

APPENDIX I

Metropolitan Area Concepts and Components

Statistics for metropolitan areas shown in the *Statistical Abstract* represent areas officially designated by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) as standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas (SMSA's). Definitions of the SMSA's in terms of their geographic components are presented in Office of Management and Budget, *Standard Metropolitan Statistical Areas, 1975*, Revised Edition. OMB issues amendments to update this publication when changes in SMSA definitions are made. See also U.S. National Bureau of Standards, *Metropolitan Statistical Areas*, Federal Information Processing Standards Publication (FIPS Pub. 8-4, June 30, 1974).

Recent previous editions (1967-1975) of the *Statistical Abstract* have included a section entitled "Metropolitan Area Statistics," which presented numerous items of statistical information for SMSA's. That section is omitted beginning with this edition. In its place, a much more comprehensive *State and Metropolitan Area Data Book* will be issued on a biennial basis; the first issue is scheduled for release in 1978.

The complete list of areas, their components, and population totals, which follows tables A, B, and C below (see p. 904) is based on the SMSA definitions as amended by OMB to March 31, 1976. On that date, there were 276 SMSA's (including 4 in Puerto Rico).

Standard definitions of metropolitan statistical areas were first issued by the then Bureau of the Budget (predecessor of OMB) in 1949, under the designation "Standard Metropolitan Areas"; the present designation was adopted in 1959. The general concept of a metropolitan area is one of an integrated economic and social unit with a large population nucleus.

The criteria for the establishment and definition of SMSA's have undergone several modifications since 1949. The current criteria were adopted in March 1976; they provide that each SMSA must include at least:

- (a) One city with 50,000 or more inhabitants, or
- (b) A city with at least 25,000 inhabitants, which, together with contiguous places (incorporated or unincorporated) having population densities of at least 1,000 persons per square mile, has a combined population of 50,000 and constitutes for general economic and social purposes a single community, provided that the county or counties in which the city and contiguous places are located has a total population of at least 75,000. (In New England, the cities and towns qualifying for inclusion in an SMSA must have a total population of at least 75,000.)

In addition to the central city or cities, the criteria provide that the SMSA include the county in which the central city is located, and adjacent counties that are determined to be metropolitan in character and economically and socially integrated with the county of the central city, according to specific rules. (In New England, as noted below, the units comprising the area are cities and towns rather than counties.) The largest city in each SMSA is designated a "central city"; in addition, there may be up to two additional central cities if certain criteria are met. With two exceptions (Nassau-Suffolk, N. Y. and Northeast Pennsylvania), the title of each SMSA includes the names of its central city or cities. An SMSA may include other cities of 50,000 or more besides its central cities, and may include territory in more than one State.

New England SMSA's and NECMA's. Because SMSA's in New England are defined in terms of cities and towns, rather than counties, some statistical data that are available only for counties cannot be compiled for individual New England SMSA's. Therefore, for New England areas data are shown for both New England County Metropolitan Areas (NECMA's) and SMSA's wherever possible. The NECMA's

provide a county version of the New England areas defined following criteria adopted by OMB in March 1976 which are identical to those used to define SMSA's in the other States. NECMA's do not replace New England SMSA's as the standard areas.

Standard Consolidated Statistical Areas.—Standard consolidated statistical areas (SCSA's), defined under criteria adopted by OMB in August 1975, include two or more contiguous SMSA's which meet certain criteria of size, urban character, integration, and contiguity of urbanized areas.

Effect of changes in SMSA definitions.—Changes in the definitions of SMSA's since 1949 have included the recognition of new areas as, for example, cities reached 50,000 population, and large counties (or towns in New England) were added to existing SMSA's. Also, several formerly separate SMSA's have been merged, and occasionally territory has been transferred from one SMSA to another or (in rare instances) from an SMSA to nonmetropolitan territory. Comparisons of SMSA figures over time may be affected in cases where the SMSA definitions were changed. To maintain comparability, data for an earlier period have been revised in this volume, where possible, to reflect the SMSA boundaries of the more recent period. However, this could not always be done. For data based on a sample survey, in particular, it is usually not possible to reflect changes in SMSA definitions that occurred after the survey was made.

In the three tables that follow, data are given for SMSA's as defined for specified dates, thereby indicating the extent of change in population and land area resulting from revisions in definitions.

TABLE A. NUMBER, POPULATION, AND LAND AREA OF SMSA'S AS DEFINED AT SPECIFIED DATES: 1940 TO 1970

(The differences in population shown here for each census year (in the successive columns of the table) result entirely from net expansion of metropolitan territory through changes in the SMSA definitions. The differences in population shown for each SMSA definition (on the successive lines of the table) result entirely from population changes within that territory, unaffected by changes in SMSA definitions. The changes in 1970 land area result entirely from net expansion of SMSA territory. All data include Alaska and Hawaii and exclude Puerto Rico. Subtraction of any line of the table from the line below will show the net effect of change in population and land area undergone by the SMSA's as the result of changes in definitions between the specified dates. Such changes typically occurred throughout the period, not on any single date, and may have included subtractions from, as well as additions to, SMSA territory. The area data for the 1950 and 1960 census definitions of SMSA's differ from the data published in those censuses because they are based on a remeasurement of land areas made during the 1960's, and also reflect changes in inland water area occurring up to 1970)

APPENDIX III

Statistical Methodology and Reliability

Introduction—Data in this *Statistical Abstract* came from many sources and may be based on complete counts, administrative records, sample surveys, estimates, unpublished data, and even informed guesses. The collecting agencies include Federal and State statistical agencies, Federal and State regulatory agencies, private research agencies, trade associations, insurance companies, health associations, and private organizations such as the American Red Cross and philanthropic foundations.

Consequently, the data vary considerably as to reference periods, methods of collection, definitions of terms, and, for continuing series, the number and frequency of time periods for which data are available. Also, all the data are subject to errors of various kinds, some due to the sponsoring or collecting agencies, others due to collection and processing methods. Even censuses and/or surveys which purport to cover a "complete" population are subject to response errors, errors from failure to obtain information from all units in the population, processing and tabulating errors, and disagreements as to the meaning of the data when interpreted by different interests. The introduction of sampling introduces sampling error, and perhaps some other errors which might not occur with a complete coverage.

Following are definitions of some statistical terms, and of the types of errors which may be present in the tables.

True value—An idealized concept of a quantity which is to be measured; in some cases it can be achieved, but in others there is disagreement as to the definition of the quantity. Illustrations are the number of persons who are "unemployed", and the "dollar value of farm sales."

In most surveys an approximation to the "true" value is used, defined in such a way that one would expect to be able to measure it provided there were sufficient time, money, knowledge of techniques, etc., and no errors in the reporting, collection, and processing of the data.

Parent population—The population from which data are to be collected, or summarized, according to definitions which have been agreed upon as being useful. For example, for sales of farm products, it is necessary to define a "farm" and also a "sale" made by a farm.

Survey value—A value obtained in a complete survey which is intended to be the "true" value, but which may not be the same because the "true" data cannot be collected, the population cannot be defined exactly, or there are uncontrollable biases in the process of collecting and assembling the data. For example, age may be poorly reported if someone other than the person involved responds; sometimes the person himself does not know his age.

Sample—A subset or part of the population, selected according to accepted statistical procedures, with the object of investigating the properties of the parent population. With *random sampling*, each possible sample has a fixed and determinate probability of selection.

Sample survey—A survey carried out by a sampling method; that is, only a portion of the whole population is surveyed.

Sample estimate—An estimate, based on a sample, of the result which could have been obtained if the entire population could have been surveyed by the same methods, under the same auspices, in the same time period. If there are no errors other than sampling error, the estimate will be unbiased.

Sampling error—That part of the difference between a population value and an estimate of that value, derived from a random sample, the difference being due to the fact that only a sample of values is observed.

Nonsampling errors—Errors which arise from sources other than sampling, such as defects in the list (or "frame") from which the sample was selected, faulty selection of the sample, mistakes in data collection such as nonresponse, response bias and response variance, inability to answer the questions, and processing errors such as errors in editing and tabulation.

Nonresponse—Failure to obtain information from a designated unit (sample or population) for any reason, such as refusal, not at home, inability of respondent to answer question. This includes *item nonresponse*, in which some questions, but not all, are answered for a particular unit.

Total error—The combined effect of all the errors which are present in the survey results. The statistician attempts to balance the various types of errors in order to obtain the smallest total error possible for the money expended for the survey.

Standard error of a survey estimate—A measure of the variation among the estimates which would be made from all possible samples. It is a measure of the *precision* with which an estimate from a particular sample approximates the average result of all possible samples.

Relative standard error—The standard error of the estimate divided by the sample estimate itself. Another term for this concept is the *coefficient of variation* of the estimate.

The sample estimate and an estimate of its standard error permit construction of interval estimates with prescribed confidence that the interval includes the average result of all possible samples for a given sampling rate.

Bias—The difference between the average of all possible sample estimates and the "true" value. *Bias* in a complete coverage survey may be illustrated by the phenomenon of heaping at ages ending in 0 and 5, a frequent occurrence in the reporting of age in a population census.

The accuracy of a survey result depends on both sampling and nonsampling errors. The total survey error is the figure which enables the user to know how valid the data in a particular table are. The preferred presentation of the data would have statements of total error accompanying each table in this volume. Obviously this is impossible. The explanatory notes which follow discuss the methodology and reliability of the data for some of the major Federal statistical agencies which are the original sources for data presented in this edition of the *Abstract*. These discussions will be extended to other agencies in future issues.

U.S. BUREAU OF THE CENSUS

Brief discussions of procedures followed, area concepts, and terminology used in the major demographic and economic censuses and in the various current surveys and of the bases for sample data and estimates appear in this *Statistical Abstract* in the introductory text to the following sections: 1, 4, 9, 12, 13, 23, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, and 31. For additional information, the source cited below each table should be consulted. See also below under "Sources."

U.S. DEPT. OF AGRICULTURE, STATISTICAL REPORTING SERVICE (SRS)

Most of the SRS statistics are derived from sample surveys, based on a variety of sample designs. The June Enumerative Survey, subsamples of that survey, and objective yield surveys (crop cutting) provide most of the statistics produced by SRS.

Descriptions of the methods used for most of the SRS farm tables in the *Statistical Abstract* may be found in U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, SRS, *Scope and Methods of the Statistical Reporting Service*, Miscellaneous Publication No. 1308, July 1975. Chapters 2 and 3, "Sampling Methodology and Estimation" and "Methods of Collecting and Processing Data," describe the procedures used. Individual chapters describe the surveys and methods for obtaining information on particular types of crops and livestock, prices, and other items. While probability sampling is used for most of the surveys, tables of sampling errors are not readily available; non-sampling errors are mentioned only indirectly, as in a discussion of revisions of the data.

1. June Enumerative Survey

The June Enumerative Survey is conducted in about 16,300 segments, having more than 20,000 farms and 60,000 agricultural tracts. An area sample which takes into account land use and type of farming is used; State estimates can be made for most of the 48 conterminous States. Segments vary in size from 1/10 square mile in residential areas, to 1 square mile in intensively cultivated areas, to several square miles or more in open farming and ranch areas. Typically, 20 percent of the SRS segments are rotated annually to relieve respondent burden.

About June 1, all selected segments are visited by an SRS interviewer, who collects information on crop acres, land use, livestock inventories, farm labor, farm population, and farm operators. Estimates are based on data from all agricultural operations within the sample segments, with a relative sampling error of about 1 percent for national statistics.

Smaller samples of segments selected from the segments in the June Survey are used to collect information on intentions to plant crops, crop condition, crops harvested, and year-end inventories of livestock.

2. Farm labor surveys

Surveys based on a list of farm labor employers are conducted quarterly, supplemented by a sample of small areas of land where data for employers not on the list are collected. About 10,000 farms are included. The relative standard error for the number of hired farm workers is about 3 percent at the national level; for a State, the relative standard error ranges from 10 percent to 20 percent. See table 1108.

3. Indexes of prices received and paid by farmers

Monthly mail surveys of farmers, businesses providing farm services, and firms purchasing and processing farm products are used to collect data on prices. The methodology is described in Chapter 10 of publication No. 1308. Various sources and voluntary reporting are used; there are no sampling error statements. See table 1091.

U.S. DEPT. OF HEALTH, EDUCATION, AND WELFARE, NATIONAL CENTER FOR HEALTH STATISTICS (NCHS)

The National Center for Health Statistics has several important sample surveys, from which a number of tables in the *Statistical Abstract* are derived. Other surveys, such as the Master Facility Inventory and the Health Insurance Studies, are based on data reported for regulatory purposes ("administrative records"), or on complete

coverages. Several sources may be used in a single table and the data presented may, therefore, have different degrees of completeness and reliability.

1. Health Interview Survey (HIS)

The HIS is a household sample survey which produces a continuous sampling of the civilian noninstitutional population of the United States. The households interviewed each week represent the entire population, and the weekly samples are additive over time.

Details on methodology and the determination of standard errors for particular statistics are presented in the Technical Notes section (appendix I) of the report cited as the source. For unpublished data, see NCHS Series 10 "Current Estimates" report for the particular data year. See tables 124, 138-143, 150 (Current Population Survey sample), 224.

2. Hospital Discharge Survey

This survey covers patients discharged from noninstitutional hospitals having 6 or more beds in the 50 States and the District of Columbia. About 500 hospitals were selected from 7,500, with varying probabilities; all hospitals having 1,000 or more beds being in the sample with certainty. The sample of discharges was at rates such that each discharged patient had about the same probability of being selected.

The base populations used in computing rates are unpublished estimates from the U.S. Bureau of the Census. Relative standard errors for estimates in the table for a few items are:

Total discharges, 1973—32,125,000 ± 3.0 percent

Discharges, ages 5-14—2,139,000 ± 3.4 percent

Discharges, under 1 year—580,000 ± 4.5 percent

For an interpretation of the errors quoted, see the definition of the relative standard error in the introduction of this Appendix. See table 131.

3. Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (HANES)

In this first survey, 75 percent of the persons in a probability sample of 28,000 persons selected from the total U.S. civilian noninstitutional population were examined. The sampling rate was larger for certain segments of the population believed more likely to be undernourished; the data were weighted to produce unbiased estimates for the entire population. For a detailed description of the content, sample design, and plan of operation see NCHS: *Plan and Operation of the Health and Nutrition Examination Survey, United States, 1971-73. Vital and Health Statistics, Series 1, Nos. 10a and 10b*, DHEW Pub. No. (HSM) 7301310, Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., February 1973. See table 154.

4. Master Facility Inventory (MFI)

The MFI Survey includes all inpatient health facilities in the United States. Data were collected in 1973 by the Bureau of the Census and American Hospital Association, with response rates of 96 percent for nursing homes and 92 percent for hospitals. See *Vital and Health Statistics, Series 14, No. 16*, for methodology. See tables 115-117, 126, 132, 134.

U.S. DEPT. OF HEALTH, EDUCATION, AND WELFARE, NATIONAL CENTER FOR EDUCATION STATISTICS (NCES)

Generally, tables from the National Center for Education Statistics are based on reports from administrators of individual institutions of higher education, both public and private, or, for publicly controlled elementary and secondary schools, from State Departments of Education. Data for privately controlled elementary and secondary schools involve some sampling. Data on participation in adult education is also based on sampling procedures.

Methods of collection and coverage are discussed in the sources quoted for the tables, particularly in the annual *Digest of Education Statistics*, and its predecessor, the *Biennial Survey of Education in the United States*.

APPENDIX IV

Guide to Sources of Statistics

Alphabetically arranged by subject, this guide contains references to the important primary sources of statistical information for the United States. Nonrecurrent publications presenting compilations or estimates for years later than 1966 or types of data not available in regular series are also included.
