report. Thus, if one were seeking data on tracklaying tractors, he would find under this heading that various statistics on this product are included in *Facts for Industry*, Series M37A-05, the identifying symbol for the above-mentioned report titled TRACTORS. Then, following the italicized instruction "See Tractors," the seeker of data might consult the main entry for a lengthier discussion of the information contained in the publication in question.

ORGANIZATION AND PUBLICATION-PROGRAM CHANGES

To assist librarians and others interested in the organization of materials as presented in this volume, the principal changes in the administrative organization of the Bureau of the Census and in the publications program which took place during the year 1946 are summarized below.

Agriculture Division

During the year the first of the final reports of the 1945 Census of Agriculture were made available. The following reports have been published or are now in preparation:

Volume I.—STATISTICS FOR COUNTIES. (Farms, acreage, value, characteristics, livestock, livestock products, crops, fruits, and value of farm products.) This volume will consist of 33 parts, each bound separately. These parts comprise State reports with statistics for counties, and contain final data for States and counties previously issued in the first and second series county and State releases. Thus, the bound reports replace the preliminary releases of data on these subjects issued for each county and each State. A summary of these data for the United States, with statistics for States and geographic divisions, will appear in Volume II. A list of the separate parts of Volume I, all of which will be made available early in 1947, follows.

Volume II.—GENERAL REPORT—STATISTICS BY SUBJECTS FOR THE UNITED STATES, GEOGRAPHIC DIVISIONS, AND STATES.

In addition, special reports based on data from this Census will also be issued. Present plans call for reports on multiple unit operations and on ranking agricultural counties. Results from the sample of farms enumerated as part of the complete census will also be made available. These reports will furnish more detail on some of the information included in the main volumes.

A series of reports covering farms of nonwhite farm operators, based on the 1945 Census of Agriculture, is now being prepared in the Population Division by the specialist in Negro statistics. These releases, the NA series, include for the nonwhite farm operator group the number of farms, land in farms, cropland harvested, and value of land and buildings, by tenure. The initial release in the series covered the State of Mississippi. Other southern States will be covered in separate releases in this series.

Business Division

In 1946 a series of trade reports keyed to the needs of service and distribution establishments for up-to-date facts on business trends was initiated. Important parts of the program include (1) the MONTHLY RETAIL TRAC-

REPORT, covering activity in a variety of kinds of business, and (2) the MONTHLY SERVICE TRADE REPORT, covering receipts of establishments in important kinds of service businesses. The MONTHLY RETAIL TRADE REPORTS program is an elaboration and improvement of the earlier series of trade reports, which covered only 34 States on a less complete basis.

The Bureau publishes figures for each kind of business, showing the trend in receipts each month compared to those in the previous month and to those in the same month a year ago. Initially, results were published by kind of business for the country as a whole and for certain cities. As the program developed, results also were published for certain States and other geographic regions and for additional cities. The areas for which reports were issued during the past year are shown on pages 4 and 5.

The TRADE REPORTS surveys are operated in a number of areas selected so as to permit the preparation of accurate statistics both for the nation as a whole and for a number of cities and other local areas. In response to the requests from a number of civic organizations in cities which had not been covered in the surveys, a cooperative plan, known as the Joliet Plan, was developed to permit the preparation of trade statistics for such cities. This plan provides for assistance of a local organization, such as a chamber of commerce, in the selection of a representative sample of firms and in the arrangement for their regular reporting in the survey each month. The data collected under the Joliet Plan are published for the separate cities in the State reports.

Foreign Trade Division

During the war period, the United States foreign trade statistics were confidential for security reasons, and only limited data were made public. With the end of the war in Europe, on May 8, 1945, regulations permitted the release of full detailed statistics on the foreign trade of the United States for the calendar year 1943, except for certain statistics, mostly connected with Pacific areas, which were considered to be of sufficient importance to be retained in their confidential status. Effective with VJ-day, new security regulations were announced permitting the complete and unrestricted release of all United States foreign trade data except statistics on uranium and thorium. The lifting of these restrictions on publication of data made it again possible to issue the annual report, FOREIGN COMMERCE AND NAVIGATION OF THE UNITED STATES. Thus, the reports for 1943 and 1944 were issued during the past year.

A reduction in appropriations for the compilation of foreign trade statistics has made it necessary to discontinue publication of the following foreign trade reports: (The date in parenthesis represents the latest period for which the report is available.)

Publication of the monthly FOREIGN TRADE STATISTICS NOTES was initiated with the January 1946 issue. This bulletin of information for users of United States foreign trade statistics contains notes on problems of coverage, description of compilation techniques, changes in classification schedules, explanation of unusual items included in the statistics, and other items of interest in the field of foreign trade statistics.

Current foreign trade statistical reports, which are available on a free basis or on payment of a nominal charge, are listed in the CATALOG OF CURRENT CENSUS PUBLICATIONS and also in a separate catalog, MONTHLY UNITED STATES FOREIGN TRADE STATISTICAL PUBLICATIONS both available on request from the Bureau of the Census.

In addition to these reports, there are a number of monthly foreign trade statistical reports which are prepared on a cost basis. These releases contain information not available or not readily available in the reports listed in the catalogs. Because of the reduction in funds available for the compilation of foreign trade statistics, it has been necessary in recent months to inaugurate a system of charging the full amount of the cost of preparation to subscribers to these reports. When more than one person subscribes to one of these releases, the total cost is prorated among the subscribers, except that no refunds are made if new persons subscribe during the subscription period.

The identification numbers and the names and descriptions of reports at present being prepared on a cost basis are available on request from the Bureau of the Census.

Governments Division

Users of data relating to the characteristics and functions of State and local governments and their administration will find helpful a series issued by the Bureau of the Census on State and City Documents. Reports in this series are bibliographic and analytical in nature and are designed to aid in the location of data on State and City Government activities. No. 1 in the City Documents series for 1946 is CITY PERIODIC FINANCIAL REPORTS. A comprehensive bibliography of city reports is now in preparation.

Industry Division

Many of the Facts for Industry releases were formerly issued jointly by the War Production Board (later the Civilian Production Administration and now the Office of Temporary Controls) and the Bureau of the Census. With the curtailment of activities in the National War Agencies brought about by the end of the war, the surveys on which certain releases were based were discontinued, and the responsibility of conducting surveys on various other products, formerly carried out by these agencies, was assumed by the Bureau of the Census. In the Industry part of the CATALOG in this volume, starting on page 14, a note has been added to the listing of each release in which such a change has occurred during the year. The date the change took place, the old and the new series numbering, and other historical data are given in the notes. These notes are also carried in the main entry for each publication in the SUBJECT GUIDE section of this volume.

A special series of releases, CHEMICALS IN THE WAR PROGRAM (Facts for Industry, Series 6-8), was inaugurated during the year 1946. As of December 31, 1946, thirty-six separate releases have been issued, each covering allocations of an individual chemical during the war period. The series is designed to supplement data released during the war years. A list of the chemicals covered in separate releases may be found on page 20.

Another special series of industry reports (Facts for Industry, Series 50-3-27) shows summary figures for June 1946 for 60 individual industries, covering plant activity, shipments, and unfilled orders during that month. This series contains information supplementing that previously published in Series 50-3-27, FABRICATED METAL PRODUCTS PLANT OPERATIONS, covering June 1946, the final month for which data in this series were collected. A list of the industries covered in separate releases in this series may be found on pages 25 and 26.

Population Division

Although the publication of the basic volumes of the 16th Decennial Census, 1940, has been completed, special reports are published from time to time as prepared. Three such reports were issued during the year in

the Internal Migration 1935-40 series, namely: AGE OF MIGRANTS (386 pages; price \$1.25); ECONOMIC CHARACTERISTICS OF MIGRANTS (228 pages; price 60 cents); and SOCIAL CHARACTERISTICS OF MIGRANTS (276 pages; price \$1.00). These reports are for sale by the Superintendent of Documents, United States Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C. Remittance should be sent direct to that office with order.

Initiated during the year was Series P-HVet, SURVEY OF HOUSING OF WORLD WAR II VETERANS AND DWELLING UNIT VACANCY AND OCCUPANCY, in specified areas. As of December 31, 1946, separate releases in this series had been issued for 80 areas, covering housing vacancy and occupancy and data for all World War II veterans in the area, as follows: personal characteristics, present living arrangements, condition and facilities of dwelling units, and degree of crowding, migration intentions and housing plans, and reasons for planning to move for veterans who plan to move within the locality. A list of the areas covered in this survey is shown in the CATALOG section of this volume, pages 33 and 34.

A survey covering data similar to that shown in the P-HVet series, for a selected area in East Central Los Angeles was made during late September by this Bureau. The release of the data from this survey was issued by the National Housing Agency, but copies are available on request from the Bureau of the Census. The release is not listed in either the CATALOG section or the SUBJECT GUIDE section of this volume.

The survey of veterans' housing in specified areas replaces Series P-HV, SURVEY OF VACANCY AND OCCUPANCY IN PRIVATELY FINANCED AND PUBLICLY FINANCED DWELLING UNITS (in specified areas).

Estimates of the employment status of the male veterans of World War II are being shown in the MONTHLY REPORT ON THE LABOR FORCE, effective with the report in this series covering data for November 1946. These figures are shown by months from the corresponding date preceding year to the current month.

Early in 1947 a special series of reports, Series P-LF, similar to the MONTHLY REPORT ON THE LABOR FORCE, will be available for specified areas. This series will cover labor force and population data for certain large cities and metropolitan districts. The reports are designed to meet the needs for current information on population characteristics, employment, unemployment, and related subjects, and will be listed in the monthly LIST OF PUBLICATIONS ISSUED as they appear.

Reports on judicial criminal statistics are being discontinued after those covering 1945 data are issued.

Vital Statistics Division

Under Reorganization Plan No. 2, submitted to the Congress by the President, the Vital Statistics Division of the Bureau of the Census was transferred to the Public Health Service of the Federal Security Agency, effective July 16, 1946. This 1946 CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE carries all publications issued by the Bureau of the Census on vital statistics up to that date. However, requests for

these publications and later reports should be addressed to the National Office of Vital Statistics, Washington 25, D. C.

This transfer includes all reports on births, deaths, marriages, and divorces.

Miscellaneous

Two editions of the STATISTICAL ABSTRACT OF THE UNITED STATES, the 66th number, covering 1944-45 (price \$1.75), and the 67th number, covering 1946 (price \$2.25), were issued during the year. These volumes contain important summary statistics on population, trade, production, finance, and other subjects. The editions are for sale by the Superintendent of Documents, United States

Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C. Remittance should be sent direct to that office with order.

Other general publications issued during the year include the LIST OF SCHEDULES USED BY THE BUREAU OF CENSUS FOR COLLECTING DATA, 1946, which is a quick guide to statistics collection activities of the Bureau; the 1946 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BUREAU OF THE CENSUS, which discusses the major developments of the year from July 1945 through June 1946; and selected technical articles by staff members of the Bureau of the Census. A list of the articles is contained in the CATALOG section of this volume, pages 36 and 37, but these articles have not been indexed in the SUBJECT GUIDE section.

BUSINESS DIVISION

INDUSTRY DIVISION

The Census of Manufactures, which was taken every second year from 1921 to 1939, was suspended under proper authority in 1941, 1943, and 1945 in order that the facilities of the Bureau of the Census might be turned to the collection of data urgently needed by the War agencies. Therefore there has been no Census of Manufactures more recent than 1939. If funds are available, the next Census of Manufactures provided by law will be taken in 1948 and will cover manufacturing activities during 1947.

The purpose of the Facts for Industry series of releases is to make available to manufacturers, trade groups, and other users of industrial data, current figures that are useful to them in their day-to-day operations and forward planning. The current reports also present an accurate picture of industrial trends over a period of time. This list includes data made available from the Current Manufactures Statistics program of the Bureau of the Census and also includes releases of information collected by or for the War Production Board and the Civilian Production Administration (now the Office of Temporary Controls) during the war and reconversion periods by the Census Bureau or other Federal agencies.


