A mid-decennial agriculture census was initiated January 1, 1925. Thus, since 1920, there has been a Federal Census of Agriculture every fifth year.

## BUSINESS DIVISION

Complete Censuses of Business were taken for the years 1929, 1933, 1935, and 1939. The first and the last of these were taken as part of the Decennial Census, 1930 and 1940. The other two were special projects. The next authorized Census of Business will be taken in 1950 covering 1949, unless current legislation is revised. The current reports on business as outlined below were the only publications in this field issued during the first quarter 1947.

Surveys covering trends in additional trades were initiated during the quarter and are included in this list under the heading "Trade Studies." An index to the 1939 Census of Business was prepared and is listed under "Miscellaneous Reports."

### Trade Studies

Three reports, covering data for each month November 1946 through January 1947, were issued during the January-March 1947 period. Each report 6 pages.

#### Trends in the Grocery Trade. Monthly.

Reports show data on estimated total sales and trends in sales and in inventories of wholesale grocery, retail grocery, and independent grocery and grocery-fresh meat stores, by geographic division, States, and selected cities. Two reports, covering data for December 1946, the initial release, and January 1947, were issued during the January-March 1947 period. Each report 6 pages.

#### Trends in the Electrical Goods Trade. Monthly.

Reports show data on estimated total sales and trends in sales and in inventories of electrical goods wholesalers, and retail and independent retail radio-household appliance dealers, by geographic division, States, and selected cities. Two reports, covering data for December 1946, the initial release, and January 1947, were issued during the January-March 1947 period. Each report 5 pages.

#### Trends in the Tobacco Trade. Monthly.

Reports show data on estimated total sales and trends in sales and in inventories of wholesale tobacco distributors, by geographic division. Two reports, covering data for December 1946, the initial release, and January 1947, were issued during the January-March 1947 period. 3 to 4 pages.

### Wholesale Trade

#### Wholesalers' Sales, Inventories, and Credits (Service and Limited-Function Wholesalers). Monthly.

These reports show data on trends in sales, inventories, accounts receivable, and collections, by kind of business, for the United States and for geographic divisions. Data are based on a

sample of approximately 2,500 conventional type wholesalers. Four reports, covering data for November 1946 through February 1947, were issued during the January-March 1947 period. Each report contains 7 pages, with the exception of the report covering December 1946 data, which also shows sales, year 1946 vs. 1945 (9 pages).

NOTE.—The addition of the expression "Service and Limited-Function Wholesalers" to the title of this report, effective with the release covering January 1947 data, has been made to identify more specifically the data covered.

### Other Trade Surveys

#### Public-Merchandise Warehousing. Monthly.

Reports show data on trends in space available and space occupied, by geographic regions, States, and selected cities. Three reports, covering data each month, December 31, 1946-February 28, 1947, were issued during the January-March 1947 period. Each report 2 pages.

#### Canned Fruits and Vegetables. Production, Stocks, and Shipments. Monthly.

Reports show data on total production, stocks, and movement of canned fruits and vegetables at the production and wholesale distribution levels. The statistics are obtained from complete monthly coverage of canners and packers, and from a sample of wholesalers and warehouses of retail food chains who reported for the month. Three reports, covering data each month, November 1946-January 1947, were issued during the January-March 1947 period. Each report 6 pages.

#### Coffee Inventories and Roastings. Monthly.

Releases show data on total green coffee inventories and coffee roastings. Data are compiled monthly from reports submitted by importers, green coffee jobbers, and roasters. Three reports, covering data for December 1946 (preliminary) and November 1947 (final), were issued during the January-March 1947 period. Each report 2 pages.

#### Confectionery and Competitive Chocolate Products. Monthly.

Reports show data on trends in dollar sales and in pounds sold, by States and geographic divisions. Also average prices per pound, by type of manufacturer. Data are based on a sample of approximately 250 manufacturers of confectionery and chocolate products. Three reports, covering data for November 1946 through January 1947, were issued during the January-March 1947 period. Each report 2 pages.

#### Lumber. Stocks in Retail and Wholesale Yards. Quarterly.

These reports show data on stocks, classified by major species, and receipts of retail and wholesale lumber yards. Data in terms of board feet shown for national and regional groups. Data are based on a sample of 2650 wholesale and retail lumber dealers. One report, covering data for the 4th quarter 1946, was issued during the January-March 1947 period. 6 pages.

### Miscellaneous Reports

#### Handy Reference Guide to the 1939 Census of Retail Trade.

## POPULATION DIVISION

The Census of Population is taken every ten years, the last being that for 1940. Currently, population estimates are prepared from available data. The MONTHLY REPORT ON THE LABOR FORCE obtains information on employment and unemployment from a sample of 25,000 households each month. This survey also yields considerable information on changes in population characteristics (see Series P-S, below). Current national housing data are also obtained by means of supplements to the MONTHLY REPORT ON THE LABOR FORCE survey. Information on current housing of veterans and housing plans and needs are based on sample surveys made in specified localities, usually at the expense of other government agencies. Special censuses are taken upon request of local communities which meet the cost of such censuses.

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# Introduction

**CENSUS PUBLICATIONS, 1947, CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE** is the second of an annual series, listing for the calendar year the publications of the Bureau of the Census and furnishing a guide to their contents. The introductory section indicates, in summary form, the principal publication-program changes which took place during the year. The catalog section (pages 1 to 31) lists all publications issued by the Bureau of the Census during the calendar year and includes a list of technical articles prepared by staff members and published during the year. The subject guide section (pages 33 to 204) indicates the subjects covered in all the publications issued except the staff articles and a few general publications so indicated.

The special appendix (pages Ai to A25) brings together into a single list and furnishes an index to the final reports of the 1945 Census of Agriculture. The first of these final reports became available in 1946 and the last, the **REPORT ON THE 1945 SAMPLE CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE**, was not issued until after the end of 1947. This appendix, however, is complete for this census.

*Relationship to other catalogs and guides.*—This **CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE** is issued on a current basis each quarter and cumulated to the annual volume. Thus, this volume replaces the January-March, January-June, and January-September issues of the **CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE FOR 1947**. A monthly **LIST OF PUBLICATIONS ISSUED**, which does not include regular monthly and quarterly publications, enables users to be informed more currently on publications as they appear.

This publication does not replace the two other catalogs of Census publications now available, the **CATALOG OF 16TH DECENNIAL CENSUS PUBLICATIONS** and the **CATALOG OF CURRENT CENSUS PUBLICATIONS**. The first, the **CATALOG OF 16TH DECENNIAL CENSUS PUBLICATIONS**, lists all the publications of the 16th Decennial Census with the exception of a few special reports which were issued subsequent to March 31, 1946. Of these special reports, those issued during 1947 are listed in this volume on page 25. The **CATALOG OF CURRENT CENSUS PUBLICATIONS** lists all Census publications issued for a few years prior to the beginning of 1946. For the most part, it lists all publications in a field since the last major census covering that field. The annual **CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE** for 1946 and for 1947 should be considered as supplementary to these two catalogs.

Eventually it is hoped to bring together all data on Census publications issued since 1790 into a single basic catalog which would be, in effect, a revision of the **CIRCULAR OF INFORMATION CONCERNING CENSUS PUBLICATIONS, 1790 to 1916**, published in 1917.

The **BUSINESS SERVICE CHECK LIST** of the Department of Commerce, issued weekly at a subscription cost of \$1 a year, furnishes a list of Census publications to those for whom early information is important.

This volume was prepared by Morris B. Ullman and Edna E. Goebel under the supervision of Morris H. Hansen. Many other persons on the staff of the Bureau of the Census furnished information of great value in the preparation of this book. The appendix on the 1945 Census of Agriculture was prepared in the Bureau's Agriculture Division, Ray Hurley, Chief, by Henry A. Tucker.

## HOW TO USE THIS PUBLICATION

**CENSUS PUBLICATIONS, 1947, CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE** is designed to aid users of published Census statistics in locating desired information directly, eliminating the examination of hundreds of publications issued by this Bureau. The user of Census materials may discover, by consulting the **SUBJECT GUIDE**, in what particular Census publication or series of publications the data he wishes are published.

All publications issued during the calendar year 1947 are included in the catalog under one of the following subject headings: Agriculture, Business, Foreign Trade, Governments, Industry, Population, and Miscellaneous. The first six headings correspond to the six subject divisions of the Bureau responsible for the issuance of reports in those fields.

The heading "Miscellaneous" includes reports of an over-all nature and technical articles written by staff members. The latter articles are listed as a convenience and are not indexed in the **SUBJECT GUIDE**.

A general description of the data contained in each Census publication is given in the **SUBJECT GUIDE** in a main entry for that report. Thus, the publication **TRACTORS** is listed under the heading "Tractors" in the **SUBJECT GUIDE**.

This main entry description contains the title of the report, the series numbering, the date to which the figures in the report relate, the number of pages, tables, charts, maps, etc., contained in the report, the release date of the report, and an indication of the type of data shown in the report.

In addition to this main entry, there are listed cross references to this entry from subjects or products covered in the given report. Thus, if one were seeking data

on tracklaying tractors, he would find under this heading that various statistics on this product are included in *Facts for Industry*, Series M37A-05, the identifying symbol for the above-mentioned report titled TRACTORS. Then, following the italicized instruction "See Tractors," the seeker of data might consult the main entry for a lengthier discussion of the information contained in the publication in question.

## ORGANIZATION AND PUBLICATION-PROGRAM CHANGES

To assist librarians and others interested in the organization of materials as presented in this volume, the principal changes in the administrative organization of the Bureau of the Census and in the publications program which took place during the year 1947 are summarized below.

### Agriculture Division

During the year 1947, all but one of the reports of the 1945 Census of Agriculture were made available. The last volume, REPORT ON THE 1945 SAMPLE CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE, did not become available until early in 1948. The report was designed to obtain more information about the Nation's farms and their people than was provided by prior censuses of agriculture. The 1945 census included 70 additional questions which were asked of a sample of approximately 6 percent (about 400,000) of the farms. The report shows statistics by States for items for which data were collected on the sample basis and data for farms classified by economic class.

The Appendix to this volume (pages Ai to A25) shows the list of final reports of the 1945 Census of Agriculture and indicates their contents.

The series of reports covering farms of nonwhite farm operators, based on the 1945 Census of Agriculture, has been continued during the year in the Population Division by the specialist in Negro statistics. These releases, the NA Series, include, for the nonwhite farm operator group, the number of farms, land in farms, cropland harvested, and value of land and buildings, by tenure. Other Southern States will be covered in separate releases in this series.

### Business Division

The basic statistics of the RETAIL TRADE REPORTS consist of a series of monthly figures on the trends in total receipts of sales. These figures are arranged to compare the current month's trade volume with that for the previous month and for the current month a year ago. Separate reports were published prior to March 1947 for individual States and for various specified areas. Since that date, the individual reports have been con-

solidated into (1) reports for nine geographic regions in which separate statistics are available for various kinds of retail business for specified cities and counties, and (2) for the country as a whole. Trends in sales and year-end inventories of independent retail stores, 1946 compared with 1945, were published in 1947.

The SERVICE TRADE REPORTS, issued prior to April 1947 in the form of separate one- or two-page releases for the United States and for selected areas, were consolidated into a single four-page release, effective with the April 1947 issue. The kind of business scope of the survey was reduced in July 1947. Starting with that month, data for only five kinds of service business were published, namely: Beauty shops; cleaning and dyeing plants; power laundries; linen supply with laundry facilities; and linen supply without laundry facilities. At the same time, the geographic scope was also curtailed. As a result, the number of areas for which separate data could be shown dropped from the 36 published for June 1947 to the 19 published for July 1947.

One new report was added to the series of trade studies initiated in 1946, TRENDS IN THE JEWELRY TRADE. The reports in this group now show data on trends in the following trades: Drug, Electrical Goods, Grocery, Jewelry, and Tobacco.

Two trade surveys were discontinued during 1947: COFFEE, INVENTORIES AND ROASTINGS, the last release covering data for February 1947; and LUMBER STOCKS IN RETAIL AND WHOLESALE YARDS, the final release covering data for the first quarter of 1947.

The title of one report, CANNED FRUITS AND VEGETABLES, was changed to MONTHLY CANNED FOOD REPORT, effective with release of May 29, 1947, showing data on stocks as of May 1, 1947, and on shipments for April 1947. At that time the coverage was changed to include only 14 canned food commodities instead of 55 as previously.

### Foreign Trade Division

During the year it was necessary to reduce the scope of the foreign trade statistics supplied to business, industry, and Government agencies. Available funds made it necessary to curtail the scope and content of a number of the publications.

The following foreign trade reports were discontinued during the year. (The date in parenthesis represents the latest period for which the report is available.)

Two current reports on imports and exports, respectively, were consolidated and changes were made in their contents, effective with reports covering data for February 1947:

FT 120—UNITED STATES GENERAL IMPORTS OF MERCHANDISE. COUNTRY OF ORIGIN BY COMMODITY. Issued as three sections (A, B, and C) before February 1947, and as COUNTRY OF ORIGIN BY SUBGROUP, one consolidated report, thereafter.

FT 420—UNITED STATES EXPORTS OF DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MERCHANDISE. COUNTRY OF DESTINATION BY COMMODITY. Issued in nine sections (A through I) before February 1947, and as COUNTRY OF DESTINATION BY SUBGROUP, one consolidated report, thereafter.

Current foreign trade reports, which are available on a free basis or on payment of a nominal charge, are listed in the CATALOG OF CURRENT CENSUS PUBLICATIONS and also in a separate catalog, MONTHLY UNITED STATES FOREIGN TRADE STATISTICAL PUBLICATIONS, both available on request from the Bureau of the Census.

In addition to these reports, there are a number of monthly foreign trade statistical reports which are prepared on a cost basis. These releases contain information not available or not readily available in the reports listed in the catalogs. A list of these monthly summaries is available on request. A statement regarding revision in distribution of current reports appears on page 9.

### Governments Division

During 1947 the scope of the publication program in the field of governments was reduced, and the organization of the several series of publications was altered. The two most important reductions in scope are the elimination of all reports on elections and the elimination of the separate individual-government financial pamphlets for the 48 States and the 37 largest cities. The latter change meant abandoning the former arrangement into three annual "volumes" in each series (volume 1, individual-government reports; volume 2, topical reports; volume 3, statistical compendium). A simple set of consecutive numbers has been assigned to the several reports constituting each of these two series.

Changes in numbering and titles are effective with the following reports: STATE FINANCES: 1947; CITY FINANCES: 1946; COUNTY FINANCES: 1946; GOVERNMENTAL FINANCES IN THE UNITED STATES: 1947; and GOVERNMENT EMPLOYMENT: 1948. To achieve consistency from year to year, numbering of reports is related to subject matter rather than sequence of issuance. For example, reports numbered 3 and 4 of the "STATE FINANCES: 1947" series will be available before reports numbered 1 and 2.

A two-page summary of publications in this field, "CENSUS BUREAU PUBLICATIONS ON GOVERNMENTS," is available on request.

### Industry Division

Surveys conducted by the Industry Division provide monthly, quarterly, and annual Facts for Industry reports on the output of many important manufactured commodities for which information is not publicly available from other sources. They are an important source of information on the short-term industrial activity of the country. The commodities covered, with few exceptions, are those which contribute importantly to changes in the physical volume of production and in the volume of business transactions. Thus they provide a valuable set of measures of the current activity of a large segment of American manufacturing.

In the Industry part of the CATALOG in this volume, starting on page 16, a note has been added to the listing of each release in which a change has occurred during the year. The date the change took place, the old and the new series numbering, and other historical data are given in the notes. These notes are also carried in the main entry for each publication in the SUBJECT GUIDE section of this volume.

Among the more important changes which were initiated during the year are the following: New reports were released on aircraft engines, machine tools, household furniture, and china tableware; final reports were released for the surveys of home and farm freezers, sewing machines, and concrete products, which have been discontinued; several reports in the apparel group which were previously issued on a monthly basis, most of them through June 1947, are now issued on a quarterly basis; information on resin emulsion paint was included for the first time in the WATER-THINNED PAINT report for July 1947; only annual data is available for lawn mowers for 1947, the last quarterly report being for the fourth quarter of 1946; data on captive steel forgings were collected through June 1947, and since then this report has related only to commercial steel forgings.

Two special series of releases which were undertaken in 1946 were completed during the year 1947. Twenty-six separate releases, each covering allocations of an individual chemical during the war period, were added to the CHEMICALS IN THE WAR PROGRAM series (Facts for Industry, Series 6-8).

Supplemental reports on plant activity, shipments, and unfilled orders for 16 industries were issued. These reports contain information supplementing that previously published in Series 50-3-27, FABRICATED METAL PRODUCTS PLANT OPERATIONS, covering June 1946, the final month for which data in this series were collected. Lists of these series of releases may be found on page 22.

### Population Division

The Population Division of the Bureau of the Census has revised the series designation of its current reports. Hereafter all of these reports will be issued under the general designation, "Current Population Reports."

Each release has a designating number, such as series P-20, No. 1, or series P-27, No. 9. The first part of the number (P-20, P-27, etc.) indicates the release series and the second part (No. 1, No. 9, etc.) designates the specific release within the series. The release numbers will usually be issued in chronological order. When a new series represents an exact replacement of an older series the release numbers of the new series continue the sequence which has already been established. In other cases the release numbers within each series will start with "1." The various new release series are listed below:

#### Population Characteristics.

Series P-20, national figures.—Releases relating to current population in the United States and occasionally in regions or other major divisions of the United States. The population characteristics include marital status, education, school attendance, fertility, migration, and the number and composition of households and families. This series also includes projections of total families and of various population characteristics, such as school attendance and marital status, to various future dates. This series supersedes that portion of series P-47 and PS which related to general population characteristics.

Series P-21, population characteristics in metropolitan districts, April 1947.—A separate release for each of the metropolitan districts included in the April 1947 survey contains statistics on total population, age, sex, color, marital status, school attendance, migration, and household relationship.

Series P-22, local areas.—Releases on population characteristics in cities and metropolitan districts based on various surveys and studies other than the survey of April 1947 (for which see series P-21), or on special censuses (for which see series P-28).

#### Population Estimates.

Series P-25.—Releases on estimated current total population of the United States and current population in States, counties, and cities. Also includes estimates by age, sex, and color, and the projection of the total population to various future dates. This series supersedes that portion of series P-47 which related to estimated population.

#### Farm Population.

Series P-27.—Releases on the number and characteristics of the farm population. Releases in this series are prepared and issued jointly with the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the Department of Agriculture. This series supersedes series Census-BAE and continues the release numbers of that series.

#### Special Censuses.

Series P-28.—Releases presenting results of cen-

suses taken at the request and expense of city and local governments. All of these censuses are based on complete enumerations and relate to separate cities. A few of them relate to counties or other units. This series supersedes series P-SC and continues the release numbers of that series.

#### Negro Statistics.

Series P-38.—Releases on characteristics of the Negro population and the nonwhite population. Also includes releases containing information on the number and kind of national, regional, and State Negro organizations and their convention dates, and releases relating to the number, distribution, and circulation of newspapers and periodicals issued by enterprises owned and operated by Negroes. This series supersedes series NP and NEGRO STATISTICAL BULLETINS. Release series NA, which presents data from the 1945 Census of Agriculture on farms of nonwhite farm operators will be continued in its present form until completed.

#### Labor Force.

Series P-50, national figures.—Releases containing special analyses of the labor force, employment, unemployment, occupation, industry, and related data for the United States and occasionally for regions. Also includes projections of the total labor force and of selected labor force characteristics to various future dates. This series supersedes the LABOR FORCE BULLETINS and that portion of series PS which related to labor force characteristics.

Series P-51, labor force characteristics in metropolitan districts, April 1947.—A separate release for each of the metropolitan districts included in the April 1947 survey contains statistics on the labor force, employment, unemployment, hours of work, occupation, and industry.

Series P-52, local areas.—Releases on labor force characteristics in cities and metropolitan districts based on various surveys and studies other than the survey of April, 1947 (for which see series P-51).

Series P-57, MONTHLY REPORT ON THE LABOR FORCE.—The monthly releases in this series are the basic series of monthly estimates of the total labor force, civilian labor force, employment, unemployment, hours of work, and number of persons not in the labor force for the United States. This series of releases represents a continuation of series MRLF and continues the release numbers of that series.

Series P-58, supplement to the MONTHLY REPORT ON THE LABOR FORCE.—The monthly releases in this series present labor force and employment characteristics of the population of the United

States classified by age and sex. They also present further detail on class of worker, hours worked, duration of unemployment, and (at quarterly intervals) occupation. These data are obtained in the same monthly current population survey as the data for series P-57. This series represents a continuation of the series of supplements to the MONTHLY REPORT ON THE LABOR FORCE which was started with the supplement for March, 1947, and continues the release numbers of that series.

#### Consumer Income.

Series P-60.—Releases presenting statistics on consumer income, including the proportion of families and individuals at the various levels of total income, civilian earnings, wages and salaries, and the relationship of consumer income to size of family, sex, occupation, and other characteristics.

#### Housing.

Series P-70, national figures.—Releases presenting statistics on housing characteristics in the United States and occasionally by regions. The information includes the number and characteristics of vacant dwelling units and of occupied units. Housing characteristics include type of structure, number of rooms, monthly rent, plumbing equipment, housing facilities, and housing equipment. Releases in this series are similar in content to those in series H-46 which it replaces.

Series P-71, housing characteristics in metropolitan districts, April, 1947.—A separate release for each of the metropolitan districts included in the April, 1947 survey contains statistics on the total number of dwelling units, number of occupied units, and on the characteristics of housing, including type of structure, number of rooms, monthly rent, plumbing equipment, housing equipment, and housing facilities.

Series P-72, local areas.—Releases on housing characteristics in cities and metropolitan districts based on various surveys and studies other than the survey of April, 1947 (for which see series P-71).

#### Prisoners.

Series P-80.—Releases based on the annual census of prisoners in State and Federal prisons and reformatories. The releases present statistics on the characteristics of persons admitted to and discharged from prisons and on the movement of prison population. This series supersedes series PN and continues the release numbers of that series.

#### Mental Institutions.

Series P-85.—Releases based on the annual census of patients in mental institutions. The releases present statistics on the characteris-

tics of patients admitted to and separated from mental institutions, on the number of inmates, and on the size and characteristics of the staff of mental institutions. This series supersedes series MP and continues the release numbers of that series.

NOTE.—The last annual report on patients in mental institutions to be completed by the Census Bureau will be that published for the year 1946. The preparation of this report has been transferred to the Public Health Service of the Federal Security Agency.

#### Judicial Criminal Statistics.

Statistics are no longer collected by the Bureau on this subject. The report showing 1945 data is the final one in this annual series.

### International Statistics

Under cooperative agreement with the Library of Congress, the Bureau of the Census publishes a series of bibliographies useful to persons doing research in foreign statistics. This joint project known as the Census-Library Project, is conducted primarily for the purpose of providing an index of foreign census publications located in United States Government agencies in Washington. The first bibliography on foreign statistical publications, published in 1943, was entitled "GENERAL CENSUSES AND VITAL STATISTICS IN THE AMERICAS." The second, issued early in 1948 and available for purchase at the United States Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C. (price 40 cents), is entitled "NATIONAL CENSUSES AND VITAL STATISTICS IN EUROPE 1918-1939." A third, also to be published early in 1948, is entitled "STATE CENSUSES—AN ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY OF CENSUSES OF POPULATION TAKEN AFTER THE YEAR 1800 BY STATES AND TERRITORIES OF THE UNITED STATES."

### Miscellaneous

The Bureau of the Census issues every year a number of general and methodological publications. During 1947, reports of a special character falling within this category include those mentioned below:

The COUNTY DATA BOOK, a Supplement to the STATISTICAL ABSTRACT, was issued during the past year. This volume presents data for States, for metropolitan areas and metropolitan counties, and for counties, on population, labor force, housing, agriculture, industry, and retail trade, and other economic data. It is available from the Superintendent of Documents. (Price \$2.75, buckram.)

The MEASUREMENT OF GEOGRAPHIC AREA, available from the Superintendent of Documents for \$1.50 a copy, summarizes the investigations made to assist in selecting a suitable method for remeasuring the States, counties, and minor civil divisions of the United States for the Census of 1940.

A CHAPTER IN POPULATION SAMPLING, available from the Superintendent of Documents, for \$1 a copy, describes a method for picking a population sample along

with appropriate sampling theory. The particular application discussed in this volume is the so-called sample censuses of congested areas taken by the Bureau in 1944.

Among the manuals and handbooks prepared for use by the Bureau's staff, two were of sufficient general interest to be made available for purchase from the Superintendent of Documents during the past year. These two booklets and their prices are "HOW TO READ AERIAL PHOTOGRAPHS FOR CENSUS WORK," price 20

cents, and "HANDBOOK FOR ENUMERATORS," price 20 cents. A 52-page booklet, "FACT FINDER FOR THE NATION," was prepared, describing the work of the Bureau of the Census. The initial supply has been distributed, but a revised edition will be available early in 1948.

For information of users of Census materials, a list of technical articles prepared by Census staff members and published during 1947, is given on pages 30 and 31. These articles are not indexed in the SUBJECT GUIDE.

## BUSINESS DIVISION

Complete Censuses of Business were taken for the years 1929, 1933, 1935, and 1939. The first and the last of these were taken as part of the Decennial Census, 1930 and 1940. The other two were special projects. The next authorized Census of Business will be taken in 1950 covering 1949, unless present legislation is revised. The current reports on business as outlined below were the only publications in this field issued during the period covered by this catalog.

## GOVERNMENTS DIVISION

The Governments Division collects data and prepares reports showing current and bench mark statistical data relating to the characteristics and functions of State and local governments and their administration in the United States. Primary attention is given to public finances (revenue, expenditure, debt, enterprises, etc.) and public employment (number of employees and amount of pay roll). For the years ending in "2" a decennial Census of Governments is taken. # APPENDIX

## Publications of the 1945 Census of Agriculture

The completion of the 1945 Census of Agriculture makes possible the preparation of a list of the final reports of that census and a consolidated index to the contents of the principal volumes. Such a list and index are included in this publication.

### Reports included:

The index, starting on page A1, shows the reports which include information on a particular subject and the table or page number in the volume on which this information appears. The volumes included in the index and the explanation of the indexes therefor are as follows:

**Vol. I—STATISTICS FOR COUNTIES.**—This volume is published in 33 separate parts, each part covering a State or a small group of States and each containing the same tables numbered uniformly. The following pages show in the first column, the county table number; that is, the number of the table containing county information. The second column gives the number of the table showing data for States. These numbers are uniform in all parts.

Text explanations and definitions are included in Volume I but are generally more comprehensive in Volume II. Citations of these explanations and definitions are therefore given only for Volume II. Each part of Volume I has an introduction and an appendix describing the survey, presenting definitions, and showing the schedules used. A separate index is included in each volume.

**Vol. II, GENERAL REPORT—STATISTICS BY SUBJECTS.**—This is the principal report of the 1945 Census of Agriculture and contains an introduction and an appendix which describe the census and show what information was collected and tabulated; full definitions for each of the topics covered; data for the United States as a whole for three regions (the North, the South, and the West), for the nine standard geographic divisions, and for each State; and considerable graphic material.

The third column in the following pages shows the page of Volume II on which the text discussion of each subject appears. Column 4 gives the page which shows charts and maps for the subject, or facsimiles of the schedule, and column 5 indicates the page on which the data will be found. If the page number is shown in bold-face type in column 5, the data are for divisions and States. If the page number is in roman type, only summary United States data are shown.

In addition to the single volume, the chapters have been printed as separates as shown in the list on page Av. In each of these separate chapters the page numbering of the original volume has been maintained.

Each separate also includes the Introduction and the Appendix.

In indexing the data in Volume II, references are primarily to the base data. If derived data (percentages, averages, etc.) are shown in the same table with the base data, the reference is not repeated. If, however, derived data are shown without the base data, the page number is given. Items not covered by the 1945 Census, for which data are shown, are followed by the latest census year for which data are available.

**SPECIAL REPORT OF MULTIPLE-UNIT OPERATIONS IN SELECTED AREAS OF SOUTHERN STATES (MULTIPLE-UNIT OPERATIONS.)**—This special report presents detailed data on the pattern of farm operations found in southern States. In the main, this report is limited to entire States, or parts of States, in which multiple-unit operations are most important. Statistics are included for 567 counties in nine States—all of the counties in Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, and South Carolina; 46 counties in Arkansas; 7 in Missouri; 80 in North Carolina; and 16 in Virginia. The tables in the report on multiple-unit operations are divided into three types, each comprising one part of the volume. Part 1 includes four county tables for each State shown. These tables are indicated in the index by a C preceding the table number. Part 2 shows statistics by type-of-farming areas, and each of the five tables in this part is preceded by a T. Part 3 is a section which shows statistics for multiple units only. Each of the three tables in this part is preceded by an M. Column 6 shows the appropriate table number which includes statistics on the subject in each of these three parts.

In preparing this index, cognizance was taken of the fact that the term "unit" as used in this report is the same as the term "farm" as used in other reports of the Census of Agriculture. Thus, the reference to "Land in units" appears in the index under "Land in farms."

**RANKING AGRICULTURAL COUNTIES.**—One of the most popular of the publications of the Census of Agriculture has been one showing the leading agricultural counties for various items. The report for 1945 is included in this index. Column 7 shows the table number for each of the subjects included.

**SPECIAL REPORT ON THE 1945 SAMPLE CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE.**—To meet the demand for more information than could be accommodated within the administrative limits of the 1945 Census of Agriculture, a technique was adopted which called for using a basic schedule for all farms and then asking certain additional information for a designated sample of farms.

This report presents the available data for the supplementary items for which information was obtained on a sample basis as well as certain statistics included in the complete census for farms included in the sample. A description of the sample and a statement on the sampling reliability of the estimates are included in the introduction. Column 8 gives the table number in this report which shows information on each of the subjects included.

**Reports not included:**

Not included in this index are three companion reports, now in press, with statistics by States for items for which data were collected on a sample basis. These reports are "FARMS AND FARM CHARACTERISTICS"—(1) BY SIZE OF FARM, (2) BY VALUE OF PRODUCTS, AND (3) BY TYPE OF FARM.

Three reports, not included in this index, were prepared jointly by the Bureau of the Census and the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the Department of Agriculture. Two of these include, primarily in graphic

form, material from this census as well as from other sources. They are "GRAPHIC SUMMARY OF LAND UTILIZATION IN THE UNITED STATES" and "GRAPHIC SUMMARY OF FARM TENURE IN THE UNITED STATES." The third is "FARM-MORTGAGE DEBT IN THE UNITED STATES: 1945," which is a brief 14-page report.

Three press releases of the 1945 Census of Agriculture entitled "FARM CENSUS SHOWS ONE-TENTH OF THE COTTON FARMS GROW TWO-FIFTHS OF THE COTTON CROP," "FARM CENSUS SHOWS SUBSTANTIAL INCREASE IN IRRIGATED LAND," AND "FARM CENSUS REPORT SHOWS CHARACTERISTICS OF FARMS CLASSIFIED BY TYPE AND SIZE OF FARM" have not been included in this index.

Summary data from this census, together with statistics from other governmental and nongovernmental sources, are included in the STATISTICAL ABSTRACT OF THE UNITED STATES, published annually by the Bureau of the Census and available from the Superintendent of Documents, United States Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C.
