The results of the 1950 Census of Agriculture, Irrigation, and Drainage will be released in published form as they are tabulated and assembled. These data will be issued as preliminary reports immediately after they have been compiled and later as final reports in bound volumes.

Preliminary Reports: Series AC50-1

Four-page multilithed reports will be issued for each county, State and Territory and one or more summary reports for continental United States. They will give data for 1950 on the number of farms, farm acreage, farm tenure, farm facilities, farm equipment and expenditures, farms classified by value of products and type of farm, value of products sold, number of various kinds of livestock products, acreage and production of crops. The reports will contain comparative figures for the 1945 Census for most items. The series will be issued as data become available and will continue until all areas are complete, probably through October 1951.

Area Bulletins²

The bulletins in the series 1-R, 1-W, and 1-S replace the 1948 Census of Business Preliminary Release Series BC-1P for the States and their counties, and the District of Columbia.

They will include separate Retail, Wholesale, and Service Trade Bulletins for each State, as well as for continental United States. For the Territories of Alaska and Hawaii, single bulletins combine data for the major trade categories. Data in State bulletins are limited to basic Census information on number of establishments, sales and receipts, pay roll, employees, proprietors, and unpaid family workers, classified by area and kind of business. Data are shown for the State as a whole, for each standard metropolitan area (as defined by the Bureau of the Budget, as of June 5, 1950), for each county, and each city of 2,500 inhabitants or more (for wholesale trade, for each city of 5,000 inhabitants or more).

For cities and counties, with relatively few business establishments, data are presented only for broad kind-of-business groups; for States, metropolitan areas, and for larger counties and cities, data are shown in greater detail. Detail published is essentially determined by requirements of the provisions of the Census law which are directed at preventing disclosure of figures for individual businesses.

INTRODUCTION

HOW TO USE THIS PUBLICATION

The CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE OF CENSUS PUBLICATIONS is designed to give users of published Census statistics a direct method of locating needed information. The catalog section contains detailed descriptive information relating to the published reports and is followed by two indices, an index to reports by geographic areas, and an index to reports by subject.

The entries in the two indices are directly keyed to the reports listed in the catalog by the use of a reference numbering system. All publications are arranged in the catalog by general subject field, following the organization pattern of the Bureau, namely: 1. Agriculture; 2. Business; 3. Foreign Trade; 4. Governments; 5. Industry; 6. Population and Housing; and 7. Miscellaneous. The first digit of the reference number designates the major subject within which the report is listed. Thus, all Agriculture Division reports have reference numbers beginning with 1; reference numbers for all Business Division reports have 2 in the first digit, etc. The second part of the reference number further classifies the reports by broad categories. For example, Business Division reports on Retail Trade are classified under 2-21; Wholesale Trade, 2-22; Trade Studies, 2-23; etc. Reports carrying a series number are further identified by the series number shown in parentheses following the group reference number.

The user of the CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE may first consult either the index by geographic areas or the index by subject and secure the reference number or numbers shown for the item on which he is looking for information. The reference number is then used as a key in locating the desired reports in the catalog section. For convenience, the reference number for the first entry on each page is shown on the upper outside corner of each page in the catalog section. In order to avoid the indexing of large lists of commodities, general references are made in those instances where coverage is all inclusive; reports are listed under specific commodities only when they are limited to the specific item.

RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER CATALOGS AND GUIDES

The CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE is issued on a current basis each quarter and cumulated to the annual volume. A monthly LIST OF PUBLICATIONS ISSUED, which does not include regular monthly and quarterly publications, enables users to be informed more currently on publications as they appear, and will be furnished regularly on request, by the Bureau of the Census.

INTRODUCTION

The record of the Bureau of the Census publications since the first Census in 1790 is available in the "Catalog of United States Census Publications 1790-1945" (Government Printing Office, \$1.50). This catalog was prepared by the Census Library Project sponsored by the Library of Congress and the Bureau of the Census. Publications issued after 1945 are shown in the annual issues of CENSUS PUBLICATIONS CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE, which is available for 1946 and subsequent years.

The BUSINESS SERVICE CHECK LIST of the Department of Commerce, issued weekly at a subscription cost of \$1 a year, includes a list of Census publications.

This volume was prepared in the Statistical Reports Section of the Office of the Assistant Director for Statistical Standards. The Bureau will appreciate receiving any suggestions and comments from librarians and other users on the effectiveness of this CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE.

HOW TO OBTAIN BUREAU OF THE CENSUS PUBLICATIONS

Priced publications, except as otherwise noted in this catalog, can be purchased from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington 25, D. C., or from the U. S. Department of Commerce Field Offices which are listed on the back cover. The exceptions are the preliminary releases for the 1950 Censuses of Agriculture, Population, and Housing which can be ordered from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C. 1. AGRICULTURE DIVISION

The first National Census of Agriculture was taken in 1840, and since then a census of agriculture has been taken in conjunction with the census of population in each decennial enumeration. A mid-decennial agriculture census was initiated January 1, 1925; thus, there has been a Federal Census of Agriculture every fifth year since 1920.

Each year the Agriculture Division collects statistics and issues periodic reports on cotton ginnings and production. Twelve reports on cotton ginned prior to specific dates are prepared and issued each year on dates prescribed by Congress.

1-10. 1950 CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE

The results of the 1950 Census of Agriculture, Irrigation, and Drainage are being released as preliminary reports immediately after they have been compiled and later as final reports in bulletins and bound volumes.

PRELIMINARY REPORTS

Four-page reports are being issued in Series AC50-1 for each county, State, and Territory and one or more summary reports for continental United States. There will be no charge for one copy for a single area; additional copies are priced at 20 cents for lots of 10 or fewer reports, and the price is \$60 per set including all counties, States, and the United States. 2. BUSINESS DIVISION

Complete Censuses of Business were taken for the years 1929, 1933, 1935, 1939, and 1948. Those for 1929 and 1939 were taken as part of the 1930 and 1940 Decennial Censuses; those for 1933 and 1935 were special projects. The Census of Business will be taken next in 1954 covering 1953 and every fifth year thereafter simultaneously with the Census of Manufactures.

Current reports are issued monthly showing trends in retail sales and in wholesale sales and inventories. An annual survey is made of independent retail establishments showing trends in sales and inventories. Trend reports, bringing together data for various aspects of trade, are also issued monthly.

2-10. 1948 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

AREA BULLETINS¹

The bulletins in the series 1-R, 1-W, and 1-S replace the 1948 Census of Business Preliminary Release Series BC-1P for the States and their counties, and the District of Columbia.

They include separate Retail, Wholesale, and Service Trade Bulletins for each State, as well as for continental United States. For the Territories of Alaska and Hawaii, single bulletins combine data for the major trade categories. Data in Area bulletins are limited to basic Census information on number of establishments, sales and receipts, payroll, employees, proprietors, and unpaid family workers, classified by area and kind of business. Data are shown for the State as a whole, for each standard metropolitan area (as defined by the Bureau of the Budget, as of June 5, 1950), for each county, and each city of 2,500 inhabitants or more (for wholesale trade, for each city of 5,000 inhabitants or more).

For cities and counties with relatively few business establishments, data are presented only for broad kind-of-business groups; for States, metropolitan areas, and for larger counties and cities, data are shown in greater detail. Detail published is essentially determined by requirements of the provisions of the Census law which are directed at preventing disclosure of figures for individual businesses.

4. GOVERNMENTS DIVISION

The Governments Division collects data and prepares reports showing current and bench mark statistical data relating to the characteristics and functions of State and local governments and their administration in the United States. In current reporting, primary attention is given to public finance (revenue, expenditure, debt, and enterprise finances), and public employment (number of employees and amount of payroll). A two-page release entitled "Census Bureau Publications on Governments, as Scheduled for the Fiscal Year 1951" is available upon request.

During the past century, a Census of Governments has been taken at 10-year intervals—most recently for 1942—providing more complete and detailed information on State and local governments than is reported currently. Public Law 767 of the 81st Congress, approved September 7, 1950, requires that such a census be taken for the year 1952 and thereafter at 5-year (rather than 10-year) intervals. This new Act also provides a clearer statutory statement as to the minimum subject content of such censuses.

5. INDUSTRY DIVISION

Current statistics on commodity production are issued in the Facts for Industry series. This series of releases makes available to manufacturers, trade groups, and other users of industrial data, current figures that are useful in their day-to-day operations and forward planning. The current reports also present an accurate picture of industrial trends over a period of time.

Annual surveys of manufactures have been taken for a sample of plants covering 1949 and 1950. Reports for both years will be published in 1951. They will bring up to date the statistics on employment, earnings, man-hours, value added, inventories, expenditures for new plant and equipment, and classes of products, which are shown in more detail in the quinquennial Census reports. All four 1947 Census of Manufactures volumes were issued in 1950: Vol. I, General Summary; Vol. II, Statistics by Industry; Vol. III, Statistics by States; and the Product Supplement. The next Census of Manufactures will be taken in 1954 covering 1953.

A 1949 Puerto Rico Census of Manufactures was undertaken with funds provided by the Government of Puerto Rico and was conducted by the Bureau of the Census working in close cooperation with the Government of Puerto Rico. It covered all manufacturing activity (as defined in Standard Industrial Classification System) on the Island.

M17-1 Animal and Vegetable Fats and Oils: 1945-49

The statistics in this report relate to: (1) consumption and stocks of raw materials used in producing vegetable oils, and (2) factory production, factory consumption, factory and warehouse stocks, imports and exports of animal and vegetable fats and oils.

6. POPULATION AND HOUSING DIVISION

A Census of Population has been taken every 10 years since 1790 and a Census of Housing was taken in 1940 and in 1950. These censuses were last taken as of April 1, 1950, and the results are now being published in a program which will extend over the next 2 years.

Monthly surveys of a scientifically selected sample of the population are conducted, and information on employment, unemployment, hours of work, occupation, etc., are published currently. Also available are estimates of personal and family characteristics of the population, internal migration, housing conditions, etc.

Estimates of population for postcensal and intercensal dates are prepared, and special censuses of local areas are taken at the request and expense of the places involved.

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INTRODUCTION

HOW TO USE THIS PUBLICATION

The CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE OF CENSUS PUBLICATIONS is designed to give users of published Census statistics a direct method of locating needed information. The catalog section contains detailed descriptive information relating to the published reports and is followed by two indices, an index to reports by geographic areas, and an index to reports by subject.

The entries in the two indices are directly keyed to the reports listed in the catalog by the use of a reference numbering system. All publications are arranged in the catalog by general subject field, following the organization pattern of the Bureau, namely: 1. Agriculture; 2. Business; 3. Foreign Trade; 4. Governments; 5. Industry; 6. Population and Housing; and 7. Miscellaneous. The first digit of the reference number designates the major subject within which the report is listed. Thus, all Agriculture Division reports have reference numbers beginning with 1; reference numbers for all Business Division reports have 2 in the first digit, etc. The second part of the reference number further classifies the reports by broad categories. For example, Business Division reports on Retail Trade are classified under 2-21; Wholesale Trade, 2-22; Trade Studies, 2-23; etc. Reports carrying a series number are further identified by the series number shown in parentheses following the group reference number.

The user of the CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE may first consult either the index by geographic areas or the index by subject and secure the reference number or numbers shown for the item on which he is looking for information. The reference number is then used as a key in locating the desired reports in the catalog

section. For convenience, the reference number for the first entry on each page is shown on the upper outside corner of each page in the catalog section. In order to avoid the indexing of large lists of commodities, general references are made in those instances where coverage is all inclusive; reports are listed under specific commodities only when they are limited to the specific item.

RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER CATALOGS AND GUIDES

The CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE is issued on a current basis each quarter and cumulated to the annual volume. A monthly LIST OF PUBLICATIONS ISSUED, which does not include regular monthly and quarterly publications, enables users to be informed more currently on publications as they appear, and will be furnished regularly on request, by the Bureau of the Census.

The record of the Bureau of the Census publications since the first Census in 1790 is available in the "Catalog of United States Census Publications 1790-1945" (Government Printing Office, \$1.50). This catalog was prepared by the Census Library Project sponsored by the Library of Congress and the Bureau of the Census. Publications issued after 1945 are shown in the annual issues of CENSUS PUBLICATIONS CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE, which is available for 1946 and subsequent years.

The BUSINESS SERVICE CHECK LIST of the Department of Commerce, issued weekly at a subscription cost of \$1.50 a year, includes a list of Census publications.

This volume was prepared in the Statistical Reports Section of the Office of the Assistant Director for Statistical Standards. The Bureau will appreciate receiving any suggestions and comments from librarians and other users on the effectiveness of this CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE.

HOW TO OBTAIN BUREAU OF THE CENSUS PUBLICATIONS

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Unpriced publications may be obtained from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C. When requesting publications, please be as specific as possible. Mailing lists or paid subscription lists are maintained for some of the recurring reports.

Supplies of publications are limited. Priority in meeting requests will be given to government agencies, large public libraries, school officials, and certain other groups when the reports are needed for official use or will be made available to large numbers of users of data.

CATALOG OF PUBLICATIONS ISSUED DURING JANUARY-JUNE 1951

1. AGRICULTURE DIVISION

The first National Census of Agriculture was taken in 1840, and since then a census of agriculture has been taken in conjunction with the census of population in each decennial enumeration. A mid-decennial agriculture census was initiated January 1, 1925; thus, there has been a Federal Census of Agriculture every fifth year since 1920.

Each year the Agriculture Division collects statistics and issues periodic reports on cotton ginnings and production. Twelve reports on cotton ginned prior to specific dates are prepared and issued each year on dates prescribed by Congress.

1-10. 1950 CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE

The results of the 1950 Census of Agriculture, Irrigation, and Drainage are being released as preliminary reports immediately after they have been compiled and later as final reports in bulletins and bound volumes.

PRELIMINARY REPORTS

Four-page reports are being issued in Series AC50-1 for each county, State, and Territory and one or more summary reports for continental United States. There will be no charge for one copy for a single area; additional copies are priced at 20 cents for lots of 10 or fewer reports, and the price is \$60 per set including all counties, States, and the United States. Orders should be addressed to the Director, Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C., with checks payable to the Treasurer of the United States.

Reports in Series AC50-2 give the number of farms in each county, by State, according to the 1950 Census of Agriculture, together with figures for 1945.

AC50-1 Farms, Farm Characteristics, Farm Products

Reports give 1950 data for individual counties and States on the number of farms, farm acreage, farm tenure, farm facilities, farm equipment and expenditures, farms classified

by value of products and type of farm, value of products sold, number of various kinds of livestock products, acreage and production of crops, with comparative figures for the 1945 Census for most items. The reports are numbered according to a geographic code. The series will probably be completed by November 1951.

2. BUSINESS DIVISION

Complete Censuses of Business were taken for the years 1929, 1933, 1935, 1939, and 1948. Those for 1929 and 1939 were taken as part of the 1930 and 1940 Decennial Censuses; those for 1933 and 1935 were special projects. The Census of Business will be taken next in 1954 covering 1953 and every fifth year thereafter simultaneously with the Census of Manufactures.

Current reports are issued monthly showing trends in retail sales and in wholesale sales and inventories. An annual survey is made of independent retail establishments showing trends in sales and inventories. Trend reports, bringing together data for various aspects of trade, are also issued monthly.

2-10. 1948 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

The results of the 1948 Census of Business are being made available in six general sets of reports: (1) Preliminary county and summary State releases issued during 1950; (2) final Area Bulletins (States, including data for metropolitan areas, counties and cities) issued in 1950 and early part of 1951; (3) Trade releases, by kind of business issued during first quarter 1951; (4) Subject Bulletin Advance Releases; (5) Subject Bulletins; and (6) Trade Bulletins.

AREA BULLETINS

The bulletins in the series 1-R, 1-W, and 1-S replace the 1948 Census of Business Preliminary Release Series BC-IP for the States and their counties, and the District of Columbia.

They include separate Retail, Wholesale, and Service Trade Bulletins for each State, as well as for continental United States. For the Territories of Alaska and Hawaii, single bulletins combine data for the major trade categories. Data in Area bulletins are limited to basic Census information on number of establishments, sales and receipts, payroll, employees, proprietors, and unpaid family workers, classified by area and kind of business. Data are shown for the State as a whole, for each standard metropolitan area (as defined by the Bureau of the Budget, as of June 5, 1950), for each county, and each city of 2,500 inhabitants or more (for wholesale trade, for each city of 5,000 inhabitants or more).

For cities and counties with relatively few business establishments, data are presented only for broad kind-of-business groups; for States, metropolitan areas, and for larger counties and cities, data are shown in greater detail. Detail published is essentially determined by requirements of the provisions of the Census law which are directed at preventing disclosure of figures for individual businesses.

SUBJECT BULLETINS

The bulletins in the Series 2-R, 2-W, and 2-S provide final 1948 Census of Business figures, not previously released, on a variety of topics in the retail, wholesale and service trades. They are designed to supplement information previously released in the Area Bulletin Series. The geographic detail in which subjects are treated varies with the particular subject heading being presented. A single bulletin covering all subjects for all three trade divisions will be issued for Alaska and a similar one will be issued for Hawaii. These bulletins will be consolidated for inclusion in the seven 1948 Census of Business volumes to be issued later in 1951.

Merchandise line bulletins. The merchandise line statistics for retail kinds of business have been grouped in a series of bulletins as follows: Food group; Eating and Drinking Places; General Merchandise Group and General Stores; Apparel Group; Furniture, Furnishings, Appliance Group; Automotive Group and Gasoline Service Stations; Lumber, Building, Hardware Group; Drug and Proprietary Stores; Miscellaneous Kinds of Business. Presented in each bulletin are the sales of each merchandise line, the number of stores handling or reporting the line, and the total sales of such stores. These statistics permit an evaluation of (1) the sales volume of the merchandise line relative to the total sales of all stores in a particular kind of business, (2) the proportion of stores in a kind of business which handle the line, and (3) the sales of the line relative to the total sales of stores in that kind of business handling the line. Included in the text of the appendix of each bulletin is an explanation of terms and definitions of kind-of-business classifications.

4. Sales by Class of Customer. 35 cents

This bulletin analyzes the 1948 sales of wholesale establishments by class of customer. Domestic sales of wholesale (except petroleum bulk stations and terminals) establishments are classified to show: (a) sales to retailers; (b) sales to industrial, commercial, professional, and institutional users; (c) sale to other wholesale organizations; and (d) sales to household and individual users (retail sales). Export sales of wholesale establishments are classified separately from domestic sales. Petroleum bulk stations and terminals were asked to analyze their sales, excluding gasoline and other turnover taxes, to show sales to resellers separately from sales to users or customers. Data are presented for the United States as a whole and for each of the 32 Standard Metropolitan Areas with 500,000 or more inhabitants in 1950.

14. Petroleum Bulk Stations and Terminals. 40 cents

This bulletin contains information on the 1948 operations of petroleum bulk stations and distributing terminals. Tables include basic information on number of establishments, sales (excluding taxes), operating expenses, pay roll, personnel, and stocks, by geographic division and State; commodity line sales for the United States and geographic divisions; dollar and gallonage sales of specified petroleum products for geographic divisions, States, and counties; and storage capacity by geographic division and State.

Business establishments are classified, for Census purposes, according to their primary operation during the Census year. As this publication deals primarily with the distribution of bulk petroleum products, data on establishments primarily engaged in selling packaged petroleum products are not included here, but they are included in other Census of Business publications and classified according to their type of operation. Firms handling bulk petroleum products as secondary lines are not included in this study. Stations conducting a combined wholesale-retail business are classified according to their major activity during the Census year.

Data in all tables, except table 14B, are exclusive of operations of liquefied petroleum gas stations and distributing terminals. Sales made directly from petroleum refiners to industrial or other users are not included. Transfers from bulk stations

to gasoline service stations operated by the same company as the bulk plant, however, are included in the data. There is duplication in the data reported in this bulletin to the extent that refiner-marketers sell from district offices, terminals, or the larger bulk stations to "jobbers" who operate bulk stations.

5. Legal Form of Organization. 20 cents

This bulletin presents 1948 establishments, receipts, payroll, and personnel figures for the service trades, amusements, hotels and tourist courts, classified by legal form of organization. For service trades and amusements, data are shown for the United States, by kind of business, and in totals for each of these groups, by geographic division and State. Subjects covered include basic establishment, receipts, payroll, and personnel data; analysis of total receipts by major sources; analysis of wholesale receipts by major sources; laundry and cleaning receipts by method of delivery; and trucks operated by laundries, cleaning and dyeing plants, and related services.

10. Hotels. 35 cents

Detailed 1948 data for hotels for the United States as a whole, for geographic divisions, States, selected standard metropolitan areas and for selected cities. Statistics are presented for both year-round hotels and seasonal hotels. Tables present basic data on number of establishments, receipts, payroll, and personnel; analysis of receipts by major sources; analysis by size based on volume of receipts; number of guest rooms, and number of employees; city-size data; supplemental compensation received by employees; percentage of occupancy; legal form of organization; period of acquisition or establishment; guest rooms available for transient and residential guests; and comparative statistics for 1948 and 1939.

Statistical information on United States imports and exports of merchandise and of gold and silver is compiled from information contained in shippers' export declarations and import entries, filed with Collectors of Customs by exporters and importers and transmitted to the Bureau. The statistics compiled include information on the dollar value, and net quantity (bales, square yards, gallons, etc.) of United States imports and exports by commodities, countries of origin and destination, and customs districts through which the merchandise enters and leaves the United States and trade with U. S. Territories and possessions. In addition, information is compiled on the shipping weight and dollar value of vessel imports and exports, the domestic to foreign port of routing of the shipments by vessel and the nationality of the carrier for shipments by vessel. Information is also available on the number and tonnage of vessels entering and clearing in the foreign trade of the United States.

Current monthly and quarterly statistics are preliminary and subject to revision. Preliminary annual data are available in the format of the current monthly reports. All data for the year are summarized in the final report, *Foreign Commerce and Navigation of the United States*.

4. GOVERNMENTS DIVISION

The Governments Division collects data and prepares reports showing current and bench mark statistical data relating to the characteristics and functions of State and local governments and their administration in the United States. In current reporting, primary attention is given to public finance (revenue, expenditure, debt, and enterprise finances), and public employment (number of employees and amount of payroll). A two-page release entitled "Census Bureau Publications on Governments, as Scheduled for the Fiscal Year 1951" is available upon request.

During the past century, a Census of Governments has been taken at 10-year intervals—most recently for 1942—providing more complete and detailed information on State and local governments than is reported currently. Public Law 767 of the 81st Congress, approved September 7, 1950, requires that such a census be taken for the year 1952 and thereafter at 5-year (rather than 10-year) intervals. This new Act also provides a clearer statutory statement as to the minimum subject content of such censuses.

5. INDUSTRY DIVISION

Current statistics on commodity production are issued in the Facts for Industry series. This series of releases makes available to manufacturers, trade groups, and other users of industrial data, current figures that are useful in their day-to-day operations and forward planning. The current reports also present an accurate picture of industrial trends over a period of time.

Annual surveys of manufactures have been taken for a sample of plants covering 1949 and 1950. Reports for both years will be published in 1951. They will bring up to date the statistics on employment, earnings, man-hours, value added, inventories, expenditures for new plant and equipment, and classes of products, which are shown in more detail in the quinquennial Census reports. All four 1947 Census of Manufactures volumes were issued in 1950: Vol. I, General Summary; Vol. II, Statistics by Industry; Vol. III, Statistics by States; and the Product Supplement. 5-3. 1949 ANNUAL SURVEY OF MANUFACTURES

With the Census of Manufactures now on a quinquennial basis, the Annual Surveys of Manufactures are designed to provide a current series of the key statistical measures of industrial activity. They cover approximately 45,000 plants out of about 240,000 manufacturing establishments, including all large plants and a representative sample of the much more numerous small plants.

In addition to data on the value of shipments by product classes, the annual surveys provide measures of value added by manufacture, employment, payrolls, inventories, and expenditures for plant and equipment for selected industries and industry groups, for geographic divisions, and for the important industrial States.

6. POPULATION AND HOUSING DIVISION

A Census of Population has been taken every 10 years since 1790 and a Census of Housing was taken in 1940 and in 1950. These censuses were last taken as of April 1, 1950, and the results are now being published in a program which will extend over the next 2 years.

Monthly surveys of a scientifically selected sample of the population are conducted, and information on employment, unemployment, hours of work, occupation, etc., are published currently. Also available are estimates of personal and family characteristics of the population, internal migration, housing conditions, etc.

Estimates of population for postcensal and intercensal dates are prepared, and special censuses of local areas are taken at the request and expense of the places involved.

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INTRODUCTION

HOW TO USE THIS PUBLICATION

The CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE OF CENSUS PUBLICATIONS is designed to give users of published Census statistics a direct method of locating needed information. The catalog section contains detailed descriptive information relating to the published reports and is followed by two indices, an index to reports by geographic areas, and an index to reports by subject.

The entries in the two indices are directly keyed to the reports listed in the catalog by the use of a reference numbering system. All publications are arranged in the catalog by general subject field, following the organization pattern of the Bureau, namely: 1. Agriculture; 2. Business; 3. Foreign Trade; 4. Governments; 5. Industry; 6. Population and Housing; and 7. Miscellaneous. The first digit of the reference number designates the major subject within which the report is listed. Thus, all Agriculture Division reports have reference numbers beginning with 1; reference numbers for all Business Division reports have 2 in the first digit, etc. The second part of the reference number further classifies the reports by broad categories. For example, Business Division reports on Retail Trade are classified under 2-21; Wholesale Trade, 2-22; Trade Studies, 2-23; etc. Reports carrying a series number are further identified by the series number shown in parentheses following the group reference number.

The user of the CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE may first consult either the index by geographic areas or the index by subject and secure the reference number or numbers shown for the item on which he is looking for information. The reference number is then used as a key in locating the desired reports in the catalog section. For convenience, the reference number for the first entry on each page is shown on the upper outside corner of each page in the catalog section. In

order to avoid the indexing of large lists of commodities, general references are made in those instances where coverage is all inclusive; reports are listed under specific commodities only when they are limited to the specific item.

RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER CATALOGS AND GUIDES

The CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE is issued on a current basis each quarter and cumulated to the annual volume. A monthly LIST OF PUBLICATIONS ISSUED, which does not include regular monthly and quarterly publications, enables users to be informed more currently on publications as they appear, and will be furnished regularly on request, by the Bureau of the Census.

The record of the Bureau of the Census publications since the first Census in 1790 is available in the "Catalog of United States Census Publications 1790-1945" (Government Printing Office, \$1.50). This catalog was prepared by the Census Library Project sponsored by the Library of Congress and the Bureau of the Census. Publications issued after 1945 are shown in the annual issues of CENSUS PUBLICATIONS CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE, which is available for 1946 and subsequent years.

The BUSINESS SERVICE CHECK LIST of the Department of Commerce, issued weekly at a subscription cost of \$1.50 a year, includes a list of Census publications.

This volume was prepared in the Statistical Reports Section of the Office of the Assistant Director for Statistical Standards. The Bureau will appreciate receiving any suggestions and comments from librarians and other users on the effectiveness of this CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE.

HOW TO OBTAIN BUREAU OF THE CENSUS PUBLICATIONS

Priced publications, except as otherwise noted in this catalog, can be purchased from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington 25, D. C., or from the U. S. Department of Commerce Field Offices which are listed on the back cover. The exceptions are the preliminary releases for the 1950 Censuses of Agriculture, Population, and Housing which can be ordered from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C. 1. AGRICULTURE DIVISION

The first National Census of Agriculture was taken in 1840, and since then a census of agriculture has been taken in conjunction with the census of population in each decennial enumeration. A mid-decennial agriculture census was initiated January 1, 1925; thus, there has been a Federal Census of Agriculture every fifth year since 1920.

Each year the Agriculture Division collects statistics and issues periodic reports on cotton ginnings and production. Twelve reports on cotton ginned prior to specific dates are prepared and issued each year on dates prescribed by Congress.

1-10. 1950 CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE

The results of the 1950 Census of Agriculture, Irrigation, and Drainage are being released as preliminary reports immediately after they have been compiled and later as final reports in bulletins and bound volumes.

PRELIMINARY REPORTS

Four-page reports are being issued in Series AC50-1 for each county, State, and Territory. One or more summary reports for continental United States are included in series AC50-3. There will be no charge for one copy for a single area; additional copies are priced at 20 cents for lots of 10 or fewer reports, and the price is \$60 per set including all counties, States, and the United States. Orders should be addressed to the Director, Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C., with checks payable to the Treasurer of the United States.

Reports in Series AC50-2 give the number of farms in each county, by State, according to the 1950 Census of Agriculture, together with figures for 1945.

AC50-1 Farms, Farm Characteristics, Farm Products

Reports give 1950 data for individual counties and States on the number of farms, farm acreage, farm tenure, farm facilities, farm equipment and expenditures, farms classified

since 1870 are in running bales, previous to then in 500-pound gross bales. Foreign cotton is shown in equivalent 500-pound gross bales. Some of the data is shown back to 1939, for specified years.

Figures in this report are taken from the Facts for Industry reports, M15-1, M15-3, M17-1, M17-2 (see sec. 5-2), the Foreign Trade Division reports FT 110, and FT 410 (see secs. 3-4 and 3-5), and the Agriculture Division reports on cotton ginning.

2. BUSINESS DIVISION

Complete Censuses of Business were taken for the years 1929, 1933, 1935, 1939, and 1948. Those for 1929 and 1939 were taken as part of the 1930 and 1940 Decennial Censuses; those for 1933 and 1935 were special projects. The Census of Business will be taken next in 1954 covering 1953 and every fifth year thereafter simultaneously with the Census of Manufactures.

Current reports are issued monthly showing trends in retail sales and in wholesale sales and inventories. An annual survey is made of independent retail establishments showing trends in sales and inventories. Trend reports, bringing together data for various aspects of trade, are also issued monthly.

2-10. 1948 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

The 1948 Census of Business, the first taken since 1939, was conducted during 1949 covering 1948, and was an enumeration of business establishments in continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. The results of the 1948 Census of Business are being made available in advance of the final consolidated volumes in the following series: (1) Preliminary county and summary State releases; (2) final Area Bulletins (States, including data for metropolitan areas, counties and cities); (3) Trade releases, by kind of business; (4) Subject Bulletin Advance Releases; (5) Subject Bulletins; and (6) Trade Bulletins.

FINAL REPORTS

Seven volumes will present final results of the 1948 Census of Business. Volumes I to III will cover Retail trade, volumes IV and V, Wholesale trade, and volumes VI and VII, Service trade.

Volumes III, V, and VII consist for the most part of data published in the 1948 Census of Business Area (State) Bulletins, Series 1-R, 1-W, and 1-S, and contain final area statistics for standard metropolitan areas, cities and counties, the District of Columbia, and the Territories of Alaska and Hawaii, as well as for the United States, geographic divisions and States.

Included in the volumes are maps for (1) Standard Metropolitan Areas as a whole; (2) Standard Metropolitan Areas in the Northeastern part of the United States; and (3) the United States by Geographic Division. There are five appendixes: A.—Kind of Business Classifications; B.—Comparison of Kind-of-Business Classification, 1948 and 1939; C.—List of Excluded Cities with 2,500 Inhabitants or More in 1950; D.—Report Forms; E.—Contents of other 1948 Census of Business Volumes.

Page numbers are keyed to chapter numbers by a decimal system. Thus page 0.17 is page 17 in chapter 0 (United States Summary); page 12.15 is page 15 in chapter 12 (Illinois); etc. The first page of each chapter contains a detailed table of contents for that chapter.

The United States Summary chapter includes tables giving establishments, receipts, payroll and personnel data for the personal, business and repair services; amusements; hotels; and tourist courts for the United States and geographic divisions, by kind-of-business—and by States for all trades combined; and establishments and receipts for each kind-of-business group by State and standard metropolitan area.

Separate chapters for each State, the District of Columbia, and two territories include from four to ten tables giving establishments, receipts, payroll and personnel data by kind of business: table 101A—Selected services for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska and Hawaii; table 101B—Amusements for each State, the District of Columbia, Alaska and Hawaii; table 102A—Selected services by standard metropolitan area; table 102B—Amusements, by standard metropolitan area; table 103A—Personal, business and repair services for counties and cities of 2,500 inhabitants or more—total; also, establishments and receipts by kind-of-business group; table 103B—Amusements—for counties and cities of 2,500 or more; table 103C—Hotels—for counties and cities of 2,500 inhabitants or more; table 103D—Tourist courts—for counties; table 104—Personal, business and repair services—for counties with 400 establishments or more; and table 105—Personal, business and repair services—for cities with 400 establishments or more.

AREA BULLETINS

The bulletins in the series 1-R, 1-W, and 1-S replace the 1948 Census of Business Preliminary Release Series BC-IP for the States and their counties, and the District of Columbia.

They include separate Retail, Wholesale, and Service Trade Bulletins for each State, as well as for continental United States. For the Territories of Alaska and Hawaii, single bulletins combine data for the major trade categories. Data in Area bulletins are limited to basic Census information on number of establishments, sales and receipts, payroll, employees, proprietors, and unpaid family workers, classified by area and kind of business. Data are shown for the State as a whole, for each standard metropolitan area (as defined by the Bureau of the Budget, as of June 5, 1950), for each county, and each city of 2,500 inhabitants or more (for wholesale trade, for each city of 5,000 inhabitants or more).

For cities and counties with relatively few business establishments, data are presented only for broad kind-of-business groups; for States, metropolitan areas, and for larger counties and cities, data are shown in greater detail. Detail published is essentially determined by requirements of the provisions of the Census law which are directed at preventing disclosure of figures for individual businesses.

SUBJECT BULLETINS

The bulletins in the Series 2-R, 2-W, and 2-S provide final 1948 Census of Business figures, not previously released, on a variety of topics in the retail, wholesale and service trades. They are designed to supplement information previously released in the Area Bulletin Series. The geographic detail in which subjects are treated varies with the particular subject heading being presented. A single bulletin covering all subjects for all three trade divisions will be issued for Alaska and a similar one will be issued for Hawaii. These bulletins will be consolidated for inclusion in the seven 1948 Census of Business volumes to be issued later in 1951.

Merchandise line bulletins. The merchandise line statistics for retail kinds of business have been grouped in a series of bulletins as follows: Food group; Eating and Drinking Places; General Merchandise Group and General Stores; Apparel Group; Furniture, Furnishings, Appliance Group; Automotive Group and Gasoline Service Stations; Lumber, Building, Hardware Group; Drug and Proprietary Stores; Miscellaneous Kinds of Business. Presented in each bulletin are the sales of each merchandise line, the number of stores handling or reporting the line, and the total sales of such stores. These statistics permit an evaluation of (1) the sales volume of the merchandise line relative to the total sales of all stores in a particular kind of business, (2) the proportion of stores in a kind of business which handle the line, and (3) the sales of the line relative to the total sales of stores in that kind of business handling the

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line. Included in the text of the appendix of each bulletin is an explanation of terms and definitions of kind-of-business classifications.

2. Sales Size. 50 cents

Statistics on Retail Trade by sales size of retail stores, by kind of business, for the United States, geographic divisions, and States. Data on stores, sales, pay roll, and personnel are presented for the United States for all stores, for stores of corporate organizations, and for stores of noncorporate organizations. Stores and sales data by sales size are presented for the United States and for each geographic division by single and multiunits; for the United States, for stores not operated the entire year; and for each State.

3. Single Units and Multiunits. 45 cents

Data for single unit and multiunit stores by kind of business, for the United States, each State, and the 90 metropolitan areas in the country with a 1950 population of 200,000 inhabitants or more. In addition 1948 and 1939 figures are presented by kind of business, covering the retail operations of firms operating four or more retail stores.

5. City Size. 15 cents

Statistics on Retail Trade, by city-size groups, for the United States and for geographic divisions. Stores and sales data for the United States are presented by kind of business for 1948 and 1939; and for 1948 by geographic division. Data on stores, sales, pay roll, and personnel, are presented for all retail kinds of business combined for the United States and geographic divisions.

6. Legal Form of Organization. 55 cents

Data by legal form of organization, by kind of business, for the United States and for each State. Data on stores and sales for 1948 and 1939, by legal form of organization, are presented for the United States, for geographic divisions, and for States. Other tables include stores, sales, pay roll, and employment data for the United States and States, by kind of business; and stores, sales, pay roll, and employment data for proprietorships with active proprietors and those without active proprietors, for the United States by kind of business, and for geographic divisions and States for total Retail Trade.

7. Warehouses, Other Auxiliary Units. 10 cents

Data for warehouses, administrative offices, and other auxiliary units or retail multiunit organizations. Warehouse figures are shown for the United States, geographic divisions, and States. Figures for administrative offices and other auxiliary units are for the United States only.

For warehouses, number of establishments, annual pay roll, sales and billings, inventories, and paid employees and weekly pay roll for selected workweeks are shown for the United States, by kind of business, and for all kinds of business combined, by geographic division and State. For administrative offices and other auxiliary units, number of establishments, annual pay roll, and paid employees and weekly pay roll for selected workweeks are shown for the United States, by kind of business. The selected workweeks for which data are presented are the workweeks ending nearest March 15, July 15, and November 15, 1948. Data for warehouses in this bulletin include the operations of administrative, district, or buying offices or other auxiliary units when the latter are located in warehouses.

The data on employment, pay roll, inventories, sales, etc., included in this bulletin cover only warehouses and administrative offices and other auxiliary units and do not include data for retail stores.

10. Merchandise Inventories. 30 cents

Statistics on the cost value of merchandise inventories held for sale by retail stores at the beginning and end of 1948. Data are shown by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions and States. In addition, inventory data for the United States by kind of business are presented by sales size, for single and multiunit stores,

and for stores of corporate and noncorporate organizations.

This bulletin does not contain data on the merchandise inventories held by warehouses belonging to and servicing retail multiunit stores. Data on inventories held by these establishments are included in the 1948 Census of Business bulletin "Warehouses, Other Auxiliary Units" (2-R-7).

16. Merchandise Line Sales of Food Group. 20 cents

This bulletin presents 1948 sales by merchandise line for eleven kinds of business in the Food Group, namely: Grocery stores, without fresh meat; Grocery stores, with fresh meat; Meat markets; Fish (sea food) markets; Fruit stores, vegetable markets; Candy, nut, confectionery stores; Dairy products stores; Milk dealers; Bakery products stores; Egg, poultry dealers; and Delicatessen stores. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas. No data are presented in this bulletin for "Other food stores," the sales of which constitute less than 1 percent of sales of all stores in the Food Group.

17. Merchandise Line Sales of Eating and Drinking Places. 15 cents

This bulletin presents 1948 sales by merchandise line for four kinds of business in the Eating and Drinking Places Group, namely: Restaurants, cafeterias; Caterers; Lunch counters, refreshment stands; and Drinking places. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas. Data for restaurants, cafeterias and caterers are combined in the tables for geographic divisions, States, and metropolitan areas.

18. Merchandise Line Sales of General Merchandise Group, General Stores. 30 cents

Sales of merchandise lines for four kinds of business in the General merchandise group, namely: Department stores; Dry goods, general merchandise stores; Variety stores; and General stores. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas.

Presented in each table are the sales of each merchandise line, the number of stores handling or reporting the line, and the total sales of such stores.

19. Merchandise Line Sales of Apparel Group. 35 cents

This bulletin presents 1948 sales of merchandise lines for fourteen kinds of business in the Apparel Group, namely: Men's, boys' clothing stores; Men's, boys' furnishings stores; Family clothing stores; Women's ready-to-wear stores; Millinery stores; Hosiery stores; Corset, lingerie stores; Apparel accessory, specialty stores; Men's shoe stores; Women's shoe stores; Family shoe stores; Custom tailors; Furriers, fur shops; and Children's, infants' wear stores. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas. No data are presented in this bulletin for "Children's, juveniles' shoe stores" or "Other apparel stores" the sales of which constitute less than one percent of sales of all stores in the Apparel Group.

20. Merchandise Line Sales of Furniture, Furnishings, Appliance Group. 25 cents

This bulletin presents 1948 sales by merchandise lines for eight kinds of business in the Furniture, Furnishings, Appliance Group, namely: Furniture stores; Floor covering stores; Drapery, curtain, upholstery stores; China, glassware, metalware stores; Antique stores; Other home furnishing stores; Household appliance stores; and Radio stores. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas.

21. Merchandise Line Sales of Automotive Group, Gasoline Service Stations. 30 cents

Sales by merchandise line for gasoline service stations and seven kinds of business in the automotive group, namely: Motor vehicle (new and used) dealers; Motor vehicle (used) dealers; Tire, battery, accessory dealers; Motorcycle dealers; Aircraft dealers; Boat dealers; and Other automotive dealers. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas.

Presented in each table are the sales of each merchandise line, the number of stores handling or reporting the line, and the total sales of such stores.

22. Merchandise Line Sales of Lumber, Building, Hardware Group. 25 cents

This bulletin presents 1948 sales by merchandise line for seven kinds of business in the Lumber building, hardware group, namely: Lumber yards; Building materials dealers; Paint, glass, wallpaper stores; Heating and plumbing equipment dealers; Electrical supply stores; Hardware stores; and Farm equipment dealers. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas.

23. Merchandise Line Sales of Drug and Proprietary Stores. 20 cents

Sales by merchandise line for four kinds of drug and proprietary stores, namely: Drug stores, with fountain; Drug stores, other; Proprietary stores, with fountain; and Proprietary stores, other. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas.

Presented in each table are the sales of each merchandise line, the number of stores handling or reporting the line, and the total sales of such stores.

24. Merchandise Line Sales of Miscellaneous Kinds of Business. 45 cents

Sales by merchandise lines for 25 kinds of business in the "Other retail stores" Group, that are listed in the table of contents of this bulletin. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas. No data are presented in this bulletin for "Other second-hand stores" or "All other retail stores," the sales of which constitute less than one percent of the total retail trade volume.

Presented in each table are the sales of each merchandise line, the number of stores handling or reporting the line, and the total sales of such stores.

3. Credit (includes 2 indexes to tables). 30 cents

This bulletin presents for merchant wholesalers and manufacturers' sales branches (with stocks) basic information on credit sales, number of credit accounts, receivables, and bad debt losses, by kind-of-business and sales-size groups, based upon 1948 total sales. Data are presented for the United States as a whole and for the 32 standard metropolitan areas (as defined by the Bureau of the Budget) with 500,000 inhabitants or more in 1950.

4. Sales by Class of Customer. 35 cents

This bulletin analyzes the 1948 sales of wholesale establishments by class of customer. Domestic sales of wholesale (except petroleum bulk stations and terminals) establishments are classified to show: (a) sales to retailers; (b) sales to industrial, commercial, professional, and institutional users; (c) sale to other wholesale organizations; and (d) sales to household and individual users (retail sales). Export sales of wholesale establishments are classified separately from domestic sales. Petroleum bulk stations and terminals were asked to analyze their sales, excluding gasoline and other turnover taxes, to show sales to resellers separately from sales to users or customers. Data are presented for the United States as a whole and for each of the 32 Standard Metropolitan Areas with 500,000 or more inhabitants in 1950.

10-13. Commodity Line Sales of Merchandise Wholesalers, Manufacturers' Sales Branches, Offices, Assemblers. 75 cents

This bulletin presents 1948 sales of merchant wholesalers, manufacturers' sales branches and offices, and assemblers of farm products, by commodity or merchandise line. Information is presented for these types of operation by kind of business for the United States and geographic divisions.

This bulletin contains information on the 1948 operations of petroleum bulk stations and distributing terminals. Tables include basic information on number of establishments, sales (excluding taxes), operating expenses, pay roll, personnel, and stocks, by geographic division and State; commodity line sales for the United States and geographic divisions; dollar and gallonage sales of specified petroleum products for geographic divisions, States, and counties; and storage capacity by geographic division and State.

Business establishments are classified, for Census purposes, according to their primary operation during the Census year. As this publication deals primarily with the distribution of bulk petroleum products, data on establishments primarily engaged in selling packaged petroleum products are not included here, but they are included in other Census of Business publications and classified according to their type of operation. Firms handling bulk petroleum products as secondary lines are not included in this study. Stations conducting a combined wholesale-retail business are classified according to their major activity during the Census year.

Data in all tables, except table 14B, are exclusive of operations of liquified petroleum gas stations and distributing terminals. Sales made directly from petroleum refiners to industrial or other users are not included. Transfers from bulk stations to gasoline service stations operated by the same company as the bulk plant, however, are included in the data. There is duplication in the data reported in this bulletin to the extent that refiner-marketers sell from district offices, terminals, or the larger bulk stations to "jobbers" who operate bulk stations.

3. Employee Size. 25 cents

Data for personal, business, and repair service establishments and for year-round hotels classified by size based on number of employees. No data are included for seasonal hotels, tourist courts, or amusement establishments. For purposes of the tabulations included in this bulletin, each establishment was assigned to one of several size classes on the basis of the total number of paid employees at work during the work-week ended nearest November 15, 1948. Statistics show number of establishments, receipts, pay roll, number of employees for workweek ended nearest November 15, and in the case of hotels, number of hotel guest rooms. These data are presented by employee-size groups for the United States, by kind of business, and by geographic division and State; and for selected kinds of business, by geographic division and State.

5. Legal Form of Organization. 20 cents

This bulletin presents 1948 establishments, receipts, payroll, and personnel figures for the service trades, amusements, hotels and tourist courts, classified by legal form of organization. In the tables for hotels and tourist courts, these data are supplemented by information on the number of hotel guest rooms and tourist court rental units. For service trades and amusements, data are shown for the United States, by kind of business, and in totals for each of these groups, by geographic division and State. For hotels and tourist courts, data are shown for the United States and each geographic division and State.

8. Laundries, Cleaning and Dyeing Plants and Related Services. 75 cents

Detailed data for power laundries and cleaning and dyeing plants, as well as hand laundries, self-service laundries, linen supply service, diaper service, rug cleaners, and pressing, alteration, and garment repair shops are shown for the United States as a whole, for geographic divisions, States, selected standard metropolitan areas and for selected cities. Subjects covered include basic establishment, receipts, pay roll, and personnel data; analysis of total receipts by major sources; analysis of wholesale receipts by major sources; laundry and cleaning receipts by method of delivery; and trucks operated by laundries, cleaning and dyeing plants, and related services.

Detailed 1948 data for hotels for the United States as a whole, for geographic divisions, States, selected standard metropolitan areas and for selected cities. Statistics are presented for both year-round hotels and seasonal hotels. Tables present basic data on number of establishments, receipts, pay roll, and personnel; analysis of receipts by major sources; analysis by size based on volume of receipts; number of guest rooms, and number of employees; city-size data; supplemental compensation received by employees; percentage of occupancy; legal form of organization; period of acquisition or establishment; guest rooms available for transient and residential guests; and comparative statistics for 1948 and 1939.

TRADE RELEASES, BY KIND OF BUSINESS

The three Series BC-2-R, BC-2-W, and BC-2-S include separate reports for a number of different kinds of businesses, retail, wholesale and service. Data in these reports are limited to basic Census information on the number of establishments, sales, payroll, employees, and proprietors of unincorporated businesses, by geographic divisions and State. There are United States summary reports for Retail, Wholesale and Service Trades, with a separate summary for Amusements in the BC-2-S series.

4. GOVERNMENTS DIVISION

The Governments Division collects data and prepares reports showing current and bench mark statistical data relating to the characteristics and functions of State and local governments and their administration in the United States. In current reporting, primary attention is given to public finance (revenue, expenditure, debt, and enterprise finances), and public employment (number of employees and amount of payroll). A two-page release entitled "Census Bureau Publications on Governments, as Scheduled for the Fiscal Year 1952" is available upon request.

During the past century, a Census of Governments has been taken at 10-year intervals—most recently for 1942—providing more complete and detailed information on State and local governments than is reported currently. Public Law 767 of the 81st Congress, approved September 7, 1950, requires that such a census be taken for the year 1952 and thereafter at 5-year (rather than 10-year) intervals. This new Act also provides a clearer statutory statement as to the minimum subject content of such censuses.

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5. INDUSTRY DIVISION

Current statistics on commodity production are issued in the Facts for Industry series. This series of releases makes available to manufacturers, trade groups, and other users of industrial data, current figures that are useful in their day-to-day operations and forward planning. The current reports also present an accurate picture of industrial trends over a period of time.

Annual surveys of manufactures have been taken for a sample of plants covering 1949 and 1950. Reports for both years will be published in 1951. They will bring up to date the statistics on employment, earnings, man-hours, value added, inventories, expenditures for new plant and equipment, and classes of products, which are shown in more detail in the quinquennial Census reports. All four 1947 Census of Manufactures volumes were issued in 1950: Vol. I, General Summary; Vol. II, Statistics by Industry; Vol. III, Statistics by States; and the Product Supplement. Special reports based on the 1947 Census of Manufactures are still being issued. The next Census of Manufactures will be taken in 1954 covering 1953.

A 1949 Puerto Rico Census of Manufactures was undertaken with funds provided by the Government of Puerto Rico and was conducted by the Bureau of the Census working in close cooperation with the Government of Puerto Rico. It covered all manufacturing activity (as defined in Standard Industrial Classification System) on the Island.

5-3. 1949 ANNUAL SURVEY OF MANUFACTURES

With the Census of Manufactures now on a quinquennial basis, the Annual Surveys of Manufactures are designed to provide a current series of the key statistical measures of industrial activity. They cover approximately 45,000 plants out of about 240,000 manufacturing establishments, including all large plants and a representative sample of the much more numerous small plants.

In addition to data on the value of shipments by product classes, the annual surveys provide measures of value added by manufacture, employment, payrolls, inventories, and expenditures for plant and equipment for selected industries and industry groups, for geographic divisions, and for the important industrial States.

The Annual Survey of Manufactures employment data have been coordinated with the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance employment figures for consistency in classification, coverage, and statistical accuracy. Tables comparing these two sets of manufacturing employment are included in the pertinent releases.

MAS-49-1 Value of Shipments of Selected Classes of Products: 1949 and 1947. Preliminary

These are preliminary estimates of the value of selected classes of products shipped by manufacturers during 1949. 6. POPULATION AND HOUSING DIVISION

A Census of Population has been taken every 10 years since 1790 and a Census of Housing was taken in 1940 and in 1950. These censuses were last taken as of April 1, 1950, and the results are now being published in a program which will extend over the next few years.

Monthly surveys of a scientifically selected sample of the population are conducted, and information on employment, unemployment, hours of work, occupation, etc., are published currently. Also available are estimates of personal and family characteristics of the population, internal migration, housing conditions, etc.

Estimates of population for postcensal and intercensal dates are prepared, and special censuses of local areas are taken at the request and expense of the places involved.

6-11. 1950 CENSUS OF POPULATION

Results of the 1950 Census of Population are being made available in published form as rapidly as they are tabulated and assembled. Preliminary figures and advance releases of final statistics are issued as unbound multilithed pamphlets identified as Series PC reports. Requests for announcements listing reports which will become available should be addressed to the Population and Housing Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C.

More detailed data will be presented in a series of bound volumes. The materials presented in these volumes will also be made available as paper-covered preprints (bulletins) of the various chapters.

The grouping of the 3,101 counties of the United States into State economic areas is the product of a special study sponsored by the Bureau of the Census in cooperation with the Bureau of Agricultural Economics and several State and private agencies. State economic areas will be used for tabulating and publishing many types of Census data. These areas are one of the new features of the 1950 Censuses of Agriculture, Population, and Housing.

This report presents the procedure and the data used in the delineation of State economic areas. An outline map shows the boundaries of the areas and the appendix tables include principal nonagricultural and agricultural characteristics by State economic areas, and a list of counties in each State economic area.

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FOREWORD

CENSUS PUBLICATIONS CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE, 1951, continues a series which makes available a complete listing of all published reports issued by the Bureau of the Census and some related materials. The purpose of this publication is to aid the librarian, the administrator, the businessman, and the research worker in finding needed information among the wealth of material collected, compiled, and published by the Bureau of the Census.

The general pattern of Census reports can be gauged by a study of the publications issued during the course of a single year. Variations in major programs are revealed in the comparisons between entries in the annual editions of CENSUS PUBLICATIONS CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE, available for each year from 1946 on. Historical perspective can be obtained by reference to the *Catalog of United States Census Publications 1790-1945*. Listings of publications on a more current basis are made available by the cumulative quarterly issues of the CENSUS PUBLICATIONS CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE and the monthly LIST OF PUBLICATIONS ISSUED.

This publication was prepared in the Statistical Reports Section of the Office of the Assistant Director for Statistical Standards. Many persons on the staff of the Bureau of the Census furnished valuable information for the preparation of this publication.

The Bureau will appreciate receiving any suggestions and comments from librarians and other users on the effectiveness of this CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE.

HOW TO OBTAIN BUREAU OF THE CENSUS PUBLICATIONS

Priced publications, except as otherwise noted in this catalog, can be purchased from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington 25, D. C., or from the U. S. Department of Commerce Field Offices which are listed on the back cover. The exceptions are the preliminary releases for the 1950 Censuses of Agriculture, Population, and Housing which can be ordered from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C. All checks or money orders must be made out to the Treasurer of the United States, and remittances are required in advance of any shipment.

Unpriced publications may be obtained from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C. When requesting publications, please be as specific as possible. Mailing lists or paid subscription lists are maintained for some of the recurring reports.

Supplies of publications are limited. Priority in meeting requests will be given to government agencies, large public libraries, school officials, and certain other groups when the reports are needed for official use or will be made available to large numbers of users of data.

AVAILABILITY OF UNPUBLISHED DATA

Detailed information in the files of the Bureau that has been tabulated but not published, can be made available, upon request, for the cost of transcribing or reproducing the data. In the field of population and housing, the publication *Key to Published and Tabulated Data for Small Areas* presents, in tabular form, an index to the statistics based on the 1950 Censuses of Population and Housing which will be published, or will be available in the form of tabulated but unpublished data, for various types of areas smaller than States. This catalog lists, on pages 42 to 51, similar reports available on a cost basis in the field of foreign trade. Similar unpublished data may also be available in the fields of agriculture, business, governments, and industry.

Requests for statistics, addressed to the Director, Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C., will be studied for availability of material. If unpublished data are available, an estimate of the cost of preparing and furnishing the data will be made.

INTRODUCTION

HOW TO USE THIS PUBLICATION

The CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE OF CENSUS PUBLICATIONS is designed to give users of published Census statistics a direct method of locating needed information. The catalog section contains detailed descriptions of the contents of the published reports and is followed by two indexes, an index to reports by geographic areas, and an index to reports by subject.

The entries in the two indexes are directly keyed to the reports listed in the catalog by the use of a reference numbering system, which appears in the Table of Contents, p. iii. All publications are arranged in the catalog by general subject field, following the organization pattern of the Bureau, namely: 1. Agriculture; 2. Business; 3. Foreign Trade; 4. Governments; 5. Industry; 6. Population and Housing; and 7. Miscellaneous. The first digit of the reference number designates the major subject within which the report is listed. Thus, all Agriculture Division reports have reference numbers beginning with 1; reference numbers for all Business Division reports have 2 in the first digit, etc. The second part of the reference number further classifies the reports by broad categories. For example, Business Division reports on Retail Trade are classified under 2-21; Wholesale Trade, 2-22; Trade Studies, 2-23; etc. Reports carrying a series number are further identified by the series number shown in parentheses following the group reference number, where it is feasible to include such numbers in the indexes.

The user of the CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE may first consult either the index by geographic areas or the index by subject and secure the reference number or numbers shown for the item on which he is looking for information. The reference number is then used as a key in locating the desired reports in the catalog section. For convenience, the reference number for the first entry on each page is shown on the upper outside corner of each page in the catalog section. In order to avoid the indexing of large lists of commodities, general references are made in those instances where coverage is all inclusive; reports are indexed under specific commodities only when they are limited to the specific item.

RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER CATALOGS AND GUIDES

The CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE is issued on a current basis each quarter and cumulated to the annual volume. Thus, this volume replaces the January-March, January-June, and January-September issues of the CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE for 1951. A monthly LIST OF PUBLICATIONS ISSUED, which does not include regular

monthly and quarterly publications, enables users to be informed more currently on publications as they appear.

The record of the Bureau of the Census publications since the first Census in 1790 through the year 1945 is available in the "Catalog of United States Census Publications 1790-1945" (Government Printing Office, \$1.50). This catalog was prepared by the Census Library Project sponsored by the Library of Congress and the Bureau of the Census. Publications issued after 1945 are shown in the annual issues of CENSUS PUBLICATIONS CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE, which are available for 1946 and subsequent years.

The BUSINESS SERVICE CHECK LIST of the Department of Commerce, issued weekly at a subscription cost of \$1.50 a year, includes a list of Census publications.

NOTES ON PUBLICATION PROGRAMS

Highlights of the publication program, including principal changes during the past year, are presented below to aid the user in anticipating the reports he will need.

Catalog Program

A few changes in the Census Catalog program will be put into effect in 1952. The title of the present publication CENSUS PUBLICATIONS CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE is being changed to CATALOG OF UNITED STATES CENSUS PUBLICATIONS. The title of the monthly LIST OF PUBLICATIONS ISSUED is being changed to MONTHLY SUPPLEMENT, CATALOG OF U. S. CENSUS PUBLICATIONS. Separate mailing and subscription lists will not be maintained as formerly, but each subscription to the quarterly CATALOG OF UNITED STATES CENSUS PUBLICATIONS will include a combination of four quarterly issues of this CATALOG and twelve copies of the MONTHLY SUPPLEMENT, priced at \$1.50 (75¢ additional foreign mailing). Subscriptions can be placed with the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C. Current subscriptions to the CATALOG will be continued.

Reports for the 1950 Censuses

As an aid in keeping the public informed as to the availability of the results of the 1950 Censuses of Agriculture, Irrigation, Drainage, Population, and Housing, various announcements and order forms have been issued during the past year and others will be prepared as the publication program advances. *A Key to Published and Tabulated Data for Small Areas* (Government Printing Office, \$0.30) presents in tabular form an index to the statistics based on the 1950 Censuses of Population and Housing which will be published, or which will be available in the form of unpublished tabulations, for various types of area smaller than States. The information is cross-indexed to the specific tables in which the published data on the same subject will appear in the final reports.

Announcements and order forms issued before February 1, 1952, include those for preliminary releases based on the Census of Agriculture, Irrigation, and Drainage with an additional announcement on the complete publication program

in this field. For the 1950 Censuses of Population and Housing, in addition to the following an announcement and order form also covers the preliminary sample and advance reports:

- Announcement B: Series PC-13, HC-7, HC-8
- Announcement 1: Population series A bulletins
- Announcement 2: Block statistics bulletins
 - Supplement: Photostats of block statistics bulletins
- Announcement 3: Key to published and tabulated data for small areas
- Announcement 4: Census tract bulletins
- Announcement 5: Population series B bulletins
- Announcement 6: Housing series A bulletins

The law requires that the Bureau complete its 1950 Census reports within a 3-year period, that is, by the end of 1952.

Agriculture.—During the past year mimeographed reports in Series AC50-2 gave the preliminary count of farms within each county, by State. Information on characteristics of farms, their facilities and production, was published in Series AC50-1 for each county and each State, the last of these releases, including a United States summary, being scheduled for completion by March 1952. Preliminary reports on Irrigation and Drainage were issued for selected States. Preliminary statistics on horticultural specialties will be published during the first part of 1952.

The final reports for the 1950 Census of Agriculture will comprise four volumes, as described in the 1950 issue of CENSUS PUBLICATIONS CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE. The publication dates of these volumes are now expected to be as follows:

Volume I. State Reports with Agriculture Statistics for Counties and Economic Areas, 34 separate parts to be published during the period March 1952 to August 1952.

Volume II. Agriculture Statistics by Subjects for States, for Geographic Divisions, and for the United States, to be published about December 1952, with individual chapters also available as separate bulletins.

Volume III. Irrigation of Agricultural Lands, to be published about September 1952, with reports for selected States also available as separate bulletins.

Volume IV. Drainage of Agricultural Lands, to be published about April 1952.

Population.—The publication of data from the 1950 Census of Population will show some changes in concepts which have developed during the past 10 years, and these changes will be explained in detail in the texts of the various reports.

Among the preliminary and advance reports included in various PC series, all those in Series, PC-1, PC-2, PC-3, PC-4, PC-5, PC-6, PC-7, PC-8, and PC-12 have been published. The series of PC-13 reports as planned has been canceled; these were to have shown basic data on employment status for the 38 smaller States and the District of Columbia. A new series, PC-14, was inaugurated to present summary statistics on particular population characteristics for various types of areas; three reports in this series were issued in 1951 and others will become available in 1952.

The final reports of the 1950 Census of Population will include *Volume I, Number of Inhabitants; Volume II, General Characteristics of the Population;*

and *Census Tract Bulletins*. Information to be presented in these reports remains generally as it was described in the 1950 issue of CENSUS PUBLICATIONS CATALOG AND SUBJECT GUIDE. However, the part of volume II originally planned to show data for State Economic Areas has been canceled. Individual chapters of volumes I and II will be issued as bulletins (preprints) in advance of the bound volumes.

Twenty-nine of the volume I preprints of State chapters (Series P-A bulletins) were issued in 1951; the remaining bulletins in this series will be completed early in 1952 and the bound report will probably be available by the summer of 1952. Preprints of chapter B (Series P-B bulletins) of the State parts of volume II will be issued between March 1952 and September 1952; the United States summary of chapter B is expected to be available in preprint form by October 1952. Preprints of chapter C of the State parts of volume II (Series P-C bulletins) are planned for issuance between June 1952 and January 1953; the United States summary of chapter C is expected to be available in preprint form by February 1953.

A series of 64 separate bulletins (Series P-D) will present population and housing data for census tracts in 67 of the larger cities and their contiguous areas which have been tracted for statistical purposes. Maps defining the boundaries of the census tracts in the area will be included in each bulletin. The first of these bulletins was issued in December 1951 and the final issues of the series should be completed by August 1952. These bulletins will be the final reports and will not be combined into bound volumes.

Housing.—All preliminary and advance reports in Series HC-1, HC-2, HC-3, HC-4, and HC-5 have been published. Advance reports on vacant dwelling units, showing numbers available for rent or for sale, were issued for 18 States during 1951 and the remainder will be completed by June 1952. A new series of advance reports, HC-8, to be published between February and September 1952, will present selected figures on various housing characteristics for each State and for the urban, rural-nonfarm, and rural-farm parts of the State.

Five volumes will comprise the final reports of the 1950 Census of Housing: *Volume I, General Characteristics*; *Volume II, Nonfarm Housing Characteristics*; *Volume III, Farm Housing*; *Volume IV, Residential Financing*; and *Volume V, Block Statistics*.

Preprints (Series H-A bulletins) of the State chapters of volume I are planned to be issued between April 1952 and October 1952, and of the United States summary in November 1952. The bound volume is expected to be available in December 1952.

Preprints of Volume II chapters (Series H-B bulletins) will be issued for each of the 152 standard metropolitan areas of 100,000 inhabitants or more and for the United States and the nine Census divisions. These bulletins are planned for release between July 1952 and December 1952 and will be assembled and issued in bound form in January 1953. There will be no preprint bulletins issued for Volume III, or for Volume IV; it is expected that Volume IV will be published between November 1952 and February 1953.

Volume V will comprise a series of separate bulletins (H-E) giving block statistics for each of 209 cities which in 1940, or in a subsequent census prior to

1950, had a population of 50,000 or more. Twenty-eight bulletins were issued in 1951 and the remainder should be completed by August 1952. These bulletins will be the final reports and will not be combined into bound volumes.

1948 Census of Business

The work on final data from the 1948 Census of Business was completed during 1951. The Area Bulletins were combined and reissued as *1948 Census of Business, Volumes III, Retail Trade—Area Statistics; V, Wholesale Trade—Area Statistics; and VII, Service Trade—Area Statistics*. The series of 34 Subject Bulletins will be combined and reissued during 1952 as *1948 Census of Business, Volumes I and II for Retail Trade, Volume IV for Wholesale Trade, and Volume VI for Service Trades*.

A series of 14 Trade Bulletins, covering trades in which the most interest has been expressed, were sent to the printer and will be released early in 1952. These bulletins assemble data appearing in the Area and Subject Bulletins and contain some additional data of a specialized nature of interest primarily to the trade being covered. The trades covered in the series are shown in the following list (R designates retail trade, W wholesale trade, and S service trades): the grocery trade (R, W); department stores (R); variety stores (R); the electrical goods trade (R, W, S); the automotive trade (R, W, S); the drug trade (R, W); the jewelry trade (R, W, S); the apparel trade (R, W); the furniture trade (R, W, S); the lumber trade (R, W); the hardware, plumbing and heating equipment trade (R, W); marketing by producers of basic iron and steel products (W); the motion picture trade (S); and the optical goods trade (R, W).

Intra-City and Intra-Metropolitan Area Tabulations of Census of Business Data.—After each successive Census of Business, the Bureau of the Census has prepared special tabulations of intra-city data. The extra cost of these special tabulations is met by the users.

The presentation of data on retail trade is limited because of the application of Census rules designed to prevent the disclosure of figures for individual businesses. The likelihood of having to withhold data on retail establishments to avoid disclosure becomes greater as the kind-of-business detail required is increased or as the size of individual areas as measured by the number of retail stores is decreased. Previous tabulations, including all or some of the same establishments, also increase the necessity for withholding data to avoid disclosures because of the possibility of obtaining detailed information by subtraction.

Demand for intra-city tabulations has made it desirable to establish, for a community, standard areas which would have the optimum value generally to users of retail trade and other data. Approved areas consist of whole Census tracts or combinations of tracts. The size of individual areas is not rigidly specified; however, in general, areas average 400 retail stores and 30,000 inhabitants.

Tabulations of the approved areas are given precedence over other special tabulations for the same general area. The result is that suppression of data caused by disclosure is at a minimum in tabulations of the approved areas. All

subsequent tabulations are then subject to suppressions as a result of regular tabulations and those made for approved areas.

Community or Retail Trade Areas had been defined and approved for 19 cities by the end of 1951. Special tabulations paid for by the users have been prepared for eight of these cities.

1947 Census of Manufactures

In addition to the four basic volumes from the 1947 Census of Manufactures, which were issued in 1950, i. e., *Volume I, General Summary*; *Volume II, Statistics by Industry*; *Volume III, Statistics by States*; and the *Product Supplement*; and special tabulations published in the bulletin on Fuels and Electric Energy Consumed, MC-203, also published in 1950, three special reports from the 1947 Census were published in 1951. These special reports covered "Shipments for Classes of Products, by Geographic Division and State"; "Consumption of Steel Mill Shapes and Forms by Metal Fabricating Establishments by State, Standard Metropolitan Area, and Selected Counties"; and "Consumption of Steel Mill Shapes and Forms by Metal Fabricating Establishments by Industry Within State." The "Fuels and Electric Energy Consumed" release contains two special tabulations of fuel and electric energy consumption data by industry group within State and by county within State which are not included in the basic Census volumes.

An additional volume based on the 1947 Census, entitled *Indexes of Production*, is being prepared for release some time in the spring of 1952. This volume will cover changes in the physical volume of manufacturing production in the United States between 1939 and 1947.

The report on 1947 value of shipments of classes of products by geographic division and State was issued in 20 separate releases, each dealing with one major industry group and including the product classes primary to that group. A summary report will be issued early in 1952 which will include geographic division and State figures for all 890 product classes in the 20 major groups in the manufacturing field. The two special reports on steel consumption provide industry within State data and more detailed geographical distributions than are shown in the metals consumed section of the General Summary and Industry volumes of the 1947 Census.

Current Business Statistics

Current statistics on trends in sales of large independent retail stores have been carried in the Monthly Retail Trade Reports series for the United States and for each of the nine geographic regions. Beginning with the release for August 1951 these series have been consolidated into one report. Where previously data were shown by kind of business both for a large city and for the area (county or counties) of which the city is a part, only area data are now provided. Data for year to date compared with the same period a year ago have been eliminated. These changes and the elimination of separate regional releases have been made in order to reduce the cost of conducting the Monthly Trade Reports Program.

A report on Sales-Inventory Ratios for Large Retail Stores, 1939-50 was published in December 1951; sales-inventory ratios for 35 kinds of retail business are shown for 1950 and where available for each year from 1939 through 1949.

INTRODUCTION

A monthly release provides current statistics on the trends in chain store and mail order sales. Trends in wholesalers' sales and inventories are carried in the Monthly Wholesale Trade Report. Included in the Bureau's monthly trade studies are separate trend reports for the drug trade, dry-goods trade, electrical goods trade, grocery trade, jewelry trade, tobacco trade, and wines and spirits trade. A monthly Canned Food Report is issued for the nine months November through July and shows stocks in warehouses of retail food chains and a sample of food wholesalers' and canners' stocks.

In cooperation with the Production and Marketing Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, quarterly reports are published on Coffee Inventories and Roastings.

1949 Puerto Rico Census of Manufactures

During 1951, a volume was issued containing the results of the 1949 Census of Manufacturers for Puerto Rico. That volume presents statistics for 1949, with comparable data for 1939 where available, on the number of establishments; number of proprietors and partners; total number of employees, number of production workers, and payrolls to these groups of employees; value of factory inventories; expenditures for plant and equipment; value added by manufacture; and value of products sold for major groups of products. In addition to summary statistics on these items for Puerto Rico as a whole, many of these general statistics are shown by industry groups, important individual industries, and by various geographical subdivisions of Puerto Rico.

A report on the 1949 Census of Business in Puerto Rico will be issued early in 1952. Preliminary results were made available in a press release dated December 22, 1950.

Annual Survey of Manufactures

Surveys for 1950 and 1949.—The preliminary reports (Series MAS-50) based on the tabulation of manufacturers' reports received in the 1950 Annual Survey of Manufactures were issued during the period November 1951 through January 1952. The releases in this series provide estimates of general statistics (employment, payrolls, man-hours, value added by manufacture, etc.), for industry groups and selected industries; general statistics for geographic divisions and States, cross-classified by major industry group; value of shipments, by selected classes of products; quantity and value of selected metals consumed, by selected industries; expenditures for plant and equipment, by industry groups; value of manufacturers' inventories, for selected industry groups; and selected general statistics for industries, cross-classified by size of establishment.

The tables in these releases also include all data tabulated in the 1949 Annual Survey of Manufactures and, for comparative purposes, related data as tabulated in the 1947 Census of Manufactures. Early in 1952 these statistics will be reissued in a single publication covering the annual surveys for 1950 and 1949.

Survey for 1951.—The Bureau is currently conducting the canvass for the 1951 Annual Survey of Manufactures. The publication plans at this time contemplate an expansion of the amount of class of product shipment data; the other statistics will generally be presented to the same level of detail as was shown for 1950.

1949 County Business Patterns

A compilation of County Business Patterns covering the first quarter of 1949 was published by the Bureau of the Census this year. It shows data by county on employment, taxable payrolls, and size of establishment in manufacturing industries. Derived from wage reports filed for the first quarter of 1949 by employers subject to the Federal Insurance Contributions Act, the data are issued for the first time as a joint publication of the Bureau of the Census and the Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance, in five bulletins: A United States summary, and four geographic bulletins. The geographic bulletins include employment, payroll, and size data by industry group for individual counties.

The Bureau of the Census of the Department of Commerce, and the Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance of the Federal Security Agency have cooperated closely in the compilation of these statistics. The data in County Business Patterns have been closely coordinated with the Census Annual Survey of Manufactures data for consistency in classification, coverage, and statistical accuracy. Tables comparing the two sets of manufacturing employment data appear in the text of County Business Patterns and in the final 1949 Annual Survey of Manufactures publication. The employment and payroll data by small areas in County Business Patterns and the data on employment, man-hours, value added, expenditures for plant and equipment, etc., compiled in the Annual Survey of Manufactures complement each other in providing statistics on the Nation's manufacturing industries for 1949.

Facts for Industry

During the year, three new reports were added to the Facts for Industry series: M31L, Internal Combustion Engines, except automotive and aircraft, (annual); M34C, Metalworking Machinery, except machine tools, (annual); and M37B, Tractors (quarterly). In addition, the annual release on Inorganic Chemicals and Gases has been expanded to cover approximately 200 additional chemicals and to include shipments information on all inorganic chemicals and gases.

Beginning with January 1951, the separate releases on Cast Iron Products and Steel Castings were consolidated, steel ingot production was added, and these output data were issued, together with related consumption data, in a joint release of the Bureau of the Census and the Bureau of Mines, Facts for Industry series M21C.

During 1951, a number of the Census Bureau regular current statistical series were expanded or modified to meet the statistical needs of the defense agencies, particularly the National Production Authority. Insofar as considerations of national security permit, the additional information obtained is being issued in the Facts for Industry series of releases. The report M13G, Lumber, was changed from an annual to a quarterly basis; Series M15H, Wool Manufactures, include quarterly figures on wool stocks beginning with the first quarter of 1951, previously published on an annual basis only; data on Home and Canning Closures have been restored to Series M75C, and the title changed to Commercial and Home Canning Closures; data on steel consumed in the production of forgings and on output of forgings "for own use" have been added to Series M22C beginning with June 1951. In addition, the Census Bureau in cooperation with

the National Production Authority has issued reports on Hardwood Veneer and Plywood, M13A, (quarterly) ; and on Burlap (single time) for which the Bureau acted as collecting and compiling agent.

Foreign Trade

The January 1, 1952 Edition (superseding the January 1, 1949 Edition) of Schedule B, *Statistical Classification of Domestic and Foreign Commodities Exported from the United States*, was released December 5, 1951. The publication *Comparison of Commodity Classifications Shown During 1949 through 1952 in Schedule B, Statistical Classification of Domestic and Foreign Commodities Exported from the United States*, will be issued in January 1952 and enables users to compare exports of specific products for these four years even though the nomenclature may have changed.

Current foreign trade reports, which are available on a free basis or for a small nominal charge, are also listed in a separate publication, *Catalog of United States Foreign Trade Statistical Publications*, which is available on request. In addition there are a number of special foreign trade tabulations which are prepared on a cost basis, on request. These reports contain information not available or not readily available in the regular foreign trade reports and are listed in section 3-10 of this catalog.

Current problems in the compilation of United States foreign trade and shipping statistics are described in the monthly issues of *Foreign Trade Statistics Notes*, distributed to all regular subscribers to the foreign trade statistical reports. Information from these current issues of sufficient importance for the permanent record will be incorporated in the *Explanation of Statistics in Foreign Commerce and Navigation of the United States*.

Geographic Reports

A new series of Geographic Reports (Series GEO) was established during 1951 and two reports were issued. Report GEO No. 1 on "Census Areas of 1950" describes Census geographical areas for which population and housing statistics are being compiled from the 1950 Censuses, including Standard Metropolitan Areas, Urbanized Areas, State Economic Areas, Census Tracts, Unincorporated Places, Census Enumeration Districts, City Blocks, and Census County Divisions in the State of Washington; maps and boundary descriptions that are or will be available are listed. Report GEO No. 2, "Center of Population of the United States: 1950," locates the centers of population from 1790 to 1950 by decades and includes maps which show the locations for the same dates.

Subjects to be covered in subsequent reports in this series will include city areas and annexations, the number of minor civil divisions by States, map of the United States showing population density by counties, and so forth.

1. AGRICULTURE DIVISION

The first National Census of Agriculture was taken in 1840, and since then a census of agriculture has been taken in conjunction with the census of population in each decennial enumeration. A mid-decennial agriculture census was initiated January 1, 1925; thus, there has been a Federal Census of Agriculture every fifth year since 1920.

Each year the Agriculture Division collects statistics and issues periodic reports on cotton ginnings and production. Twelve reports on cotton ginned prior to specific dates are prepared and issued each year on dates prescribed by Congress.

1-10. 1950 CENSUS OF AGRICULTURE

Results of the 1950 Census of Agriculture; Irrigation; Drainage; and of the Producers of Cut Flowers and Flowering or Foliage Plants, and of Nurseries (combined under the Series name Horticultural Specialties), are being released as preliminary reports immediately after they have been compiled and later as final reports in bulletins and bound volumes.

PRELIMINARY REPORTS

Four-page reports are being issued in Series AC50-1 for each county, State, and Territory giving data on farms and farm characteristics. One or more summary reports for continental United States are included in Series AC50-3. There will be no charge for one copy for a single area; additional copies are priced at 20 cents for lots of 10 or fewer reports, and the price is \$60 per set including all counties, States, and the United States.

Series AC50-2 reports give the number of farms in each county for 40 States, together with figures for 1945. Series AC50-2 also includes a summary report on the number of farms by geographic divisions and States, 1925 to 1950, and a report for Puerto Rico on the number of farms by municipalities, 1920 to 1950. There is no charge for one copy of a report; additional copies are priced at 20 cents for lots of 10 or fewer reports. A complete set of the 42 reports is priced at 80 cents.

AC50-3 includes one report for Puerto Rico (Parcelas and Parcela characteristics), and a summary report for continental United States on farms and farm characteristics. There is no charge for one copy of a report; additional copies are priced at 20 cents for lots of 10 or fewer reports.

Series IR50-1 reports present preliminary figures on irrigation of agricultural lands for 20 States, their counties, and a summary report for the United States. There is no charge for one copy of a report; additional copies are priced at 20 cents for lots of 10 or fewer reports. A complete set of the 21 reports is priced at 40 cents.

Reports in Series DR50-1 present data on drainage of agricultural lands with one report for each of 40 States and one summary report for the United States. There is no charge for one copy of a report; additional copies are priced at 20 cents for lots of 10 or fewer reports. A complete set of the 41 reports is priced at 80 cents.

Series HS50-2, Horticultural Specialties, presents preliminary figures limited to those nursery establishments having sales of \$1,000 in 1949. There will be a two-page report issued for each State, and a summary report *Nurseries* for the United States. There is no charge for one copy of a report; additional copies are priced at 20 cents for lots of 10 or fewer reports.

2. BUSINESS DIVISION

Complete Censuses of Business were taken for the years 1929, 1933, 1935, 1939, and 1948. Those for 1929 and 1939 were taken as part of the 1930 and 1940 Decennial Censuses; those for 1933 and 1935 were special projects. The Census of Business will be taken next in 1954 covering 1953 and every fifth year thereafter simultaneously with the Census of Manufactures.

Current reports are issued monthly showing trends in retail sales and in wholesale sales and inventories. An annual survey is made of independent retail establishments showing trends in sales and inventories. Trend reports, bringing together data for various aspects of trade, are also issued monthly.

2-10. 1948 CENSUS OF BUSINESS

The 1948 Census of Business, the first taken since 1939, was conducted during 1949 covering 1948, and was an enumeration of business establishments in continental United States, Alaska, and Hawaii. The results of the 1948 Census of Business are being made available in advance of the final consolidated volumes in the following series: (1) Preliminary county and summary State releases; (2) final Area Bulletins (States, including data for metropolitan areas, counties and cities); (3) Trade releases, by kind of business; (4) Subject Bulletin Advance Releases; (5) Subject Bulletins; and (6) Trade Bulletins.

FINAL REPORTS

Seven volumes will present final results of the 1948 Census of Business. Volumes I to III will cover Retail trade, Volumes IV and V, Wholesale trade, and Volumes VI and VII, Service trade.

Volumes III, V, and VII consist for the most part of data published in the 1948 Census of Business Area (State) Bulletins, Series 1-R, 1-W, and 1-S, and contain final area statistics for standard metropolitan areas, cities and counties, the District of Columbia, and the Territories of Alaska and Hawaii, as well as for the United States, geographic divisions and States. Included in the volumes are maps and appendices.

AREA BULLETINS

The bulletins in the series 1-R, 1-W, and 1-S, issued in 1950 and 1951, replace the 1948 Census of Business Preliminary Release Series BC-1P for the States and their counties, and the District of Columbia.

They include separate Retail, Wholesale, and Service Trade Bulletins for each State, as well as for continental United States. For the Territories of Alaska and Hawaii, single bulletins combine data for the major trade categories. Data in Area bulletins are limited to basic Census information on number of establishments, sales and receipts, payroll, employees, proprietors, and unpaid family workers, classified by area and kind of business. Data are shown for the State as a whole, for each standard metropolitan area (as defined by the Bureau of the Budget, as of June 5, 1950), for each county, and each city of 2,500 inhabitants or more (for wholesale trade, for each city of 5,000 inhabitants or more).

For cities and counties with relatively few business establishments, data are presented only for broad kind-of-business groups; for States, metropolitan areas, and for larger counties and cities, data are shown in greater detail. Detail published is essentially determined by requirements of the provisions of the Census law which are directed at preventing disclosure of figures for individual businesses.

SUBJECT BULLETINS

The bulletins in the Series 2-R, 2-W, and 2-S provide final 1948 Census of Business figures, not previously released, on a variety of topics in the retail, wholesale and service trades. They are designed to supplement information previously released in the Area Bulletin Series. The geographic detail in which subjects are treated varies with the particular subject heading being presented. A single bulletin covering all subjects for all three trade divisions will be issued for Alaska and for Hawaii; a bulletin on *Trucks* covering the three trade divisions has been issued. These bulletins will be consolidated for inclusion in the 1948 Census of Business volumes to be issued during 1952.

Merchandise line bulletins. The merchandise line statistics for retail kinds of business have been grouped in a series of bulletins as follows: Food group; Eating and Drinking Places; General Merchandise Group and General Stores; Apparel Group; Furniture, Furnishings, Appliance Group; Automotive Group and Gasoline Service Stations; Lumber, Building, Hardware Group; Drug and Proprietary Stores; Miscellaneous Kinds of Business. Presented in each bulletin are the sales of each merchandise line, the number of stores handling or reporting the line, and the total sales of such stores. These statistics permit an evaluation of (1) the sales volume of the merchandise line relative to the total sales of all stores in a particular kind of business, (2) the proportion of

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stores in a kind of business which handle the line, and (3) the sales of the line relative to the total sales of stores in that kind of business handling the line. Included in the text of the appendix or introduction of each bulletin is an explanation of terms and definitions of kind-of-business classifications.

2. Sales Size. 50¢.

Statistics on Retail Trade by sales size of retail stores, by kind of business, for the United States, geographic divisions, and States. Data on stores, sales, pay roll, and personnel are presented for the United States for all stores, for stores of corporate organizations, and for stores of noncorporate organizations. Stores and sales data by sales size are presented for the United States and for each geographic division by single and multiunits; for the United States, for stores not operated the entire year; and for each State.

3. Single Units and Multiunits. 45¢.

Data for single unit and multiunit stores by kind of business, for the United States, each State, and the 90 metropolitan areas in the country with a 1950 population of 200,000 inhabitants or more. In addition 1948 and 1939 figures are presented by kind of business, covering the retail operations of firms operating four or more retail stores.

4. Employee Size. \$1.

Presents 1948 data, by employee-size groups, on stores, sales, pay roll, and personnel, by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, and States. Stores and sales data are also presented for the United States, by sales size, by kind of business.

5. City Size. 15¢.

Statistics on Retail Trade, by city-size groups, for the United States and for geographic divisions. Stores and sales data for the United States are presented by kind of business for 1948 and 1939; and for 1948 by geographic division. Data on stores, sales, pay roll, and personnel, are presented for all retail kinds of business combined for the United States and geographic divisions.

6. Legal Form of Organization. 55¢.

Data by legal form of organization, by kind of business, for the United States and for each State. Data on stores and sales for 1948 and 1939, by legal form of organization, are presented or the United States, for geographic divisions, and for States. Other tables include stores, sales, pay roll, and employment data for the United States and States, by kind of business; and stores, sales, pay roll, and employment data for proprietorships with active proprietors and those without active proprietors, for the United States by kind of business, and for geographic divisions and States for total Retail Trade.

7. Warehouses, Other Auxiliary Units. 10¢.

Data for warehouses, administrative offices, and other auxiliary units or retail multi-unit organizations. Warehouse figures are shown for the United States, geographic divisions, and States. Figures for administrative offices and other auxiliary units are for the United States only.

For warehouses, number of establishments, annual pay roll, sales and billings, inventories, and paid employees and weekly pay roll for selected workweeks are shown for the United States, by kind of business, and for all kinds of business combined, by geographic division and State. For administrative offices and other auxiliary units, number of establishments, annual pay roll, and paid employees and weekly pay roll for selected workweeks are shown for the United States, by kind of business. The selected workweeks for which data are presented are the workweeks ending nearest March 15, July 15, and November 15, 1948. Data for warehouses in this bulletin include the operations of administrative, district, or buying offices or other auxiliary units when the latter are located in warehouses.

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2-R Retail trade—Continued

The data on employment, pay roll, inventories, sales, etc., included in this bulletin cover only warehouses and administrative offices and other auxiliary units and do not include data for retail stores.

10. Merchandise Inventories. 30¢.

Statistics on the cost value of merchandise inventories held for sale by retail stores at the beginning and end of 1948. Data are shown by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions and States. In addition, inventory data for the United States by kind of business are presented by sales size, for single and multiunit stores, and for stores of corporate and noncorporate organizations.

This bulletin does not contain data on the merchandise inventories held by warehouses belonging to and servicing retail multiunit stores. Data on inventories held by these establishments are included in the 1948 Census of Business bulletin "Warehouses, Other Auxiliary Units" (2-R-7).

11. Credit. \$1.

Presents 1948 retail trade statistics on cash and credit sales and balances due at the beginning and end of 1948, by kind of business, and for single and multiunits for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas. For the United States, data are also shown by legal form of organization for single and multiunits, and by sales-size.

12. Selected Types of Operation. 20¢.

Presents 1948 data on operations of: Cooperatives (consumer cooperatives and retail stores of farmer cooperatives); mail-order houses; direct-selling organizations; merchandise vending machine operators; retail stores with retail leased departments.

Data for each group are presented for the United States by kind of business. In addition, for cooperatives only, stores and sales data are presented for the United States by kind of business for single unit and multiunit operations, sales-size group, value of merchandise inventories at cost, credit sales and balances due, and merchandise line sales. Information for establishments and sales by kind of business is presented, by State, only for cooperatives and direct-selling organizations.

Number and sales volume data for stores with retail leased departments are presented for the United States by kind of business of the main store and number of leased departments operated; kind of business of the leased departments by kind of business of the main store in which they are operated; and kind of business of the main store by kind of business of the leased departments operated.

16. Merchandise Line Sales of Food Group. 20¢.

This bulletin presents 1948 sales by merchandise line for eleven kinds of business in the Food Group, namely: Grocery stores, without fresh meat; Grocery stores, with fresh meat; Meat markets; Fish (sea food) markets; Fruit stores, vegetable markets; Candy, nut, confectionery stores; Dairy products stores; Milk dealers; Bakery products stores; Egg, poultry dealers; and Delicatessen stores. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas. No data are presented in this bulletin for "Other food stores," the sales of which constitute less than 1 percent of sales of all stores in the Food Group.

17. Merchandise Line Sales of Eating and Drinking Places. 15¢.

This bulletin presents 1948 sales by merchandise line for four kinds of business in the Eating and Drinking Places Group, namely: Restaurants, cafeterias; Caterers; Lunch counters, refreshment stands; and Drinking places. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas. Data for restaurants, cafeterias and caterers are combined in the tables for geographic divisions, States, and metropolitan areas.

18. Merchandise Line Sales of General Merchandise Group, General Stores. 30¢.

Sales of merchandise lines for four kinds of business in the General merchandise group, namely: Department stores; Dry goods, general merchandise stores; Variety stores; and General stores. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas.

Presented in each table are the sales of each merchandise line, the number of stores handling or reporting the line, and the total sales of such stores.

2-R Retail trade—Continued**19. Merchandise Line Sales of Apparel Group. 35¢.**

This bulletin presents 1948 sales of merchandise lines for fourteen kinds of business in the Apparel Group, namely: Men's, boys' clothing stores; Men's, boys' furnishings stores; Family clothing stores; Women's ready-to-wear stores; Millinery stores; Hosiery stores; Corset, lingerie stores; Apparel accessory, specialty stores; Men's shoe stores; Women's shoe stores; Family shoe stores; Custom tailors; Furriers, fur shops; and Children's, infants' wear stores. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas. No data are presented in this bulletin for "Children's, juveniles' shoe stores" or "Other apparel stores" the sales of which constitute less than one percent of sales of all stores in the Apparel Group.

20. Merchandise Line Sales of Furniture, Furnishings, Appliance Group. 25¢.

This bulletin presents 1948 sales by merchandise lines for eight kinds of business in the Furniture, Furnishings, Appliance Group, namely: Furniture stores; Floor covering stores; Drapery, curtain, upholstery stores; China, glassware, metalware stores; Antique stores; Other home furnishing stores; Household appliance stores; and Radio stores. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas.

21. Merchandise Line Sales of Automotive Group, Gasoline Service Stations. 30¢.

Sales by merchandise line for gasoline service stations and seven kinds of business in the automotive group, namely: Motor vehicle (new and used) dealers; Motor vehicle (used) dealers; Tire, battery, accessory dealers; Motorcycle dealers; Aircraft dealers; Boat dealers; and Other automotive dealers. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas.

Presented in each table are the sales of each merchandise line, the number of stores handling or reporting the line, and the total sales of such stores.

22. Merchandise Line Sales of Lumber, Building Hardware Group. 25¢.

This bulletin presents 1948 sales by merchandise line for seven kinds of business in the Lumber building, hardware group, namely: Lumber yards; Building materials dealers; Paint, glass, wallpaper stores; Heating and plumbing equipment dealers; Electrical supply stores; Hardware stores; and Farm equipment dealers. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas.

23. Merchandise Line Sales of Drug and Proprietary Stores. 20¢.

Sales by merchandise line for four kinds of drug and proprietary stores, namely: Drug stores, with fountain; Drug stores, other; Proprietary stores, with fountain; and Proprietary stores, other. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas.

Presented in each table are the sales of each merchandise line, the number of stores handling or reporting the line, and the total sales of such stores.

24. Merchandise Line Sales of Miscellaneous Kinds of Business. 45¢.

Sales by merchandise lines for 25 kinds of business in the "Other retail stores" Group, that are listed in the table of contents of this bulletin. Data are presented by kind of business for the United States, geographic divisions, States, and selected standard metropolitan areas. No data are presented in this bulletin for "Other second-hand stores" or "All other retail stores," the sales of which constitute less than one percent of the total retail trade volume.

Presented in each table are the sales of each merchandise line, the number of stores handling or reporting the line, and the total sales of such stores.

2-W Wholesale trade¹*v. p., tables, charts, map, appendix.***3. Credit (includes 2 indexes to tables). 30¢.**

This bulletin presents for merchant wholesalers and manufacturers' sales branches (with stocks) basic information on credit sales, number of credit accounts, receivables, and bad debt losses, by kind-of-business and sales-size groups, based upon 1948 total sales. Data are presented for the United States as a whole and for the 32 standard metropolitan areas (as defined by the Bureau of the Budget) with 500,000 inhabitants or more in 1950.

4. Sales by Class of Customer. 35¢.

This bulletin analyzes the 1948 sales of wholesale establishments by class of customer. Domestic sales of wholesale (except petroleum bulk stations and terminals) establishments are classified to show: (a) sales to retailers; (b) sales to industrial, commercial, professional, and institutional users; (c) sales to other wholesale organizations; and (d) sales to household and individual users (retail sales). Export sales of wholesale establishments are classified separately from domestic sales. Petroleum bulk stations and terminals were asked to analyze their sales, excluding gasoline and other turnover taxes, to show sales to resellers separately from sales to users or customers. Data are presented for the United States as a whole and for each of the 32 Standard Metropolitan Areas with 500,000 or more inhabitants in 1950.

10-13. Commodity Line Sales of Merchandise Wholesalers, Manufacturers' Sales Branches, Offices, Assemblers. 75¢.

This bulletin presents 1948 sales of merchant wholesalers, manufacturers' sales branches and offices, and assemblers of farm products, by commodity or merchandise line. Information is presented for these types of operation by kind of business for the United States and geographic divisions.

14. Petroleum Bulk Stations and Terminals. 40¢.

This bulletin contains information on the 1948 operations of petroleum bulk stations and distributing terminals. Tables include basic information on number of establishments, sales (excluding taxes), operating expenses, pay roll, personnel, and stocks, by geographic division and State; commodity line sales for the United States and geographic divisions; dollar and gallonage sales of specified petroleum products for geographic divisions, States, and counties; and storage capacity by geographic division and State.

Business establishments are classified, for Census purposes, according to their primary operation during the Census year. As this publication deals primarily with the distribution of bulk petroleum products, data on establishments primarily engaged in selling packaged petroleum products are not included here, but they are included in other Census of Business publications and classified according to their type of operation. Firms handling bulk petroleum products as secondary lines are not included in this study. Stations conducting a combined wholesale-retail business are classified according to their major activity during the Census year.

Data in all tables, except table 14B, are exclusive of operations of liquified petroleum gas stations and distributing terminals. Sales made directly from petroleum refiners to industrial or other users are not included. Transfers from bulk stations to gasoline service stations operated by the same company as the bulk plant, however, are included in the data. There is duplication in the data reported in this bulletin to the extent that refiner-marketers sell from district offices, terminals, or the larger bulk stations to "jobbers" who operate bulk stations.

2-S Service trade¹*v. p., tables, map, appendix.***2. Receipts Size. 35¢.**

Presents basic establishment, receipt, payroll, and personnel data for service establishments classified by size based on volume of receipts. Detailed data, by kind of

business for the United States as a whole, are presented for the personal, business, and repair services, and for amusements. Receipts-size statistics for geographic divisions, States, and selected metropolitan areas are presented for personal, business, and repair service groups and for hotels and amusements. Geographic division and State data are also shown for tourist courts and the more important kinds of business, or groups of kinds of business. Data for hotels include the number of guest rooms; for tourist courts, the number of rental units; and for motion picture theaters, the seating capacity.

3. Employee Size. 25¢.

Data for personal, business, and repair service establishments and for year-round hotels classified by size based on number of employees. No data are included for seasonal hotels, tourist courts, or amusement establishments. For purposes of the tabulations included in this bulletin, each establishment was assigned to one of several size classes on the basis of the total number of paid employees at work during the work-week ended nearest November 15, 1948. Statistics show number of establishments, receipts, pay roll, number of employees for workweek ended nearest November 15, and in the case of hotels, number of hotel guest rooms. These data are presented by employee-size groups for the United States, by kind of business, and by geographic division and State; and for selected kinds of business, by geographic division and State.

4. City Size. 20¢.

Presents 1948 data on number of establishments, receipts, payroll, proprietors, and employees, classified by nine city-size groups, for personal, business, and repair services, and for hotels and amusements. Also includes data on number of hotel guest rooms. Detailed kind-of-business information is shown for the United States as a whole, for personal, business, and repair services. Area data, consisting of statistics for the United States and each of the geographic divisions, are presented for these same major service categories as well as for hotels and the more important kinds or groups of business. City-size figures for all amusements combined are restricted to the United States as a whole.

5. Legal Form of Organization. 20¢.

This bulletin presents 1948 establishments, receipts, payroll, and personnel figures for the service trades, amusements, hotels and tourist courts, classified by legal form of organization. In the tables for hotels and tourist courts, these data are supplemented by information on the number of hotel guest rooms and tourist court rental units. For service trades and amusements, data are shown for the United States, by kind of business, and in totals for each of these groups, by geographic division and State. For hotels and tourist courts, data are shown for the United States and each geographic division and State.

7. City Statistics. 50¢.

Presents 1948 figures for 19 service kinds of business or groups of service kinds of business (including hotels), for selected cities in the United States. Statistical material is limited for the most part to information on number of establishments, receipts, payroll, proprietors, and employees. For hotels, data is supplemented by the number of guest rooms.

8. Laundries, Cleaning and Dyeing Plants and Related Services. 75¢.

Detailed data for power laundries and cleaning and dyeing plants, as well as hand laundries, self-service laundries, linen supply service, diaper service, rug cleaners, and pressing, alteration, and garment repair shops are shown for the United States as a whole, for geographic divisions, States, selected standard metropolitan areas and for selected cities. Subjects covered include basic establishment, receipts, pay roll, and personnel data; analysis of total receipts by major sources; analysis of wholesale receipts by major sources; laundry and cleaning receipts by method of delivery; and trucks operated by laundries, cleaning and dyeing plants, and related services.

10. Hotels. 35¢.

Detailed 1948 data for hotels for the United States as a whole, for geographic divisions, States, selected standard metropolitan areas and for selected cities. Statistics are presented for both year-round hotels and seasonal hotels. Tables present basic data on number of establishments, receipts, pay roll, and personnel; analysis of receipts by major sources; analysis by size based on volume of receipts; number of guest rooms, and number of employees; city-size data; supplemental compensation received by employees; percentage of occupancy; legal form of organization; period of acquisition or establishment; guest rooms available for transient and residential guests; and comparative statistics for 1948 and 1939.

25. Trucks. 114 p. 55¢.

Presents figures on trucks and truck-tractors operated by Retail, Wholesale, and Service establishments during December 1948. Data are presented for the United States, geographic divisions, and States, by kind of business and by manufacturer's rated capacity. Data are limited to company-operated (private carrier) vehicles, whether owned or leased and do not include contract or common carrier vehicles. Trucks held for sale and trucks rented to other persons are not included in the figures. Data for industrial tractors, fork-lift trucks, and nonautomotive conveyances are not included in this Bulletin.

TRADE RELEASES, BY KIND OF BUSINESS

The three Series BC-2-R, BC-2-W, and BC-2-S include separate reports for a number of different kinds of businesses, retail, wholesale and service. Data in these reports are limited to basic Census information on the number of establishments, sales, payroll, employees, and proprietors of unincorporated businesses, by geographic divisions and State. There are United States summary reports for Retail, Wholesale and Service Trades, with a separate summary for Amusements in the BC-2-S series.

4. GOVERNMENTS DIVISION

The Governments Division collects data and prepares reports showing current and bench mark statistical data relating to the characteristics and functions of State and local governments and their administration in the United States. In current reporting, primary attention is given to public finance (revenue, expenditure, debt, and enterprise finances), and public employment (number of employees and amount of payroll). A two-page release entitled "Census Bureau Publications on Governments, as Scheduled for the Fiscal Year 1952" is available upon request.

During the past century, a Census of Governments has been taken at 10-year intervals—most recently for 1942—providing more complete and detailed information on State and local governments than is reported currently. Public Law 767 of the 81st Congress, approved September 7, 1950, requires that such a census be taken for the year 1952 and thereafter at 5-year (rather than 10-year) intervals. This new Act also provides a clearer statutory statement as to the minimum subject content of such censuses.

4-1. STATE FINANCES

5. INDUSTRY DIVISION

Current statistics on commodity production are issued in the Facts for Industry series. This series of releases makes available to manufacturers, trade groups, and other users of industrial data, current figures that are useful in their day-to-day operations and forward planning. The current reports also present an accurate picture of industrial trends over a period of time.

Annual surveys of manufactures have been taken for a sample of plants covering 1949 and 1950. Reports for both years were published in 1951. They bring up to date the statistics on employment, earnings, man-hours, value added, inventories, expenditures for new plant and equipment, and classes of products, which are shown in more detail in the quinquennial Census reports. All four 1947 Census of Manufactures volumes were issued in 1950: Vol. I, General Summary; Vol. II, Statistics by Industry; Vol. III, Statistics by States; and the Product Supplement. Special reports based on the 1947 Census of Manufactures are still being issued. The next Census of Manufactures will be taken in 1954 covering 1953.

A 1949 Puerto Rico Census of Manufactures was undertaken with funds provided by the Government of Puerto Rico and was conducted by the Bureau of the Census working in close cooperation with the Government of Puerto Rico. It covered all manufacturing activity (as defined in Standard Industrial Classification System) on the Island.

5-3. ANNUAL SURVEYS OF MANUFACTURES

With the Census of Manufactures now on a quinquennial basis, the Annual Surveys of Manufactures are designed to provide a current series of the key statistical measures of industrial activity. They cover approximately 45,000 plants out of about 240,000 manufacturing establishments, including all large plants and a representative sample of the much more numerous small plants.

In addition to data on the value of shipments by product classes, the annual surveys provide measures of value added by manufacture, employment, payrolls, inventories, and expenditures for plant and equipment for selected industries and industry groups, for geographic divisions, and for the important industrial States.

The Annual Surveys of Manufactures employment data have been coordinated with the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance employment figures for consistency in classification, coverage, and statistical accuracy. Tables comparing these two sets of manufacturing employment are included in the pertinent releases.

MAS-49-1 Value of Shipments of Selected Classes of Products: 1949 and 1947. Preliminary

These are preliminary estimates of the value of selected classes of products shipped by manufacturers during 1949. Estimates, derived mainly from the 1949 Annual Survey of Manufactures, are shown together with the corresponding 1947 Census of Manufactures product class values. 5-4. 1949 PUERTO RICO CENSUS OF MANUFACTURES

The 1949 Puerto Rico Census of Manufactures is the first to be taken since 1939 and is the fourth canvass of manufacturing activities in Puerto Rico since the Island came under the jurisdiction of the United States. The first Census of Manufactures covered the year 1909 and was taken at 10-year intervals thereafter, except for the year 1929. The Census covered manufacturing activity during the calendar year 1949 in the 77 municipalities into which Puerto Rico is divided. It was undertaken with funds provided by the Government of Puerto Rico and was conducted by the Bureau of the Census in close cooperation with that Government.

6. POPULATION AND HOUSING DIVISION

A Census of Population has been taken every 10 years since 1790 and a Census of Housing was taken in 1940 and in 1950. These censuses were last taken as of April 1, 1950, and the results are now being published in a program which will extend over the next few years.

Monthly surveys of a scientifically selected sample of the population are conducted, and information on employment, unemployment, hours of work, occupation, etc., are published currently. Also available are estimates of personal and family characteristics of the population, internal migration, housing conditions, etc.

Estimates of population for intercensal and intercensal dates are prepared, and special censuses of local areas are taken at the request and expense of the places involved.

6-11. 1950 CENSUS OF POPULATION

Results of the 1950 Census of Population are being made available in published form as rapidly as they are tabulated and assembled. Preliminary figures and advance releases of final statistics are issued as unbound multilithed pamphlets identified as Series PC reports. Requests for announcements listing reports which will become available should be addressed to the Population and Housing Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C.

More detailed final data will be presented in a series of bound volumes. The materials presented in these volumes are also being made available as paper-covered preprints (bulletins) of the various chapters.

Key to Published and Tabulated Data for Small Areas

Presents in tabular form an index to the statistics based on the 1950 Censuses of Population and Housing which will be published, or will be available in the form of unpublished tabulations, for various types of area smaller than States.

The information is cross-indexed to the specific tables in which the published data on the same subject will appear in the final reports. Among these reports are Population Volume I, Number of Inhabitants; Population Volume II; Chapter B, General Characteristics; Housing Volume I, General Characteristics; Housing Volume V (Block Statistics Bulletins); and Census Tract Bulletins.

Information which will be tabulated but not published for these areas is clearly noted, and instructions for securing this type of data are included. Appendixes to the Key describe and list various types of areas, such as standard metropolitan areas, urbanized areas, census tract areas, and block statistics cities.

FINAL BULLETINS¹

The Population Series P-A Bulletins (Number of Inhabitants) are preprints of separate chapters for the United States, each State, the District of Columbia, and the Territories and possessions, which will later be bound into Volume I of the 1950 Census of Population. The bulletins show the final counts of the number of inhabitants for the State, for each county and for each minor civil division within the county. Figures are also presented for each incorporated place, each unincorporated place of 1,000 or more inhabitants, and incorporated places of 5,000 or more by wards. A special series of tables contains figures for each urbanized area, and the incorporated places and portions of minor civil divisions within it. Maps which are included define the boundaries of the minor civil divisions within the State and the boundaries of each of the urbanized areas. The bulletins supersede preliminary reports based on the field counts which were issued in late 1950, and the Series PC-8 Advance Reports on Final Population Counts.

Series P-D Bulletins (Census Tract Statistics) comprise parts of Volume III of the 1950 Census of Population. The 64 bulletins cover 67 of the larger tracted cities and their adjacent tracted areas, where the latter exist. Each bulletin will present, by census tracts, information obtained in both the Censuses of Population and of Housing. These bulletins will not be bound into a single publication.

The grouping of the 3,101 counties of the United States into State economic areas is the product of a special study sponsored by the Bureau of the Census in cooperation with the Bureau of Agricultural Economics and several State and private agencies. State economic areas will be used for tabulating and publishing many types of Census data. These areas are one of the new features of the 1950 Censuses of Agriculture, Population, and Housing.

This report presents the procedure and the data used in the delineation of State economic areas.
